#### Allison anxious for spring to begin Panthers play one more time

The Union County Panther Baseball Team added one more game after their season came to an end at Elbert County last week.

Despite their season officially coming to a close, Coach C.T. Hussion's squad responded with a 6-1 thumping of the Panthers of Jackson County.

Jackson had entered the game on an eight-game winning streak and had beaten every team from the North Sub-Region.

That was all fine and dandy, but Union County ace hurler, Daniel Coyne had other plans.

After giving up a first inning run following a walk, sandwiched between two singles, Coach Hussion decided to ride out his senior pitcher in the last game of his career and Coyne didn't disappoint.

He picked up his eighth win of the season. Coyne has been the Pan-

The Panthers finish the regular season with a 12-10 overall record and break even in region play with a record of 8-8.

"We will be mixing in full contact days with fundamental days,' Coach Allison said.

Coach Allison's Panthers finished the 2011 regular season strong, winning two out of their last three games. Their season ended on Nov. 4th with a 28-14 Region 8 loss to Hart County. The loss might sound disheartening, but during the regular season, the Panthers lost their match up with Hart County 36-7.

With the start of official fall practice nearly three months away, Coach Allison is still expecting to see

"We want to improve our team fundamentally and technically,' Coach Allison said.

Despite coming off a 3-7 campaign in 2011, Union County returns several key players who are starving for success in 2012.

'We have everyone back that we expected to return," Coach Allison said. "We also have a couple

of new players that I am anxious to see on the field."

The Panthers' coaching staff returns intact and will remain the same from a personnel standpoint. Also returning is Coach Justin Byers, who has made sure the players remain focused and work hard in the off-season

Coach Allison had nothing but praises when asked about the dedication of his players and Coach Byers during off-season workouts.

Coach Byers has done a great job getting our kids stronger, faster, and quicker," Coach Allison said. "We have stressed this very hard since the season ended last November."

The Panthers will practice Tuesday through Friday this week and Monday through Thursday the following week.

Spring football practice contin-ues through Monday, May 14th be-fore concluding on May 15th.

# Golf season is over; Panthers lose out in Region Tourney

The 2012 golf season came to an end last Tuesday in Braselton for Coach Brian Allison's Union County Panther Golf Teams.

The Lady Panthers' season was completed on Monday in Homer.

The boys squad that finished 9th in Region 8-AA match play, were led by James Rowe's 87 which placed him 12th individually in the Region tournament.

Colton Stanley posted a 96, Blade Sczcepanski a 100, while Grant Schuette rounded out Union's top four with a 102.

Coming into the season, Coach Allison had some serious question marks surrounding two of his top five golfers.

Jackson County, led by York DeLoyd's 78, finished a distant third at 353. Hart County's C.J. Griffin shot an 82 to help the Bulldogs lock up fourth place and a berth in the

Panthers had a tough time at Scales Country Club on Monday, finishing in 10th place. Hayley Nix posted a 120 to lead all Lady Panthers on the day as Union County came in three strokes behind 9th place East Jackson, and 17 strokes in back of Jackson County for 8th.

Coach Allison wasn't sure if Nix would be Union's top golfer at the start of the season, but called her the "most improved player on the squad."

Other Lady Panthers scores include Kiersten Cox, who shot a 126, Natalie Fleming finished with 132, and Lydia Gray rounded out the Lady Panther team with a 142.

However, that day was a special day for Union's Kiersten Cox, not only was it the Region Tournament, but she also recorded her longest drive ever of 199 yards.

"I did that at Region on April 23, 2012 - my mom's birthday," she said. "So overall it was a very special day for me

North Oconee had two girls place inside the Top Nine (McKenzie Hendrick and Crocket Floyd) to put the Lady Titans in second place, 24 shots behind Barger's Lady Devils.

Madison Caldwell's 84 was the third lowest score of the tournament and was enough to put Dawson County in third place, while Rabun County rounded out the Top Four, thanks to Mollie Vinson's 95. Cara Gowder's 80 was good enough for second individually, but not enough to propel the rest of her Banks County squad into the state playoffs, as the Lady Leopards

finished just one shot out of fourth and a trip to state. For Union County, the

season may be at an end, but the memories will last a lifetime.

Lady Panther golfer Kiersten Cox shared her most memorable moments from the 2012 season and the story that tops her list is the bus ride over to Big Canoe Golf Course. "That was the most enjoyable bus ride I've ever experienced," said Cox. laughed a lot and the guys gave me a hard time, but it was hilarious, and I ended up placing first that day."

The Union County High School senior has been honored with the title of Special Olympics Georgia Athlete of the Month April 2012.


Alex is the first student from Union County to be awarded Athlete of the Month by SOGA.
