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Softball: Lady Panthers outlast Gilmer in preseason scrimmage

Ellijay - Union County softball and second-year head coach Carissa Owenby received a sneak preview of the Lady Panthers 2023 campaign during a scrimmage game at Gilmer on Monday, July 17.

"This gave us a chance just to kind of see what we have," Owenby said. "We lost three key players from last year and we needed to see who would fill those gaps and give us a look at some of our freshmen that we haven't seen before."

On a brutally hot afternoon in Ellijay, Union came away with a 15-9 victory after racing out to a 5-0 lead behind two innings from senior ace Sierra Burnette and first-inning RBI singles from senior Georgia Patton and junior Sloane Dyer. The Lady Panthers turned

it over to the younger girls during the late innings and needed a rally after Gilmer's five-run third put Union in a 7-5 deficit entering the fourth. "We saw a lot of things

that we need to work on, and we also saw a lot of good things," Owenby said. "Early on we were popping it up, but later, we starting hitting the ball."

Freshman Zady Diaz opened the fourth with a triple, then came around via a base knock from senior Katie Byers, who swiped two bags and came home to knot the score at 7-7.

Later in the frame, McKenna Hood singled, stole a bag and scored the go-ahead run on Lilly Hilton's RBI.

Ayla Jamison replaced pitcher Jaslyn Roberts in the fourth, striking out the side following a leadoff walk.

Following a scoreless fifth from Union, Gilmer tied the score with a two-out single

All square at 8-8 through five innings, the Lady Panthers broke things open with five runs in the sixth and two in the

Jamison doubled to start the sixth and Byers drew a free pass. Two stolen bases moved both runners into scoring position for freshman Jules Dyer's wo-out, two-run single.

Dyer swiped second and McKenna Hood made it an 11-7 game by bringing her around with another two-out knock.

Diaz stepped into the circle in the sixth and fanned two batters after a leadoff single came home - trimming the margin to 13-8.

Jamison's three-bagger kickstarted the Union County seventh ahead of Byers' RBI single. Patton returned to the game, scoring Byers on a sacrifice fly.

Diaz closed things out by limiting the damage after a leadoff double, fanning a pair and holding the Bobcats to a

"Zady Diaz did a fabulous job," Owenby said. "I didn't expect too much because she's a freshman, and she had some errors behind her, but she was unfazed.

"Ayla [Jamison] did a

fantastic job too and she is only a sophomore," Owenby added.

The scrimmage was originally scheduled as a varsity/JV doubleheader, but due to players missing from both squads, the two coaches agreed to a single

Union County begins its hunt for back-to-back Region 8-AA titles when the season opens Saturday, Aug. 5 at Lumpkin County. The Lady Panthers haven't won consecutive region titles since 2010-2011 but enter the fall as the frontrunners in 8-AA after finishing 9-0 in region play last

year and returning the bulk of the lineup and their entire pitch-

The Lady Panthers will add reinforcements from the middle school program, along with Moses, who is coming off a stellar freshman campaign at Towns County in 2022.

Union County outscored its 8-AA opposition by a margin of 110-27 in 2022, then rode that momentum to the program's second-straight Elite Eight appearance. Another trip to Columbus in 2023 would mark the first time Union has appered in three consecutive Elite Eights.

Union County wrestling capped off an eventful summer with last week's youth camp, which coincided with the Panthers hosting Wrecksville-Broadview Heights High School (Ohio) head coach Ian Brown for three days.

Wrecksville-Broadview is consistently one of the nation's top-20 programs, while Coach Brown, son of UCHS assistant coach Dave Brown, was also a standout wrestler at Ohio-Northwestern University.

"[Ian Brown] put on a 90-minute-to-two-hour basics and fundamentals camp for our [high school] wrestlers and we were very fortunate to have him," UCHS wrestling coach Justin Byers said. "He is a very knowledgeable coach, and it helps since he's a younger coach. We're just very fortunate to have the entire Brown family involved with the high school program."

During June, the Panthers attended a 30-team duals tournament at Archer High and participated in summer matches at Fannin County. The wrestling squad also took a trip to the Buckeye State, attending the prestigous week-long Jeff Jordan State champ wrestling camp.
"The kids got at least

six hours of technique [train-



ing] and two hours of live wrestling everyday against kids from all over the nation," Byers said. "We took about 18 wrestlers and got an opportunity to face some really good wrestlers, some multiple-time state champions," Byers said. "It's probably one of the best amazing group of young men and I want everyone to know they did Union County proud up in Ohio."

The youth wrestling camp took place at the rubber floor gym following the high school's work with coach Ian Brown. Approximately 15-20 youngsters showed up each day to train under the high school players and coaching staff.

time [at the youth camp],"

Byers said. "Wrestling is growing in the community, and one of our biggest goals is getting this youth camp up and running. This year was a little more formal than in years past. Coach [Michael] Smith-Foot is working with the surrounding counties, and I think we have a pretty good plan to have youth wrestling during the winter

"But it's always good to see those young kids out on the

mat, and it's nice to see the high schoolers working with them and giving something back to the community," Byers continued. "But we had a good time. We played some games and helped them learn the basics of wrestling.

During July, the wrestling activities have slowed down somewhat, allowing the multi-sport athletes to prep for their upcoming football and cross country seasons.

"We try to go heavy in June, but in July, fall sports are gearing up so we try to allow the kids to transition into fall sports and not ask a whole lot from them," Byers said. "We're still going to hold some open mats to allow the wrestlers to get on the mat. Of course, the 6 a.m. workouts will start up once they get back in school. Really, we're just looking to improve on last year's success."

During the 2022-23 season, Union County finished with four underclassmen in third place at the Class AA State Championships -- Anderson Clouse (132 lbs), David Heredia (165), Payton Leggatt (157) and Asa Smith-Foot (150). The Panthers will also add a talented crop of incoming freshman looking to help the program improve on its fifth place overall finish at State.

"We have a really good group of upperclassmen returning, and a really good group of freshmen coming up, so the next few years for Union County wrestling is going to be big," Byers said. "This group of guys have been wrestling outside of the season and attending national tournaments. The buzz we're getting from other high schools is, they have one, maybe two guys that do that, while we have over halfa-dozen that do those types of things. This is a dedicated group of guys. It's about to be a very special time for our wrestling program.'
