somebody, a stranger most times, somebody that I don't know, come – sometimes in the middle of the night – and take me out of my home? All my stuff is there. Now, I'm living with somebody else. They're really nice to me and everything, but I don't understand.

"The court process can be so overwhelming for people, and it's really overwhelming for children, too. They don't understand why it takes so long."

One of the many reasons Curley was such a standout candidate for the award is her apparent dedication to the work. Most CASA volunteers carry only one or two caseloads at a time – Curley typically advocates for seven children concurrently.

"You displayed high standards of dedication to make the child welfare system responsive to the needs of the children for whom you advocate," said Georgia CASA Executive Director Duaine Hathaway, addressing Curley. "In doing so, you inspire others to follow your lead and put the child's future first.

"Out of all the CASA volunteers in Georgia, the advocacy you provide is considered to be of the highest quality."

Gary Greene is the Enotah CASA Volunteer Supervisor for Towns and Union counties, and he nominated Curley for the 2018 award.

Greene also nominated Enotah CASA Volunteer Diana Smith back in 2017, and Smith went on to become the 2017 recipient of both the Georgia Volunteer of the Year Award and the National CASA Association G.F. Bettineski Child Advocate of the Year Award.
