Health officials urge patience as vaccine rollout continues Hospital employees work around clock [

Local COVID-19 vaccine providers are asking that people remain patient in the days ahead as officials work together to get as many people vaccinated as

As severe illness from COVID-19 continues seemingly unabated everywhere and threatens to overwhelm health care systems across the nation, many Americans have grown frustrated with the vaccine rollout, including right here in North Georgia.

Personal precautions like mask-wearing, social distancing and limiting gatherings are still being recommended by public health professionals, even after vaccination, but the vaccine remains the No. 1 hope for millions of people most at risk

allocated via phased distribution as stock becomes available, though it remains a reality that demand is much higher than current supplies, resulting in vaccine lists of eligible people quickly maxing out and signup portals becoming overwhelmed with requests.

distribution of available and other first responders. supplies and in provision of adequate signup opportunities; people are getting vaccinated here, just not at the rate it could be happening, which is exasperating vaccine providers and would-be recipients alike.

Eventually, there will be enough vaccine for everyone who wants it – some medical experts believe much more

- but until then, health officials Vaccines are being are calling for patience as they work to introduce greater efficiency into signup and distribution processes.

Currently, early vaccinations are being focused on medical workers who face greater risk of exposure; on long-term care residents and staff; all Georgians 65 years of Logistically, vaccination age and older; as well as law efforts have seen delays in enforcement, fire personnel,

Local legend Glenn Hamby died on Tuesday, Jan. 12, following an extended illness. The Union County native was 82.

Hamby remembered for many things, including his love of sports and competition generally, his commitment to Shady Grove United Methodist Church and local youth, and his enjoyment of the company of others.

He had the gift of gab was a natural storyteller who could visit for hours, either playing cards or just talking with folks, which he usually did while operating his Owltown Baseball Card Shop off Gainesville Highway that served the area for the last three

A catcher by trade, Hamby's ties to baseball are extensive. He played in high school, followed by The American Legion Post 239 in Dahlonega, then for the California Angels' Minor League team in Statesville, joy sharing his time with North Carolina, where he made \$200 a month.

not have worked out in the long run, but he was happy to have taken advantage of an opportunity to come back home for what turned out to be a lengthy career with the Georgia

Department of Transportation. Here, he raised a family with his wife of 58 years JoAnn, all while pursuing baseball in countless other ways at the

He kept up with baseball as a hobby in the late '50s and into the '60s, playing for town teams in Blairsville, Hiawassee and elsewhere. He even played alongside his friend Zell Miller on the Young Harris team.

In 1967, Hamby began his long association with youth baseball, coaching local Dixie Youth teams through 1980 to become the winningest youth baseball coach in the history

of the county. Hamby also umpired all the years he coached and beyond, into the early 2000s. both for youth baseball and as a member of the Georgia High

Murphy Hwy wreck claims life of passenger Saturday

A passenger involved in a car crash died at the scene of the accident on Saturday, Jan. 16, about a tenth of a mile south of Stonehenge Senior Living on

Murphy Highway. Georgia State Patrol is investigating the accident, and only preliminary results of the investigation were available by press time, which did not include the name of the deceased.

The wreck occurred around 3:50 p.m. Saturday when a northbound green Ford Explorer with North Carolina
