Q. Why didn't I know about this vaccination clinic? How did people find out about it?

A. The January 22nd clinic was advertised in the North Georgia News; registration was made available through the Union County Government website; and its availability was further publicized on the Union County Government Facebook page. Further explanation: Initially, the health department did not know how many vaccines they would receive. As the date of the clinic approached, more vaccines were received, and more registration slots were opened. When the Health Department received even more vaccines, more registration slots were opened, and so on. Early on, we did not know exactly how many vaccines we would have on clinic day – so it was virtually impossible to do a lot of early advertising.

Q. What advice do you have for those of us who are still waiting for an opportunity to sit for the vaccine?

A. At the time of this writing, we cannot give a specific date for another upcoming (first dose) vaccine clinic in Union County. This is primarily due to the fact that the Health Department only has enough vaccines to cover the existing appointments already made. However, if we can get our hands on additional vaccines, we would certainly entertain the idea of holding another mass vaccination clinic.

If the Union County Health Department is able to obtain more vaccines and if a mass vaccination clinic is planned in the future, residents will find the clinic registration information on the Union County Government website located at www.unioncountyga.gov. It will be also be advertised on Facebook.

Again, at the time of this writing, the official COVID-19 vaccine process requires that residents go through the Department of Public Health District 2 website to schedule an appointment: www.phdistrict2. org Appointments can also be made by calling 770-531-5692. Because so many people are trying to get the vaccine, please prepare yourself for busy signals and for long holding times once connected. I feel confident that we will get a handle on this terrible illness - especially if we continue to social distance, wear masks, and receive adequate supplies of COVID-19 vaccines from the Department of Public Health.

was almost glowing with the news of his nephew. He was a proud uncle and drove to Papa's house on Jan. 30, 1938. Beaming as he walked into the house, he picked up his nephew and started walking toward the door. Granny wanted to know where he was going. He said, "I'm going to show off my nephew to all the neighbors." Granny said, "Pick, it is spitting snow and cold as a blue blazes." She told me later, "Pick was disappointed, but, he

understood." Later the family moved to Chicago, and Uncle Pick came for a visit. After the visit, the whole family loaded up in Pick's car and made their way back to Alabama. In Alabama, there were very few traffic lights, and the few that were there hung on cables above the intersections. But, in Chicago and other big towns, the traffic lights were mounted on sign posts at the corners of intersections. Before Pick left Chicago, he had run 15 red lights, and by the time he made it to Paducah, Kentucky, he had run through four more. The young man from Trapptown, Alabama, could never master driving in Chicago. He always complained about the driving habits of those Yankee drivers. Dad was about 13 at the time, and Uncle Pick offered Dad his keys, saying, "Paul, I believe you could do better than me."

But Papa took the keys instead. A few years later, Dad and his family moved back to Alabama, whereupon Papa and his brother opened up a car dealership in Russellville. One of Uncle Pick's first customers was my Dad, Paul Cummings. He bought a 1951 sky blue Ford. Dad still remembers that car to this day. Meanwhile, Uncle Pick became very popular with the citizens of Franklin County and was elected first to the City Council of Russellville and later to the post of Probate Judge, where he served with distinction for a number of years.

When my son, Will, came along, we named him William Paul. He had the same initials, W. P., as Uncle Pick. When I told my great Uncle about this, it was as if that same light came on again. He almost glowed at the thought of another Cummings generation that would remember Walker Pickens Cummings.
