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Wresling: Panthers claim six Area titles, team championship

Blue Ridge - Union County wrestling rolls into this weekend's Class AA State Sectionals fresh off six individual area championships and the overall team title during last Saturday's Area 8 Traditional tournament at Fannin County High School.


Seniors Anderson Clouse (138 lbs) and David Heredia (190) headlined Union County's first-place finishers, along with juniors Payton Legatt (157) Asa Smith-Foot (175) and freshmen Eli Flowers (106) and Paxon Legatt (144).

Runner-up finishes went to juniors Dusty Aaron (215), Andrew Engle (165) and senior Zander Rotko (150).

Union County doubled its three gold medals from last year's Area tournament while Clouse, Heredia and Payton Legatt each secured back-to-back area titles.

Clouse clinched his second-straight Area 8 crown via a 13-4 major decision over East Jackson's Ryan Lampe. In his opening-round bout, Clouse needed only 81 seconds to pin Fannin's Logan Thompson.

Heredia, the 190-lb topseed, earned a bye into the finals, where he pinned Banks County senior Christian Holcombe



Senior David Heredia during the 190-lb title match, ending with his second straight Area 8 title. Photo/Todd Forrest


during the final seconds of the 58 seconds remaining.

Payton Legatt advanced behind a 17-1 technical fall during his opening bout vs. Fannin's Braylin Merrill, then scored a first-round pin over East Jackson's Evan Reed during the finals.

At 175, Smith-Foot received a bye into the finals and built a 12-2 lead before pinning East Jackson's Jazil Lester with

Paxon Legatt notched a 7-5 sudden victory over Banks County senior Elijah Mullins, who forced the extra time via a 2-point reversal with 8 seconds remaining. But Paxon Legatt's 2-point takedown during the opening moments of sudden death handed the freshman the Area 8 title.

Following a bye, Flowers took down East Jackson senior



Charlie Wheeler via an 8-0 major decision after taking control with a 7-0 margin through the first 4 minutes.

Coming in second, Aaron pinned Fannin's Noah Thompson in his opening match before falling via pinfall to Banks County senior Mason Dodd.

East Jackson's Cole Smith pinned Rotko with time running out in the third period. Earlier in the day, Rotko pinned seconds during his first match.


Andrew Engle earned a narrow 8-7 decision over East Jackson's Chase Wingfield in his opening-round bout, using a late reversal and 3-point nearfall to cap a 7-point final period. Engle fell via a first-round pinfall to Banks County's Davian Knox during the title match.

Freshman Landon Bell finished third at 126 via a sec-

Fannin's Skyler Queen in 43 ond-round pinfall over East

Jackson's Robert Hollet. Sophomores Thomas Gary (132), Riley Mortenson (120) and junior Beau Webster (285) each placed fourth and qualified for Saturday's Sectional tournament at Rockmart.

Union County won its first team traditional area title with 175.5 points, edging East Jackson (162), Banks County (159) and Fannin County (79).





The Panthers (19-5, 6-3) are in position to host next week's Region 8-AA tournament as the No. 1 seed for a second straight year with a win at last-place Fellowship Christian on Tuesday, Feb. 6.

Following Saturday's 71-68 loss at Providence Christian, Union County sits in a threeway tie with Providence and Athens Academy, but owns the tiebreaker over both teams. The Panthers momentarily seized sole possession of first place following Tuesday's 84-67 victory over Banks County combined with Athens' loss to Providence.

On Friday, Union County throttled East Jackson 102-71, avenging an earlier loss and eclipsing 100 points for the first time since 2006-07.

Panthers 102, East Jackson 71 - Juniors Houston Henry and Hayden Hughes combined for 54 points and 11 treys as Union County left the Eagles in the dust following a 46-44 second-quarter deficit. The Panthers shot 50%

from downtown, hitting a season-high 15 triples, coming within one trey of a 20-year-old program record. The hot-shooting Pan-

thers raced ahead to early leads of 7-1, 12-5, 19-9, 22-11 and held a 27-19 advantage after a

With Union up 42-34 in the second, East Jackson used a 12-2 run to grab its first and only lead at 46-44 before 3s from Jude Ellis, Henry and Hughes sent the Panthers into the break with a 53-46 edge.

Freshman Jaxon Totherow, Hughes and Henry bumped the Union lead to 59-46 early in the third, and then a Hughes trey capped the 18-0 run with his team out front 62-46.

The Panthers took a 72-55 lead into the 30-point fourth frame, highlighted by four Hughes triples. Hughes final trey spotted Union a 99-69 lead with 1:23 remaining before Garrett handed the keys to his

wasn't even thinking about 100 points, but Hayden got hot and the points started piling up,"

Henry finished with 28 points on 9-of-17 shooting and 4 of 8 from long distance. The Union point guard also dished out 8 assists with 4 rebounds and 3 steals. Hughes had 26 points, 10 rebounds and 2 steals on 7 of 9 from 3-point range.

Sophomore Cade Dockrey hit 5 of 8 from the floor and 2 of 2 from deep during a 13-point, 5-assist, 2-steal performance. Ellis finished with 13 points and 5 assists; Totherow had 12 points and 7 boards on 5 of 7 shooting.

Junior Kaden Combs had 5 points, 8 rebounds and 2 steals; Price ended his night with 3 points; Young had 2 points, 3 rebounds, 2 assists and 2 steals.

Birdy Cunningham led East Jackson with 26 points; points as Union built a 35-27 Qua Watson had 18 points and advantage.

Team stats: Union connected on 37 of its 70 (53%) shots, hitting 15 of 30 (50%) from behind the arc and 13 of 21 (62%) at the line. East Jackson made 30 of 63 (48%) from the floor, 6 of 16 (38%) from deep and 5 of 13 (39%) at the charity

The Panthers won the rebound battle 37-35 and points in the paint 40-36. Union forced 16 turnovers and committed nine.

Panthers 84, Banks County 67 - Union County took its second win over the Leopards in a week behind Ellis' career-high 31 points - 20 in the second quarter.

"When we played at Banks I had 2 points," Ellis said. "But once I got my first shot to fall tonight, I started to feel it after that.

Hughes' 3 near the 50-second mark opened up a 40-29 lead, then Henry's fast-break layup and Ellis' buzzer-beating trey opened up a 16-point advantage.

Banks briefly made it a game late in the third when two free throws moved the Leopards within four at 57-53 until Ellis nailed a 21-footer from the wing, and a Dockrey steal led to Young's basket and a 62-53 lead at quarter's end.

With 5:20 to play, Ellis' steal resulted in a Hughes layup and a 65-55 lead, and then Henry answered a Banks trey moments later, keeping the margin at double digits. Hughes' transition 3 stretched the margin to 71-58.

Following another Leopards' 3, Ellis rattled off 7-straight points for a 78-61 advantage, and Combs' putback made it 80-61 with 1:46 to play.

"I contribute that win to our defense," Garrett said. "I think we had a great gameplan. At [Banks] we had to go to our backup gameplan and it worked, so we stuck with it when they

Panthers 68, Providence 71 - Union County nearly erased an 18-point second-half deficit in Lilburn, but its potential game-tying basket was blocked

Panthers look to clinch Region 8-AA's top seed on Tuesday with under 30 seconds to play on Saturday.

Less than 24 hours removed from scoring 30 points in the fourth period of a 102 outburst vs. East Jackson on Friday. the Providence defense stifled the Panthers during the first 16 minutes, sparking the Storm's 35-20 halftime advantage.

"I challenged the guys at halftime, but I don't know what happened in the first half," Garrett said. "[Providence] did a good job guarding us and we didn't any ball movement and gave up too many open looks."

Providence led by as many as 18 during the third before Henry's floater narrowed the gap to 52-39 entering the fourth. The Storm maintained its 13-point lead inside the 5-minute mark and led 62-51 with under 3 minutes left.

Dockrey completed a 3-point play to move Union within eight, then Henry's and-1 made it 62-59 with 1:38 remaining. Down 66-60, Ellis' 3 cut the lead in half near the minute Following a Providence

Lady Panthers fall in OT to No. 4 Banks, will finish second in 8-AA

Union County will enter next week's Region 8-AA tournament as the No. 2 seed following a heartbreaking overtime loss to No. 4 Banks County on Tuesday, Jan. 30.

The Lady Panthers (14-10, 7-2) bounced back over the weekend with victories over East Jackson and Providence Christian, equaling their win total from last year's 14-14 season with one game left in the regular season.

The girls' Region 8-AA tournament tips off next week at Banks County, where Union likely faces Athens Academy in the opening round.

Lady Panthers 49, No. 4 Banks County 51 (OT) -Trailing 49-47 with 16 seconds remaining in overtime, junior Katelyn Brown evened things up, knocking down two from the charity stripe. But Banks County answered out of a timeout, scoring inside with under 5 seconds left, and the Lady Panthers failed to get off a shot before time

Union County trailed 9-3 after a quarter of the low-scoring affair, then faced an uphill climb for much of the first half, trailing 13-4 until a 6-0 spurt narrowed the gap to 13-10 at the break.

'I was really proud of the girls," Union head coach Thomas Nelson said. "I think both teams knew what the game meant and came out a little tight."

The Lady Panthers expanded its run to 10-0 to grab their first lead at 14-13 when Brown and Ariel McCarter scored to begin the third.

Banks answered with six

straight to mount a 20-14 edge, but Union County fired back with 11-in-a-row for a 25-20 advantage at quarter's end. Brown scored on a put-

back for a 27-23 lead before the Leopards stormed back to tie the score at 27-27. Kamryn Mull countered with a trey then fed Lara Turner for a 32-27 edge inside of 4 minutes. A McCarter trey and a

dribble drive kept Union on top 37-34 until a Leopards bucket cut the lead to one with 1:57 to play. On the ensuing Lady Panthers' possession, McCarter scored off an inbounds play and Banks missed on the other end.

Union turned it over with under a minute left and Banks scored on a putback. Up one, another costly turnover led to a 1-of-2 trip to the line for the Leopards with 7 seconds remaining.


