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Wrestling: Union County sending eight to State Championships

Phillips, Agacinski and Kennedy enter this weekend's tournament as No. 1 seeds

Hazelhurst - Senior Sean Phillips (170 lbs.) placed first at the Class AA Sectionals tournament to headline a weekend that saw Union County wrestling qualify eight competitors for the Class AA State Championships.

On the girls' side, Union County junior Shelby Agacinski (152) and sophomore Brooke Kennedy (197) also took home first at last weekend's sectionals tournament and will compete for a Class AA/A State title this weekend.

Senior Brady Guild (160) placed second while sophomore Zander Rotko (132), freshman Asa Smith-Foot (138) and freshman Pavton Legatt (145) each finished fifth. With the top-six moving on from each weight class, senior Landon Clark earned a berth at state with a sixth-place finish at 120 lbs.

Phillips' weekend began with a 70-second pinfall over Putnam County junior Scotty Ford. Berrien County's Matthew Lopez offered Phillips his toughest challenge of the day during the second round, where the Union County senior survived a 2-1 decision to advance to the semifinals.

Phillips reached the finals via a 55-second pinfall of Pace Academy senior Jude Black. In the title bout, Phillips scored a 10-6 decision over Lovett senior Finn Bres-



The Class AA State Championships get underway at 8 a.m. Friday morning at the Macon Centreplex. The finals and consolation finals are expected to start at 10 a.m.

In Friday's opening round, Clark will face Pepperell sophomore Cory Moten at 120 lbs. Rotko will meet Callaway's Isaiah Shewmake at 132 and Smith-Foot will square off with Dade County sophomore Brandon Willerson at 138. In the 145 division, Legatt meets Bremen sophomore James Bumgardner.

Guild earned a firstround bye at 160 and will await the winner of Banks County's Roman Haynes and Elbert County's Matt Smith. As for Phillips, the top-seed also received a bye and will face two rounds short of a state- Ronald Pointer in round two.

Union County qualifies 11 wrestlers for State Sectionals; Guild and Phillips take home gold

Blue Ridge - Union County qualified a program-record 11 wrestlers to the Class AA State Sectionals during the Area 8 Championships in Blue Ridge last Monday, Jan. 31.

A pair of Area championships highlighted the Panthers' evening courtesy of seniors Brady Guild (160 lbs.) and Sean Phillips (170). Additionally, four Union wrestlers finished as Area runner-up: Senior Landon Clark (120), freshman Asa Smith-Foot (138), freshman Payton Legatt (145) and junior Huck Whisenhunt (182).

Sophomores Zander Rotko (132) and Lane Lance (220) placed third. Senior Kanon Abercrombie (126), freshman Ayden Lee (152) and junior Wilson Walker (195) each finished fourth. Freshman heavyweight Caleb Lance earned a sectionals' alternate spot by coming in fifth.

"I thought we did pretty good, but we came in with kind of a weird situation," Union wrestling coach Justin Byers said. "We had to postpone [the Area tournament] once, then we had to postpone again and that can make it difficult for the guys to maintain their weight.

"We came in kind of cold, but to leave with two Area Champions, both seniors who have worked really, really hard, it was a huge night for the program." In the 160 title bout, Guild

scored a pinfall over the defend-

ing Class AA State Runner-up, Fannin County junior Corbin Davenport, who needed just 55 seconds to pin Rabun's Tucker Buchanan in the semifinals.

Guild punched his ticket to the finals by scoring a 14-4 major La Douceur pinned Abercrombie decision over Banks County senior Roman Haynes.

County junior Colby Shaw in the Cody pinned Walker in the 195 170 finals after pinning Rabun's consolation finals. Rabun junior Celton Littrell in the semis.

Banks County senior Jacob Voyles defeated Clark in the 120 finals after Fannin's Cooper Moreland was pinned by Clark in the semis. At 138, Fannin junior Taylor Collis needed overtime to edge Smith-Foot in an intense four-round battle.

Smith-Foot reached the finals with a pinfall victory over Banks' Jaxon Mitchell.

"Our fans tonight were awesome," Byers said. "It was really awesome to see some new faces from Union County that made the trip to support us."

Legatt pinned Banks' Aucy Jacobs in the semifinals but dropped an 8-4 decision to Fannin County junior Drake Cantrell in the 145 finals. Banks County sophomore Christian Lee pinned Whisenhunt at 182. Whisenhunt reached the finals by way of a pinfall victory over Rabun's Evan Hooper.

In the consolation finals, Rotko pinned Rabun County freshman Rodolfo Ramos at 132 lbs. following a consolation win over RMA's Caleb Baker. Earlier in the day, Banks' Danny Evans recorded a pinfall over Rotko in the semifinal round.

Lance pinned Riverside Military Academy (RMA) junior Zach Miller at 220 after falling to Miller via pinfall during the opening round.

RMA sophomore Armand in the 126 consols and Fannin junior Tristan Siler pinned Lee Phillips pinned Fannin at 152. Rabun sophomore Justin Elijah Bryner pinned Smith in the heavyweight consolation semifinals.

The Panthers continued building momentum for the future, topping last year's program-defining performance when Union County won its first Area Championship (heavyweight Eli Smith-Foot) and qualified a thenschool record 10 wrestlers for the 2021 State Sectionals.

We're heading in the right direction, we've placed at every tournament this year and I'm very pleased with how we did today, Byers said.

Union finished third in the team standings behind first-place Banks County and runner-up Fannin County. Rabun County came in fourth and RMA placed

Shelby Agacinski and Brooke Kennedy did not compete at Area after receiving an automatic berth into the girls' State Sectionals tourney.





Union hangs on vs. Banks County, struggles late in loss at Elbert County

The Union County men (9-12, 2-4) picked up a critical Region 8-AA victory over Banks County, rallying from 12 down, then holding off the Leopards down the stretch in a Tuesdaynight home court thriller.

Later in the week, the Panthers went ice cold in the fourth quarter, eventually falling short during a 54-51 loss at Elbert County where Union missed a pair of potential game-tying 3-pointers in the final 11 seconds.

The loss to Elbert County eliminates the Panthers from the No. 2 seed in next week's Region 8-AA tournament. However, Union can still clinch the No. 3 seed outright with home wins over last-place Riverside and Elbert County. By finishing third, the Panthers decrease their odds of facing eighth-ranked Rabun County in Tiger to open the post-

Even with a split this week. Union County can still finish tied for third by defeating RMA on Tuesday and losing to Elbert on Thursday, should Banks County drop its season-finale visit to Rabun County. If the chips fall in that order with Union and Banks tied, a coin toss would determine third and fourth in the region tournament.

Panthers 60, Banks **County 55 -** In a similar fashion as last month's visit to Homer, Union County fell into a 12-point hole during the first quarter, only to storm back and regain the lead in the second. But this time, the Panthers held on down the stretch courtesy of 47 combined points from seniors Landon Kight (24) and Austin Taylor (23).

"We knew we had to stay focused and keep executing, said Taylor when asked about his team's mindset after falling behind 15-3 during the opening minutes. "We've been in that situation before, so it wasn't anything new for us. We knew what we had to do."

Spurred on by an electric home crowd, Union County found itself clinging to a 50-48 lead just beyond the midway point of the fourth when senior Lake Hughes broke a string of four-straight misses from long distance to furnish the Panthers a 5-point advantage. Taylor stretched the margin to 54-48 with a 1-for-2 trip to the line at the 2:37 mark,

Following a Banks County miss, the Panthers failed to connect on two free throws, then they made matters worse by committing the cardinal sin of fouling a 3-point shooter with a 4-point lead. Fortunately, the Leopards shooter missed 2 of 3 at the line with 29 seconds remaining and Kight made 2 of 2 to put the finishing touches on his 24-point, 10-rebound double-double.

A Banks County dribbledrive kept the visitors within three at 58-55, but Taylor soon put the game out of reach, hitting two free throws with 9 seconds to play.

Taylor finished the contest with a career-high 23 points and two steals on 6-of-12 shooting from downtown. But according to the senior guard, sinking fivestraight free throws during crunch time is what he will cherish most about the performance. 'The free throws are defi-

nitely what I'll remember most my first two shots; but then I hit about tonight," he said. "I just want our team to win. I don't care what it takes; I want the win."

In the early going, fellow but Banks answered with a trey senior Landon Kight sparked the quarter surge.

Fortunately, Kight and Taylor were still available.

Kight sank two free throws and Taylor knocked down consecutive 3s to put Union back on top 42-39, just shy of the 3:30 mark. But Union still found itself trailing 43-42 with under 30 seconds left in the frame when Kight went back to work down low, putting his team out front at quarter's end, 44-43.

Kight started the fourth with a layup and Taylor answered two Banks County free throws with his sixth triple of the night for a 49-45 advantage. The Leopards hit 1-of-2 at the free throw line with 5:15 remaining and Kight split a pair 10 seconds later. Then on its ensuing possession, Banks County converted a dribble-drive to pull within a deuce at 50-48.

Hughes finished with 6 points and three boards in just 21 minutes of action. Ellis had 3 points and three assists; senior Caleb John dished out a game-high six assists to go with four rebounds and 2 points. Underwood added 2 points, two rebounds and a steal. Henry dished out four assists and hauled in three rebounds.

Despite not filling up the stat sheet (one rebound in five minutes) sophomore Braylen Rader (+2 in the plus/minus metric) provided a solid defensive presence off the bench during the third quarter while foul trouble thinned the Union backcourt.

Union made 19 of 44 (43%) from the field and 9 for 27 (33%) from 3-point range. Banks hit 22

(32%) from deep. The Panthers sank 13 of 20 (65%) at the foul line while Banks struggled at 5 for 13 (39%). Banks out-rebounded

Union 27-22 and outscored the

Panthers 28-20 in the paint. The Panthers committed just seven turnovers while Banks County turned it over 11 times. Panthers 51, Elbert County 54 - Trailing 51-49 with

just under 4 minutes to play, Ellis chased down a Hughes miss on the perimeter and found a lane to the basket where he tied the game with a right-handed scoop layup. Unfortunately, Union County would go scoreless over

the final 3:50, culminating in a 54-51 loss at 8-AA's second-place Elbert County. After Union failed to con-

nect in the paint, the Blue Devils grabbed the lead for good on a go-ahead layup with 3:01 remaining. Both offenses exchanged turnovers but Union coughed up the basketball once again at the 1:30 mark. The defense would force a much-needed stop, but the Panthers handed possession back to Elbert when they threw the ball out-of-bounds on a pick-and-roll

Still on top 21-14 entering the second, the Panthers were the victims of a 9-0 run that moved the home team back in front 23-Elbert would outscore Union County 7-5 the rest of the way to hold a 30-26 halftime advantage.

Looking up at a 32-26 third-quarter deficit, the Panthers stormed back into the lead at 37-35, courtesy of an 11-3 run that helped Union maintain a 40-39 edge heading into the fourth. The lead was short-lived as Elbert seized a 45-42 margin less than 45 seconds into the frame, but Ellis scored the next 5 points and Union regained the advantage, 47-45.

Ellis' five-point swing began with a 22-footer from the top of the circle, followed by two free throws with 6:21 to play. On the ensuing possession, Elbert jumped back in front, converting an andone after scoring on a putback with 5:51 remaining. The Blue Devils eventually extended their lead to 50-47 before Kight stopped the bleeding with a jump-hook in

Later, Elbert County sank 1 of 2 at the foul line for a 51-49 score at the 4:11 mark.

Ellis led the way with a game-high 21 points on 4-of-7 shooting from long distance. The freshman grabbed four rebounds. dished out two assists and picked up two steals.

Kight notched another double-double, scoring 11 points with 12 boards. He also recorded three assists and blocked two shots.

Lady Panthers rout Banks County, have no answer for No. 2 Elbert

Hunter in reach of Candace Williams' UCHS career scoring record

The Union County Lady Panthers (12-9, 2-3) secured thirdplace in next week's Region 8-AA tournament with a 64-51 home victory vs. Banks County on Tuesday, Feb. 1.

However, Union's chances of overtaking second-ranked Elbert County for 8-AA's No. 2 seed were dealt a significant blow during Friday's 71-43 road loss to the Blue Devils.

Senior Ava Hunter finished with 20 points in the win over Banks but was limited to just 9 points at Elbert County, giving her 1,479 points for her career. With at least five games remaining (two regular-season games, two region tourney games and one at State), Hunter needs 122 points to match Candace Williams' UCHS scoring record of 1,601 points.

Over five contests, Hunter would need to average 24.4 points a game to match Williams. Hunter's per-game average drops to 20.3 should Union County win a state playoff game. She is currently averaging 19.2 points a game on the year.

Williams, a 2009 UCHS graduate, went on to play at the University of Georgia and is believed to be the only Panther or Lady Panther to score in the NCAA Tournament.

In the first round of the

upcoming Class AA State tourney, the Lady Panthers will meet an opponent from 6-AA - a region that doesn't feature a top-10 squad. At the moment, Pace Academy (12-6 overall) and Lovett (16-7) sit atop the 6-AA standings. According to the *MaxPreps* power rankings, Union County has faced the thirdtoughest schedule among the top 30 teams in Class AA. Meanwhile, Lovett has faced the weakest schedule and Pace Academy has seen the second-weakest schedule among the top 30.

Lady Panthers 64, Banks County 51 - Union County seized control and never looked back following a 29-10 second frame that opened up a 45-22 halftime advantage.

The Lady Panthers shot 11 for 15 in the second quarter while hitting 5 of 6 from 3-point territory. Ariel McCarter posted a career-high in the first half, scor-

ing 19 points on five treys. The freshman guard finished with 19 points, two rebounds, two steals and one assist.

Hunter scored 11 of her game-high 20 in the second half with eight rebounds, four blocks, four steals and three assists. Sophomore Lara Turner added 15 points (11 in the second quarter), four rebounds and three steals.

Trailing 6-1 right off the bat, Union County used an 11-2 run to grab the lead for good during the first quarter. On top 16-12 to start the second, Turner scored the first 7 points of the quarter to supply most of the heavy lifting during a 12-0 run that built a 28-12 advantage. McCarter sank four treys

in the second frame - her fourth resulting in the Lady Panthers' largest lead of the night at 45-20 with 27 seconds remaining before The contest wasn't all

Union County as Banks County attempted to spark a rally via a 10-0 run to begin the third, trimming the margin to 45-32 at the 3:25 mark of the quarter. Hunter halted the run with 6-straight points as the Lady Panthers maintained a comfortable 51-35 advantage to begin the fourth.

The Leopards knocked down a trey to start the final frame, but a short jumper by Turner and two free throws from Chambers

kept Union in control, eventually triggering a 9-1 run that stretched the Lady Panthers' margin to 62-42 near the 3-minute mark.

Junior Corinne Hill finished with 6 points, four rebounds and three assists. Chambers added 4 points, five rebounds and two assists. Sophomore Morgan Warren pulled down two rebounds.

Union County finished 6 of 12 (50%) from long distance and 22 for 48 (46%) overall. Banks went 18 for 53 (34%) overall and 2 for 12 (17%) from deep. The Lady Panthers made 14 of 16 (88%) at the foul line; Banks County went 13 for 20 (65%).

Rebounds were even at 31 apiece and the Leopards held a 32-30 advantage in points in the paint. Union committed 14 turnovers while Banks County gave it up 10 times. Lady Panthers 43, No.

2 Elbert County 71 - Elbert County closed the first with a 23-6 onslaught following a brief 3-2 Union County advantage via a McCarter triple 70 seconds into Trailing 25-9 to start the

Union out-rebounded Elbert 41-38 but the Blue Devils owned the paint by a 38-16 scoring margin. The Lady Panthers turned it over 22 times while Elbert

coughed it up nine times. **Up next:** Union County will host Rabun Gap at 6 p.m. Tuesday and will host Elbert County at 4:30 p.m. Thursday in a game rescheduled from Feb. 11.

The Lady Panthers could still force a tie for second with a win on Thursday combined with an Elbert loss to No. 1 Rabun. If the region plays out that way, a coin toss would determine the No. 2 seed, but Union's first-round opponent (Elbert) wouldn't change.
