## **Station 13 Update**

Union County Fire Department broke ground on a new career fire station back in September of 2022. This new station will be Station No. 13 and is located at the Hidden Harbor entrance on Highway 129 North, also known as the Murphy Hwy. This location was chosen due to the increased call volume and the ISO (Insurance Services Organization) rating for some homes and businesses in that specific area. The location will

Construction is well underway. The pad was completed, the walls are up, and the roof has been completed. Work is being done to finish laying the



The new station will be a career station, meaning that there will be career firefighters at the station 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year to respond to calls in that area. These calls range from medical emergencies, motor vehicle accidents, rescues, searches, hazardous materials, all fires, and other various emergencies. The career firefighters will be part of and support the volunteer firefighters who operate the three volunteer stations in the north The station is also designed to house an ambulance and crew

if the Union General Ambulance Service desires to place an ambulance in that station. We have also included office space and access for the Union County Sheriff's Office deputies who may be working in that area. This design enables the station to be a public safety station and not just a fire station. The fire station will be the third career station, joining Sta-

tion 1 in Blairsville and Station 5 in Suches. This will provide more career firefighters for any major fire or emergency. Having a fire station in that area may reduce the ISO rating for some home and business owners. We are excited to see the progress of this station and look forward to including it in our operations.

Indiana Jones traveled the world and faced treacherous situations to accomplish his purpose. So did Bob Pierce, only he's not fictitious. Pierce's purpose was simple: to tell people who Jesus is. His method was practical compassion - meeting people at their point of need, hoping to earn their permission to talk about Jesus.

Pierce was a contemporary of Billy Graham. They were both involved in Youth for Christ as young men. Pierce went on to found Samaritan's Purse. He was a mentor to Franklin Graham who succeeded Pierce at that organization. "I never dreamed of the impact Bob would vision that he had."

Pierce lived as a broken man who prayed. A lot. You'll understand what I mean by broken with this favorite prayer of his: "Let my heart be broken by the things that break the heart of God." When God answered that prayer, Pierce acted. "He firmly believed that when God burdened his heart with a deep need, Franklin Graham said, "he was not to rest until he had done something about it - regardless the cost."

During the Lebanese civil war in the 1970s, Pierce traveled to support pastor Sami Dagher. Pierce was within a month of losing his battle with leukemia. After the church service, the shelling began again. Travel being too risky, Dagher stayed with Pierce in his hotel room. "That was the most unusual, inspiring night I have ever known," Dagher said. "Bob prayed all night long! Hour after hour, as he prayed for people I didn't know as well as people under fire that night, the presence of God was so real I didn't dare close my eyes. I just lay at the feet of this man who was dying...and knew how to die.'

Richard Halverson, the former Chaplain of the U.S. Senate, also knew Pierce well. "Bob Pierce functioned from a broken heart," Halverson wrote. "It was absolutely uncanny how he would manage to be at a place of crisis when it occurred." That was probably due to another of Pierce's favorite prayers. "Lord, I give you license to interfere in my life and plans at any time, in any way, at any cost to me."

#### Q. What is Adult Protective Services?

A. Adult Protective Services (APS) programs promote the safety, independence, and quality-of-life for vulnerable adults who are, or are in danger of, being abused, neglected by self or others, or financially exploited, and who are unable to protect themselves. APS is a social service program authorized by law in every state to receive and investigate

tect the victims to the extent possible. In Georgia, Adult Protective Services (APS) is the state entity charged with investigating all reports of abuse, neglect, and/or exploitation of older

persons (65+) or an adult (18+) with a disability who do not reside in long-term care facilities pursuant to the Disabled Adults and Elder Persons Protection Act, O.C.G.A. §§ 30-5-1, et seq.

Q. Who pays for this service? Who funds the organiza-

A. Adult Protective Services is part of the Georgia Department of Human Services Division of Aging Services. It is paid for by the State of Georgia.

## Q. What can Adult Protective Services do for an elderly

A. Adult Protective Services supports exploited older people or adults with disabilities in sharing information, solving problems, and improving the quality of services for these victims of elder and vulnerable adult mistreatment. Some types of elder abuse addressed includes physical abuse, mental, emotional, or verbal abuse, sexual abuse, neglect, self-neglect, or financial exploitation. Adult Protective Services receives reports of alleged abuse. neglect, self-neglect or financial exploitation and determines if the client is eligible. It investigates the allegations through interviewing the client, collateral contacts, alleged abuser(s) and through the examination of evidence such as medical and bank records. It addresses emergency needs for food, shelter or law enforcement

needs through services such as medical or mental health treat-See Paris, page 5A

protection. It determines whether abuse is occurring or not. If it is

not, the case is closed. If it is, develops a case plan, with the cli-

ent, to stop the abuse, and to address the client's health and safety

Dear Editor,

I was heartened to read two recent pieces noting that religion (specifically christian religion as espoused by a frequently published contributor) seems to get more than its share of ink on the Opinions page. In my opinion, a newspaper that already dedicates two full pages to local churches (along with numerous articles that, on a regular basis, explicitly or implicitly embrace conservative christian ideas) already has more than enough religion for most readers.

The oft-cited First Amendment specifically protects the rights of citizens to practice the religion of their choice. At the same time it prohibits the state from favoring or supporting a particular religion at the expense of all others. I encourage the editor of the North Georgia News to follow this example by letting the Opinions page be a place where issues of interest and importance to all residents (roads, taxes, education, etc.) are discussed and debated. Those who feel a need to proselytize have more than enough freedom and protections to do so elsewhere.

#### **The Abortion Pill**

Dear Editor.

What a year 2022 was as we witnessed monumental progress in the fight against abortion. Roe v. Wade was overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court returning the responsibility for legislation of abortion laws back to the individual states. In our State of Georgia, the Heartbeat Law was enacted which makes abortion illegal after a baby has a detectable heartbeat, usually by 5-6 weeks gestation.

With progress often comes challenges as we are seeing at the Georgia Mountain Pregnancy Center Medical here in Blairsville, and as are being seen at other pregnancy centers across our state and nation. In states like ours where abortion laws have greatly reduced the time limits for legal abortion, or have outlawed it altogether, abortion-minded women are focusing their attention on the abortion pill. Before the laws changed, most women had time to seek information and assistance from pregnancy centers before making their decision. They were able to have an ultrasound and see the life growing inside them, often changing hearts to choose life. Now, with stricter time limits imposed, many women are fearful of running out of time. They aren't taking time to process their options, but instead, they are going straight for the abortion pill, bypassing the pregnancy centers all together.

You have probably seen in the news that CVS, Walgreens, and other pharmacies are offering the abortion pills with a prescription from a licensed provider. Abortion pills are also easily obtained from abortion clinics and abortion providers as well as over the internet. Over the

Papa's younger brother Clay was a young man who enjoyed life. He was the smallest of Lon Cummings' sons. Clay loved being around other people and he enjoyed laughter. Whenever a crowd was gathered and you could hear laughter, there was a good chance Clay was in

the middle of the group telling one of Lon Cum-

mings raised two girls and four boys in a three bedroom house on the hill



overlooking Cummings Creek. Mabel and Inez slept in one room while Pick, Papa, Clay and Poggy slept in another room. Pick and Poggy slept in one feather bed while Papa and Clay slept in another. One evening in late summer an event occurred that effected Papa for the rest of his life.

The boys had worked out an order of cross ties for Lon. The railroad between Hamilton and Phil Campbell was being worked on and Lon had secured the contract for 30 miles of cross ties. The boys worked at the sawmill for 10 hours a day of milling cross ties. This was a bog order and they'd been working for weeks while trying The next day they would be making their

usual delivery of the cross ties to the railroad. Poggy was the youngest of the boys, and he was so tired that he fell asleep while eating supper that evening. He dozed off and his face fell right into his mashed potatoes. All four of the young men collapsed into bed that evening. Papa said he was beyond tired and his sleep was filled with crazy dreams. The last dream he remembered was of him being robbed. And it scared him plenty. He said, "The dream was so real, and

then all of a sudden the robber reached out and grabbed me by the neck and began to choke me. I began to kick and scream for help, and then the two of us rolled off the bluff and under a big rock. The fearful part was that he never let go of my neck." Actually, Clay had an epileptic seizure and was choking Papa. The two boys had rolled off their bed and then wound up under-

Upon hearing the commotion Lon had run into the room and with Uncle Pick's help pulled Clay and Papa from under the bed. His grasp of my grandfather's neck was strong enough to require both Lon's and Pick's strength to break him free. The young man's neck was bruised for days. After which he was always afraid of being in a tight place due to his experience under the bed. Clay's epileptic seizures would plague him intermittently over the next several years.



## **Soil Testing**

Soil testing is a very important part of growing a quality crop, having a good-looking garden, having a quality lawn, or a good pasture. Soil testing gives you an insider look at what is going on in your soil. Even though it's only February now is a good time to think about soil

testing and prepping the soil. Let's take a look at what a soil test can do for you and why it's a good idea to have your soil tested.



If you have a garden at your house it's a good idea to have your soil tested every other year. A soil test will show you the pH, phosphorus, potassium, calcium, magnesium, zinc, and manganese levels in your soil. These are essential elements for plant growth. Nitrogen is also a very important nutrient for plant growth. However, nitrogen is very mobile in the soil. Therefore, you could test your

in the soil could be drastically different. pH is often the most limiting factors when it comes to growing plants in the mountains. A soil test will tell you the pH and the recommended lime to bring that pH up to an acceptable level for the plants. Any lime that is added to soil will take 3-6 months to fully take effect. That means for spring plantings, now is a good time to take a soil test and begin adding lime.

soil and by the time that you receive your soil

results back from the lab the amount of nitrogen

When taking a sample for your lawn, a depth of 4 inches is appropriate. If you're taking a sample for gardens, ornamentals, mixed fruit trees, and wildlife plots sample to a depth of 6-8 inches. You can use a spade or a soil probe. When you take the sample it's best to take multiple samples from around the plot that you are interested in. This way you'll get an average of the area that you're sampling and a better representative sample. Using a trowel or small shovel. take 8-10 samples and mix them together in a bucket. From that bucket take the sample that you'll bring into the Extension office so that we can send it to the UGA labs. Make sure that you get enough soil so that the lab can test properly. About 2 cups of soil is needed.

If you're sampling from an area that has mulch or grass on top of it push that material away so that you penetrate down to the soil. Pull out any rock or roots that you get with the soil sample and throw them away. When you take the sample, spread the wet/damp soil on a newspaper and let the soil air out overnight before bringing it in to the office, so that it dries down some.

When deciding how many samples you need to take, look at the area and determine how many different types of conditions you have.

ment, housing assistance, legal assistance, financial assistance, personal care, and home delivered meals.

Q. What is meant by the term "self-neglect?"

A. Vulnerable adults who neglect themselves are unwilling or unable to do needed self-care. This can include such things as 1) Not eating enough good to the point of malnourishment; 2) Wearing clothes that are dirty, torn, or not suited for the weather; 3) Living in dirty, unsanitary, or hazardous conditions; or 4) Not getting needed medical care.

#### O. How does Adult Protective Services work? If I call them, what happens?

A. Each situation is different, so a decision is made once the specific condition/ abuse is investigated. For persons living in the community, Georgia law requires mandatory reporting of suspected abuse, neglect or exploitation by certain professionals who are mandated reporters. Mandated Reporters include physicians and other hospital or medical personnel. Mandated reporters must make a report

when they have a reasonable cause to believe that 1) an atrisk adult has had an injury or injuries inflicted upon them by a caretaker or 2) has been neglected or exploited by a care-

Q. What is the difference between a welfare check and Adult Protective Ser-

A. A welfare check, also known as a wellness check, is when police stop by a person's home to make sure they are okay. Requests for welfare checks are made by friends, family, and neighbors, typically after someone unexpectedly stops answering their phone or getting in touch with others. This is very different from a report to Adult Protective Services where State entities receive and investigate reports of elder or vulnerable adult maltreatment. However, a welfare check could possibly lead to a report to Adult Protective Ser-

If you need to report vulnerable adult maltreatment, please call 1-866-522-4464. If someone is in immediate danger, please call 911.

internet, a woman just fills out a medical questionnaire online, submits payment, and someone in another country writes a prescription. The pills are then mailed to her home from pharmacies in countries like India or China. There is no lawful regulation or oversight to abortion pills obtained over the internet making the process even more dangerous than it already is for women seeking an abortion. She gets no counseling, no education on what to expect during the process, and no ultrasound to assure she doesn't have an ectopic pregnancy, which is when a fertilized egg attaches outside the uterus, and if untreated, may lead to lifethreatening bleeding.

As you can see, abortion pills are very dangerous, and yet this is not something the pharmaceutical companies, abortion providers, our government, and the media are willing to tell women or society. Instead, they say abortion pills are safe and effective, and women may just experience a little cramping and bleeding like during their menstrual period. The true reality is, abortion pills put a woman into fullblown labor, and the pain and bleeding she experiences are often severe, so severe sometimes that she will hemorrhage, losing over half of her body's blood volume, maybe leading to death but certainly requiring emergency medical treatment. Sometimes, the abortion is not complete, and she will require a surgical procedure to remove her dead baby. These women suffer trauma upon trauma.

But we know that we serve a mighty God who desires for life to be preserved (Psalm 139:13-16, ESV), and we will not be shaken! We will continue to stand and fight to rescue babies and their mothers from the evils of abortion. That is why we are both excited and hopeful to share information with vou about abortion pill reversal. You may not have known that it is possible for an abortion to be reversed. Praise our mighty God because yes, it is possible in many instances. If a woman takes the first of the two abortion pills and then regrets her decision, fearing she has made a mistake, she can seek assistance from the Abortion Pill Reversal Network. This network will connect her with a physician who will review her case, and if she meets medical criteria, will start her on a hormone called progesterone which can block and counteract the actions of the first abortion pill. #### January Net Tax Revenues Up 1.1 Percent The State of Georgia's when Individual Tax collec-

net tax collections for January totaled nearly \$2.99 billion for an increase of \$32.9 million, or 1.1 percent, compared to January 2022 when net tax collections totaled \$2.95 billion. Year-to-date, net tax collections totaled roughly \$18.81 billion for an increase of almost \$1 billion, or 5.6 percent, compared to FY 2022 when revenues totaled \$17.81 billion at the end of January 2022.

The changes within the following tax categories help further explain January's overall net tax revenue increase:

Individual Income Tax: Individual Income Tax collections decreased by a total of roughly \$70.1 million, or -4 percent, compared to last year

tions totaled \$1.74 billion.

The following notable components within Individual Income Tax combine for the net decrease:

Individual Income Tax refunds issued (net of voided checks) increased by \$98.4 million, or 198.4 percent.

Individual Withholding payments increased by \$92.9 million, or 7.4 percent, over January 2022.

İndividual Income Tax Estimated payments were down \$26.2 million, or -7.6 percent, from FY 2022.

All other Individual Tax categories, including Non-Resident Tax payments, were down a combined \$38.4 million.

Each soil test costs \$10. For example, if you have a low lying spot, a steep slope, and a wooded area, each one of these would need a unique soil sample done. When you receive the results from the lab they will have recommendations for you based on the types of plants that you have or plan to have.

more sit-down chain restaurants for some variety. A 90minute drive to dinner is tough to swallow.

3. Religious letters. Speaking of co-existing, freedom of religion, by definition, \*includes\* freedom FROM religion.
