Terry Rogers to be inducted into GADA Class of 2019 Hall of Fame

It's difficult to quantify the accomplishments of Union County's native son Terry

The man is a legend in these parts, no doubt. His legacy, however, reflects a much broader influence than just his many years spent leading the

Rogers has held several leadership positions in the National Organization of Coaches Association Directors, including president and vice

Statewide, he served in a variety of roles with the Georgia Athletic Coaches Association, which he led as president in 2003 and as executive director from 2008 to 2016.

He also sat on the executive committee of the Georgia High School Association for more than 20 years, and he served as Nike Coach of the Year Clinic Director in Atlanta for

here, played football here and graduated from here, so his return to Union County Schools truly was a homecoming for Rogers. During his career, Rogers


was responsible for starting several sports programs at the High School, including tennis, soccer and cross country, and he reinstated other programs, like softball and track. Rogers also coached

Every duck hunter knows that the most crucial aspect of the sport is being able to attract waterfowl close enough to bag

That means a duck hunter must be able to master duck calling. And to master duck calling, the hunter must have an instrument known as a "duck

"It's a call that you have to make out of wood, acrylic or just about any kind of material," said Blairsville native Mark Rogers, who now lives in Johnson City, Tennessee, where he works for the local power company. "They have a reed in them and a sound board that's what makes the sound

Rogers compared the duck call to a wind instrument, noting that "it takes that kind of musical talent to be able to run

a duck call properly.' "The custom call makers, they have lists, and they close

Nelms talks fixed charge; EMC **Board welcomes students in meeting**

In the Feb. 11 regular meeting of the Blue Ridge Mountain EMC Board of Directors, EMC General Manager Jeremy Nelms addressed a member's concerns about an upcoming rate redesign that would result in increases to the residential customer charge

The member shared his concerns with the North Georgia News via a letter to the editor published in the Feb. 6 edition of the newspaper. Specifically, the member

wanted EMC leadership to reconsider any plans moving forward that would include significantly raising the customer charge that appears on member bills.

As previously reported, Nelms told the board in the January meeting that the coop's rate consultant had recently completed an updated cost of service study.

Currently, the fixed charge portion of each residential customer's bill, aka the customer charge, is right at \$21.37. See EMC, Page 2A
