Payton Legatt's drive rewarded with State title

Six Panthers among top-four at State Championships; Union second overall

Macon - Headlined by Payton Legatt's 157-lb state title -- the program's first -- and three runner-up finishes, Union County placed second overall at last weekend's GHSA Class AA State Championships. Legatt's path to the pro-

gram's first state title culminated with a 6-0 decision over Berrien County's Matthew Lopez by way of two takedowns in the first four minutes. "I'd like to thank my dad

(assistant coach Jim Legatt) and my teammates for giving me the drive to get here, but most importantly, I want to thank my Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ," Payton Legatt said.

After knocking off Lopez in the Sectional semifinals a week earlier, Payton Legatt believes the familiarity with his opponent worked in his favor. 'We both knew what the

other one likes to do, so it could make a match tighter, but it can also benefit one guy or the other," he said. "I studied him so I knew his moves and knew what I could do [against him]. "It did help that we had to

compete in the harder sectional tournament, so that gave me more confidence walking into

Payton Legatt, who didn't surrender a point during his three matches in Macon, scored a 9-0 semifinal decision over Westside-Augusta's Jeanarion Kamga. Payton Legatt (52-2) opened the tournament with a pinfall over Haralson County's Zack Sanders after building a

Last year, Payton Legatt entered the State Championships as one of the favorites to win it all, but suffered an upset loss in the semis before finishing third. However, the disappointment of his sophomore at the same time it was just an-rolling.

But after Union County dropped its first three championship bouts on Saturday, Payton Legatt did admit to feeling some pressure knowing he was

Looking ahead to next season, Legatt could see himself competing at 157 lbs or 165 lbs. But one thing's for certain, he won't be resting on his laurels as a senior in 2025.

"There's going to be a lot of work and a lot of hours on the mat and in the gym," Payton Legatt said, who was already back in the gym less than 24 hours removed from his state title. "I was thinking about adding some muscle then cutting down some, but I'm hoping to [add some weight] and possibly wrestle at 165.

When the dust settles on 2024 and he has time to reflect, the one thing Legatt will remember most is the time he spent with his teammates.

"Before mid-week practices, when we had our 6 a.m. workouts, it was just the guys sitting around cutting up," Payton Legatt said. "We still found time to have fun despite the grind, and that's the beauty of the sport -- the comradarie. Wrestling isn't just a sport, it's a way of life.'

Panthers' rally falls short in Region 8-AA Championship

Union County hosts ELCA on Wednesday in Class AA first round

Union County (21-6) came up a basket short of its first region title in 43 years, falling 63-61 to Athens Academy in Saturday's 8-AA Championship Game when Houston Henry's off-balance 30-footer missed at the buzzer.

'There were so many things that happened that were within our control and so many that weren't in our control,' Union County head coach Corev Garrett said. "I've gone back and thought about it, and after we made it a 2-point game, we had missed layups and gave up offensive rebounds."

The Panthers never led in Saturday's clash between 8-AA's top-two seeds, trailing 20-8 after a quarter and 36-22 during the second.

Junior Jude Ellis, who topped 1,000 career points during his team-high 23-point performance, sparked the Union rally with four 3-pointers during the second period, trimming the halftime deficit to 38-30.

The Panthers' secondhalf rally began with a Henry dribble-drive off a hustle rebound, then Ellis surpassed 1K with a corner-3, followed by a pair of free throws for a 40-37 deficit at the 5-minute mark. "Athens hadn't been able

to figure out our 1-3-1 (defense) in two years but they just attacked us and played downhill," Garrett said. "It was when we switched to man that we made it a ball game." After a Spartans buck-

et, Hayden Hughes made it a 2-point game with a triple, but that's as close as Union would get until the fourth quarter.

Athens grew its lead to 49-42 until Kaden Combs' bucket made it a 5-point contest heading to the final frame.

Hughes opened the fourth with a trey, and Ellis tied the game with a fast-break layup



Looking back, [with two fouls to give] we should have probably fouled immediately. 
