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Basketball: Panthers second at 8-AA tourney, host State on Wednesday

Seniors deliver in crunch-time, propel Union past Elbert in Region semifinals

Tiger - The Union County men advanced to the program's first region title game in 21 years with a thrilling 74-71 victory over Elbert County on Thursday, Feb. 17. Unfortunately, the Panthers (12-13) were denied in their bid to end a 41-year region championship drought, suffering a 64-44 loss on Friday to tournament-host Rabun County.

On the heels of last week's region runner-up performance, Union County will host a firstround State playoff game on Wednesday, Feb. 23, facing 6-AA's third-seeded Lovett (16-11) at 6 p.m.

Panthers 74, Elbert County 71 - With Union County trailing 71-70 during the final half-minute of last Thursday's Region 8-AA semifinal, senior Landon Kight delivered on both ends of the floor to propel the Panthers to victory. First, Kight dropped in a go-ahead layup with 25 seconds on the clock, then he picked off an errant Blue Devils' pass on the defensive end, allowing senior Lake Hughes to sink a pair of free throws and extend the margin to 74-71 with six seconds

Coming out of a timeout, Elbert County inbounded the ball to its speedy point guard Christian Harris, who weaved through the Panthers' defense and pulled up from 28-feet where his doubleclutch shot bounced harmlessly

"We're a senior-heavy team and we were determined to host a [state] playoff game, and there was no way we were going to be denied," Kight said after the game.

Pacing Union was a balanced scoring attack that featured four players in double figures. Senior All-Region selection Caleb John scored 14 of his team-high 16 points in the second half, and freshman Jude Ellis had nine of his 13 during the first quarter.

Junior Eli Underwood poured in 10 of his 12 points before halftime, shooting 5 of 6 from the field and 2 of 2 from long distance. Meanwhile, Kight's day ended with a career-high 15 rebounds, 10 points and three

One week removed from Devils to close out the regular season, Union County immediately picked up where they left off, using a 10-0 run to close the first frame and seize control at

Underwood checked into the contest and supplied the Panthers with 10 second-quarter points. His first 3-point basket awarded Union its largest lead of the game -- a 29-17 advantage with 5:18 left in the period -while his second triple extended the margin to $32-2\dot{1}$ at the 4:25

Elbert answered with a pair of 3s, but senior Austin Taylor connected from downtown, pushing the Panthers' lead back to 35-27. Underwood's final basket of the half granted Union County a 39-30 advantage with 1:06 remaining until Elbert County employed a late 6-0 spurt that narrowed the gap to 39-36 at the intermission.

Third-quarter buckets by Kight and John kept the Panthers in front 43-38 when Elbert responded with another six-straight to race ahead 44-43 at the period's midway point. A basket from Hughes followed by John's second 3-pointer of the season and an Underwood putback helped build

Approaching the two-minute mark of the frame, Ellis found John under the basket for a layup and a 52-47 advantage, capping a 7-0 Panthers' run. Still ahead 57-53 following a Hughes 3-pointer, Union County couldn't secure an Elbert County miss to close the quarter, allowing the Blue Devils to convert an offensive board that sliced the margin in half as time

Union County stormed out of the fourth-quarter gates, opening up a 64-56 advantage with a pair of dribble drives by John that bookended an Ellis trey. But Elbert had an answer in the form of an 8-0 run that evened the score with 4:22 remaining while drawing a fourth foul on John in the process.

Kight stopped the Blue Devis' run with a bucket in the paint, but Elbert County continued attacking off the dribble to knot things up at the 3:40 mark. John split a pair of free throws 27 seconds later, and freshman Houston Henry turned a steal into a layup on the other end for a 69-66 lead.

Nursing a one-point edge a 27-point victory over the Blue with 1:16 remaining, Union the dribble penetration. County widened its cushion to 70-68 when Ellis hit 1 of 2 at the charity stripe, but Elbert County split a pair on the other end with a minute left. Following the miss on their second free throw attempt, the Blue Devils pulled down the offensive rebound and eventually grabbed a 71-70 lead with 55 seconds to play.

Union head coach Corey Garrett took a timeout in the frontcourt, and out of the break, Henry received the inbounds pass and proceeded to set up the play from the top of the key. John fielded a pass from Henry on the wing and the senior used a crossover dribble to advance into the paint where he drew a doubleteam, forcing a kick-out back to Henry. The Panthers' point guard quickly reversed the ball into the left corner where Hughes used a pump fake to get his defender into the air. Hughes attacked the baseline and dribbled left into the paint, weaving past a Blue Devils' low-post defender. As he attempted a left-handed layup, two weak-side help defenders immediately smothered Hughes, knocking the ball away in mid-air. As a result of the attention that Hughes' drive attracted, Kight was left all alone in the backside

post, and the senior scooped up the loose ball and dropped in a right-handed layup, putting Union County ahead for good.

"I saw Lake go up [for the shot] and I thought he was fouled, but somehow, Lord-willing, the ball just ended up in my hands and I knew I had to go up strong with it because we were down [71-70] at that point," Kight said, reflecting on the Panthers' final offensive series.

Garrett, meanwhile, broke down the go-ahead bucket from an x's and o's viewpoint.

'We wanted to get it into the post to Landon but Elbert did a good job being physical and not letting us get him the ball. But I told them, if the play gets blown up, go into our motion offense. We also knew that Elbert is very aggressive [defensively] and we could possibly take advantage of their help defense, and in the end, it worked out. We got a little lucky, but it worked."

Elbert County set up shop with under 18 seconds to play and immediately returned to its bread-and-butter. But this time around, they encountered a Panthers' defense well-prepared for

"On that last play, we into what I call a 'junk defense' because we'd been in a 2-3 (zone) the entire game and I knew [Elbert] would draw something up for the 2-3," Garrett said. "That [junk] defense was something we had worked on before and actually ran earlier in the game but it didn't look very good. But there at the end I thought we should go back to it, and it worked out perfectly because [Elbert] ended up throwing the ball right to us."

Harris took the inbounds pass and looked for a lane on the left side of the Union defense, but Hughes stayed in front of the Blue Devils' guard, and when he tried dishing to a teammate in the weak-side post, Kight stepped up from his defensive position under the basket to snag the pass.

"I had a good idea that [Harris] wasn't going to try and finish himself, so I stepped up into the passing lane and he threw the ball right to me," Kight said.

Following the turnover, Kight immediately escaped the congestion in the lane by dribbling to midcourt, where he passed ahead to Hughes for a potential layup. However, an Elbert defender disrupted the play with a hard foul from behind, send-

ing Hughes to the line with six seconds left.

After knocking down the two late free throws, Hughes' day ended with 7 points, four rebounds, one assist and a steal. Henry had a game-high six assists along with 8 points and two steals. Furthermore, Union's freshman point guard would lead all participants with a +11 plus/ minus metric despite battling foul trouble and sustaining a bloodied nose during the second half of the physical postseason match.

Taylor rounded out the Panthers' backcourt production with 8 points, two boards and

Elbert's Trustin Allen led all scorers with 17 points and three steals on 6-of-10 shooting. Jamil Burton added 13 points and five boards; Harris and Anjarius Henderson finished with 10 points apiece.

The Blue Devils shot an impressive 28 of 52 (54%) from the floor while Union County hit a not-too-shabby 26 of 54 (48%). The Panthers made up ground at the foul line and from 3-point range, sinking 14 of 16 (88%) at the charity stripe and 8 Elbert County hit 12 of 21 (57%) at the line and 3 of 13 (23%) at 50-34.

Overall, Union County controlled the boards at a 31-22 clip, but Elbert won points-inthe-paint by a 44-36 margin. The Blue Devils turned it over a dozen times compared to Union's 15

Panthers 44, Rabun County 64 - Union County's defense held Rabun County to a region-low scoring output and became the first opponent since Dec. 14 to hold the Wildcats under 66 points in Tiger; however, eighthranked Rabun delivered a remarkable defensive performance of its own - stymying the Panthers into their lowest offensive production since Dec. 10 (lost to Towns).

If I could go back and do that [Rabun] game over, I would do things the exact same way," Garrett said. "We held [McKay] to 12 points, it just so happened those other guys, who we knew were capable of hurting us, ended up really hurting us.'

During the early going of Friday's Region 8-AA title game, both offenses were clicking, especially from 3-point territory. Ellis and Henry answered a pair of Rabun County treys as Union

remained within a point at 11-10 in the first frame. But John went to the bench with two fouls and Rabun County built an 18-14 advantage after a quarter, eventually pushing its margin to 23-15 early

in the second. Henry sliced the deficit to six with a dribble drive, then Underwood and Taylor came off the bench to provide Union County a lift, beginning with an Underwood putback at the 3:42 mark of the half. Taylor connected from the corner to move the Panthers within one possession at 25-22 as the clock ticked under two-anda-half minutes. The Wildcats, however, responded with a 7-2 stretch that sent the top-seed into the locker room with a 32-24 advantage. Kight began the third with

a pair of buckets in the post to keep Union within a half-dozen. Later, John answered a Rabun 3 by converting an offensive board and Kight scored down low to slice the deficit to 39-32 with 3:35 left in the quarter. Things started to go south for the upset-minded Panthers when John collected his fourth foul near the three-minute mark. "We came in running our 2-3 defense and it did what we needed it to do, we just got overzealous at the end, which we had to do," Garrett said. "When we started falling behind, I told the guys to pick up the pressure, and

it seems like the more we picked it up, the more it opened things up for [Rabun].

But in that game, it just came down to not shooting the ball well and foul trouble. Those two things really hurt us, but at the same time, [Rabun County] played very well." Union's last gasp came

'I think Lovett is just as good as Rabun, and like I said, a little different. Most of their offense will come from their point guard, but they have some other guys that can shoot it and a little

"They're athletic, but that's not what scares me. They're very fundamentally sound and they shoot it very well. They're coming out of a very talented region, but I'm excited about it and that's what I'm telling the guys. We have a high-profile team coming to our place, and it's going to be a tough game, but it's also a very winnable game. These seniors have already cemented their legacy by playing for a region title after coming off an 0-14 season last year, but now they have a chance to take that legacy one step further by beating Lovett."

Union County to visit 6-AA champion Columbia in Tuesday's first round

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Tiger - The Union County Lady Panthers (12-13) dropped both of its region tourney matchups last week and will travel to Region 6-AA Champion Columbia (21-6) on Tuesday to open State competition as a


Meanwhile, Union County senior Ava Hunter earned her second-straight Region 8-AA Co-Player of the Year award following last Friday's title game. Entering the state playoffs, Hunter, who scored 33 and 26 in her two region tournament games, needs 26 points to equal Candace Williams' program record of 1,601 career points.

Lady Panthers 56, No. 2 Elbert County 76 - In last Thursday's opening round of the Region 8-AA Tournament, hosted by Rabun County, the third-seeded Lady Panthers met 2-seed Elbert County, who entered as the second-ranked team in Class AA. And despite falling into an 11-1 hole, Union County battled back to a 16-10 deficit at quarter's end behind ninecombined points from seniors Ava Hunter (5) and Rebekah Chambers (4).

Hunter cut Union's margin in half with a 3-pointer to start the second frame before Elbert scored six-in-a-row to mount a 22-13 advantage. Fifty seconds later. Hunter connected from deep one more time to keep the Lady Panthers within a half-dozen approaching the five-minute mark.

An offensive board by sophomore Sofia McNabb kept Union within single digits at 27-18 before five straight from the Blue Devils extended the difference to 32-18. After consecutive baskets by Hunter made it a 32-22 contest with 45 seconds left in the half, Elbert County countered with two buckets of its own to push the margin back to 14 entering the break.

The Blue Devils exited halftime on a 14-3 run that produced a 50-25 score at the 4:56 mark of the third. But Hunter answered with five straight, culminating with her third trey of the night, coming with 3:47 left in the period. A 3-pointer from freshman Ariel McCarter and a deuce by McNabb briefly cut the deficit to 54-35, but an Elbert County trey squashed any signs of life from the Lady

Hunter and Chambers Team All-Region honors. Hill, paced Union down the stretch, scoring the Lady Panthers' final 8 points; however, they didn't make up any ground and faced a 65-43 hole after three.

Hunter scored 8 points and McCarter added five to account for all of Union's fourthquarter scoring as Elbert advanced to the region finals with a 76-56 victory. The Blue Devils fell 47-40 to Rabun County in Friday's championship game despite entering the final two minutes locked in a 38-38 tie.

Hunter led all scorers with 33 points, 11 boards, two steals and two blocks vs. Elbert. Chambers added 10 points and three boards; McCarter had 8 points, six rebounds and two

McNabb finished with 4 points, four rebounds and two assists. Junior Corinne Hill had one point to go with a team-high three assists. Sophomore Lara Turner pulled down four rebounds and senior Caley Davis chipped in two assists.

Elbert hit 32 of 63 (51%) from the floor, 10 of 14 (71%) at the line and 5 of 9 (56%) from deep. Union County made 22 of 55 (40%) from the floor, 7 of 11 (64%) at the charity stripe and 5 of 12 (42%) from 3-point The Blue Devils out-

Lady Panthers 46, Banks County 48 - Union County learned the hard way how difficult it can be to defeat a team three times in one season following a consolation game loss to a squad it had previously knocked off by double digits on two separate occasions.

After leading 26-22 at the break, the Lady Panthers found themselves locked in a 36-36 tie entering the fourth. Union County would use a 7-3 spurt to begin the fourth and seize a 43-39 advantage, but the Leopards answered with a 3 to stay within a point near the midway point of the frame. A Hunter basket on the other end provided Union a 45-42 cushion, however, Banks County continued to keep pace, hitting a baseline jumper then pulling down the rebound following a Lady Panthers' missed

On the heels of a Leopards' timeout, McCarter forced a jump ball on the perimeter, handing possession back to Union County, who turned it over themselves via a traveling

The Leopards quickly attacked the low post, grabbing their first lead of the fourth period while drawing a foul on the made basket. Luckily for the Panthers, both shots were unsuccessful and McCarter secured the defensive board and advanced up the floor, where Union nearly turned it over on two occasions, forcing Coach Hunter into a timeout to reset the offense.

Union County went down low to Chambers and the senior post drew a Leopards' foul, sending her to the line for a 1-of-2 visit that evened the score at 46-46 with under 30 seconds

After Chambers missed the second shot, the Lady Panthers applied full-court pressure, forcing Banks County to throw the ball out of bounds, but the Leopards stripped the ball away from Union on the perimeter as the clock neared 10 seconds. As Banks dribbled up the floor, the Lady Panthers fouled the ball handler near midcourt, resulting in made two free throws with six seconds to play.

With time running out, Hunter's last-second heave from just inside halfcourt rattled in and out as the horn sounded on the Leopards' 48-46 upset

Hunter finished with 26 points, 12 rebounds and two steals. Chambers just missed a double-double with 8 points, 11 boards and three assists. Mc-Carter scored 7 points, grabbed six boards with three assists; Turner had 3 points and four rebounds. McNabb rounded out

Union County shot 17 of 51 (33%) from the floor and 1 of 10 (10%) from 3-point range. Banks hit 18-of-52 overall for 35% and 3 of 13 (23%) from downtown. The Lady Panthers made 11 of 18 (61%) at the line compared to Banks County's 9-of-15 (60%) day at the char-

The Leopards out-rebounded Union County 39-36 but were outscored 28-24 in the paint. The Lady Panthers turned it over 17 times; Banks County coughed it up 14 times.

Banks County junior Kamryn Grier had 19 points and 16 rebounds. Addison Hoard finished with 14 points on just 4-of-18 shooting but hit 5 of 6 at the line, including the two

Up next: Union County travels to Decatur on Tuesday to face Region 6-AA Champion Columbia. The Eagles are led by sophomore guard Nia Anderson and her 14 points, 8 rebounds and 5 steals per game. However, Columbia features a balanced scoring attack with five players averaging at least 8 points a game, including junior guard Tekiarah Jones, who averages 10 points and 4 steals. In the post, sophomore Keamaura Williams averages 9.7 points, 8 rebounds and 2 blocks per contest.

On the year, Columbia forces over 19 steals per game while Union averages 22 turnovers a night, but if the Lady Panthers can turn it into a halfthe scoring with 2 points and a court contest, the Eagles hit Tuesday night."




