Coach Robbins: Union soccer 'chomping at the bit' following postponements

Panthers thump Indians 5-0; Lady Panthers allow three second-half goals in 3-0 loss at Lumpkin

Dahlonega - After the 2020 season was cut short and the early stages of 2021 were littered with weather cancelations, Union County Soccer returned to the pitch for the first time in 352 days when they opened at Lumpkin County on Friday night.

But with an entire day's worth of rain already soaking the Lumpkin County High School playing surface and evening showers in the forecast, both Union County teams were unsure if they would even get a single game in before Region 8-AA competition opens on Tuesday at Banks County. Fortunately, Lumpkin gave the goahead around 1 p.m., providing the UCHS coaches and players a rare sigh of relief.

"Our guys have been chomping at the bit to play," said new Union County men's coach Chris Robbins after the win. "We were just anxious to get out here and get a match in. You can only practice so much before you have to be at game speed, and that goes for any sport.''

Panthers 5, Lumpkin County 0 - Kyler Robbins and Malachi Patrick scored two goals apiece, Benton Gregory added a penalty kick and goalkeeper Aaron Helton recorded his 15th career shutout in Union County's season-opening victory at Lumpkin County.
"I'm happy with the win

and I know our guys will get better as the season progresses," Coach Robbins said. "Right now, we're missing one player but I think (Coach Krieger) and I have our formation where we need it. Two years ago, when we made our run at State, it

The Panthers were the aggressors early on Friday, challenging Lumpkin's sophomore keeper with three shots on goal (two by freshman Zuriel Mancillas and one from senior Nolan Bachman) over the first 10 minutes. After one more Mancillas attempt sailed high in the 26th minute, Union finally broke through in the 27th when Zach Jackson fed Kyler Robbins for a 1-0 advantage.


Lumpkin County's potential equalizer missed wide in the 32nd minute, and then an offside wiped away another the final seconds of the half.



Basketball: Callaway bounces Panthers, Lady Panthers from State first round By Todd Forrest

Hogansville - Both Union County basketball teams suffered a first-round exit during last week's Class AA State Tournament, bringing an arduous 2020-21 season to a close. The Lady Panthers were

done in by a cold second quarter on Wednesday night, allowing top-seeded Callaway to blow the contest open 39-23 at halftime, en route to a 72-45 victory. Meanwhile, the Union men turned in a courageous performance but could not keep pace over the final seven minutes in a 65-42 loss. Panthers 42, Callaway

65 - Despite entering the postseason winless, the Union County men gave the Region 5-AA Champion Callaway all it could handle for three-plus quarters before running out of gas down the stretch. Locked in a tightly con-

tested battle for much of the night, the Panthers held a second-half lead for the first time since their 1-point loss at Fannin County on Dec. 12. In front 13-11 in the first period, Union County entered the second all square at 13-13 before trailing 22-21 at the break. Less than a minute into the third frame, senior Kaston Hemphill, who made his first appearance since a Jan. 23 injury, knocked down a 12-foot jumper to move the Panthers ahead 23-22.

The Cavaliers responded

with a 14-2 run to build a 36-25 advantage, but Union County continued to scrap and claw, refusing to go away at 44-36 in the final moments of the third.

Junior Lake Hughes did his best to keep the Panthers within striking distance, scoring eight of his 13 points in the third on 2 for 4 from 3-point range and one steal.

Following a Hemphill

fourth, Callaway finally delivered the knockout blow in the form of a 10-0 outburst, ignited by a 4-point play just shy of the seven-minute mark.

The two squads combined for 50 free throws, but neither were proud of the results as Union County hit 9 of 26 (35%), and Callaway made just 9 of 24 (38%). However, the Cavs made up for it with a free throw that trimmed the 47% performance from the field deficit to 47-37 early in the (24 for 51) on 8 of 23 (35%)

The Panthers, meanwhile, shot 14 for 36 (39%) overall and 5 of 18 (28%) from 3-point territory.

Union County began the evening by hitting 2 of 3 from deep and 4 for 8 overall during the first quarter, resulting in a 13-13 tie. Junior Landon Kight proved a tough matchup early on, scoring seven of his 12 points in the first, connecting on a trey and two free throws.

Despite trailing by one at halftime, the Panthers were ice cold in the second, hitting just 3 of 11 in the quarter on 0 for 5 from three.

Along with Hughes' 13 points and Kight's 12, Hemphill scored 8 points in his return with four rebounds and an assist.

Braylen Rader had 3 points, while Caleb John, Hayden Payne and Eli Underwood added 2 points each.

Kight led Union County with five boards, John dished out three assists and Hughes had three steals. Griffin Young finished

Donohue added one dime. Hughes and Underwood

with two assists and Sean

pulled down four rebounds each; Daniel Snow had three.

Callaway finished with row edge on the boards. out-rebounding the Panthers 32-29. The Cavs outscored the visitors 18-14 in the paint and 21-2 in transition.

Ball security difficulties led to the largest discrepancy as Union County's 23 giveaways resulted in a 31-8 Callaway advantage in points off turn-

Lady Panthers 45, Callaway 72 - Following a 17point first period, the Lady Panthers were limited to just 18 over the next two quarters. allowing Callaway to pull away in a 72-45 victory.

Ava Hunter wrapped up her junior season with teamhighs of 13 points and eight rebounds. Meanwhile, Union County finishes its topsy-turvy 2020-21 campaign at 2-13 overall and 0-6 in Region 8-AA, just one year removed from equaling the secondhighest win total in program history at 23-7 and claiming the Region 8-AA title.

The Lady Panthers opened Wednesday's road trip with a 4-0 advantage for the second straight contest after
