Outdoor Burning

During this time of the year, property owners may be disposing of leaves and other yard debris by outdoor burning. These fires are usually small and are in a person's yard or on their private property. These fires do produce smoke and may be concerning to neighbors or persons passing by. However, most of these fires are well contained, controlled burns and should not be a concern.

Property owners are allowed to burn hand-piled leaves and/or yard debris as long as they follow the outdoor burning safety standards as explained by the Georgia Forestry Commission (GFC). It is important that everyone understands the elements and dangers of outdoor burning as well as the outdoor burning safety standards.



The outdoor burning safety standards are actions and precautions that property owners must take to provide safety and to prevent out of control wildfires. A GFC awareness campaign was launched a few years ago introducing the theme "Take Five" before the burn and to remember the acronym "S-S-T-A-R" representing the five points of the outdoor burning safety standard. The first "S" represents Space. There must be 25 feet or more

between the fire and woodlands. The second "S" also represents Space stating that there must be 50 feet or more between the fire and any structures. The "T" represents Time. Burning can only be conducted from sunrise to sunset. The "A" represents Attendance. A person responsible for the fire must stay onsite with the fire until it is completely extinguished. The "R" represents Reasonable Precautions. The concept

of reasonable precautions is to have tools and measures in place to prevent the fire from escaping. These include things such as a continuous pressurized water source on site; man-made or natural barrier to contain the fire; hand tools or fire-containing equipment on site; weather awareness such as red flag warnings, High Fire Danger designation, and other hazardous conditions such as low relative humidity, high winds, etc.

Just as a reminder, property owners are only allowed to burn certain materials. Only hand-piled leaves or naturally occurring yard debris can be burned. Household garbage or other man-made materials cannot be burned.

Commissioner's Questions

Q. Too many people in Union County are leaving their poor dogs out in the cold and rain. Some howl and cry all night long. This should be considered animal cruelty and needs to be enforced. A. We certainly want to remind folks that during this very

cold and wet weather, we must look after our pets. However, I also want to caution the public that cold temperatures impact different pets in different ways. A. While there were a lot of washed out culverts and several places where the creeks got out of their banks, we have been very lucky. Most folks have had wind-related problems that resulted in fallen trees. The major rain problems usually begin when we get 4" to 6" of rainfall and above.

Q. We really have wanted to see some snow fall and wonder when it is more likely to happen?

A. Snow or sleet are impossible to predict because it is usually just a few degrees of temperature that makes the difference. According to the National Weather Service, snow falls when there are low temperatures with no melting in mid-air. Sleet is the result of snow melting and then refreezing before it hits the earth's surface. Freezing rain occurs when snow melts but refreezes when it hits the surface, and in the Winter, rain is simply melted snow that never re-freezes. In the Winter, mid-air temperatures play a big role in determining the type of precipitation we get.

Q. It seems that we have had milder winters recently. Do you think that is a sign of climate change?

A. I try to never get into this discussion because I do not think anyone really knows the future. However, it is true that the Road Department has had to use very little salt this year. So

Real Char'acters

As a young boy I heard my grandfather would use strange words that were spoken by people in England during Chaucer's time. The Appalachian Mountains were isolated from the rest of the world during my grandfather's childhood. These mountains were not opened up to

These words included "holped," "directly," and a phrase used by my grandfather was "a real

When papa said My Papa John "was a real char'acter," he meant his grandfather was a person that stood out because of their nature and character. Sometimes Papa would use the phrase to indicate a person was full of the devilment like his grandfather, or he might use the phrase to mean a person's intelligence and character should be emulated.

For example, John Cummings was a blacksmith. He was big, brawny, strong, loved to drink, loved to fight and loved the ladies. One time he went to a wedding and enjoyed a little too much of the apple brandy before the wedding even began. As a result he walked to the front of the church, stood in the pulpit, stripped off his clothing and offered to fight any man in the building. When there were no takers he made everyone leave the wedding and refused to let the services continue. Later in life John left his first wife and moved to Missouri. There, he raised another bunch of Cummings kids.

Later in his life his grandson which became my Papa and one of his cousins went to visit their Grandfather in Missouri one summer. They were helping him in the Blacksmith Shop when John asked the cousin to hand him a hammer. The boy sassed his grandfather and told him to get the hammer himself. The boy knew he was in trouble so he turned to run. The old man picked up the 5 pound hammer and threw it at the boy, barely missing his ear, and said, "My boys never sassed me and neither are my Grand-

sons. "John Cummings was a "real char'acter." He had five sons, all of which became farmers. Lon was my great grandfather and he owned a large farm on the road between Phil Campbell and Trapptown. One day the Alabama Department of Highways came to Lon's house wanting a right of way on his property so a road could be built in front of his house. He was about 68 years old at this time and agreed to give a right of way for the road if the construction of the highway would not create a road bank in

To Burn or Not to Burn?

We are entering the time of year when prescribed burns are more and more common. I want to talk about why prescribed burns are important. I think that generally we understand that they are important, otherwise we wouldn't take the risk of doing them, but they are important in more ways than

@UGA many understand. To talk about the importance of prescribed burns we also have to talk about natural for-

est succession. For-

est succession can look different depending on where you live. For us, it can start with meadow lands. Meadows would have plants like asters, queen Anne's lace, and broom sedge. After about five years, the meadows will start to grow up some more and brush like sumac and blackberry will start to take over. At year 20, we would see a young pine forest start to emerge. This pine forest would start to mature and at about year 70, we would see an understory of hardwoods begin

to emerge in the mature pine stand. From year 70 on, the forest begins to transition to a hardwood forest. At 100 years, we've reached the forest climax which is a mature oak-hickory forest. If there is no intervention, either natural or manmade, our forests will remain at the mature oakhickory forest stage. So, what's wrong with allowing our forests to stay at the mature oak-hickory stage? And if it is wrong then what can be done about it? To answer the first question when all or a majority of our habitat is in the mature oak-hickory stage we have less diversity of habitat. Diversity of habitat is necessary to be able to support a diversity of wildlife, plants, fungi, and everything else that creeps, crawls, and grows in the woods. Deer need a diverse habitat to thrive. They need brush cover to protect fawns. Mature forests have very little cover and leave fawns exposed to roaming coyotes and bears. The deer also need

deer population is in decline, which is not due to overhunting as there are fewer and fewer hunters each year. Turkey populations are also in decline, in part because there is not sufficient brush cover for poults (baby turkeys). Bobwhite quail have become very rare in Georgia, because they need brush for their habitat. Grouse have also become rare because they make their home in the transition area between habitat types. These are just a few examples of species that we have seen a decline or significant decline in population. Controlled burns reset the natural forest

while the public may wish we had more snow, from the Road Department's perspective, it has been a nice change. Please keep in mind that we do need to have more freezing weather to assist the environment with eliminating some pesky bugs that appear in the Spring.

Q. What is your memory of snow in the mountains growing up?

A. I do not ever remember having any 65 degree weather in the winter. It seems like it was always just cold until Spring. Growing up in Union County, we just about always had several inches of snow each year. Back in the '60s and '70s. Richard Russell Highway would often be snow and ice covered several times in the winter. Crowds of people would ascend up the mountain in jeeps to ride their sleds and car hoods down the two-mile thrilling ride to the bottom of the mountain. While I recall a few injuries, it was an unbelievable ride going about 40 mph on a sled only 6" above the road surface. Wow!

Q. Can you still ride a sled down Richard Russell Highway in the winter?

A. Eventually, USFS

stopped vehicles from going up on the mountain during bad weather, but it was a blast back in the day. However, rarely is there enough snow or ice on this road for sledding now even if it were allowed.

Q. Was there another major winter weather event you recall from growing up

A. Oh yes!!. It was the Blizzard of '93. On March 13th, 1993, it snowed 28" and more in some areas, which was the largest snow event anyone can remember. There was another snow storm in 1941 (way before I was born), when it snowed 20".

I remember that we had about 15 people from the neighborhood sleeping in our house for a few days because we had gas heat and gas hot water. Electricity was out in the county for 7 days to 10 days and longer in the remote areas. However, our telephone never quit working.

I also remember the story of Major Leon Davenport, our hospital administrator, walking to work from his home about 3 miles to the hospital in two feet of snow, to assist his staff who could not leave the hospital.

The road in front of Will Cummings' house was built over the hill in front of his house and there is still not a road bank there even today. Uncle Will was a "real char'acter."

Historically, in the southern US, wildfires would burn parts of the landscape every 1 to 3 years. Now in the southeast it's estimated that 4% of lands that could be burned are in a burn rotation. With the development that we have now it's a good thing that we don't have wildfires raging through the southeast every 1 to 3 years. Controlled burns are able to keep the fuel load in the forest down to prevent that from happening. But if we don't have enough controlled burns or responsible timber harvest from public lands then we won't see the rejuvenation of the forest necessary for it to sustain a diverse group of species for generation after generation.
