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Lady Panthers claim fourth Region title in eight years

Elberton - The Lady Panthers clinched their fourth Region 8-AA championship since 2015 with a 6-1 victory at Elbert County on Friday, March 25, awarding head coach Tim Hunter his seventh region soccer title -- six coming with the Union County girls, one with the boys.

With the No. 1 seed secure during the upcoming Class AA State Tournament, the Lady Panthers (9-3-1, 5-0) have clinched home-field advantage through the first two rounds. According to the Georgia High School Association's website, Union County will host Region 6-AA's No. 4 seed on April 14.

The Lady Panthers will likely meet either Coretta Scott King, Therrell or Washington in the first round. The second round would have Union facing the winner of Region 2's second seed or Region 4's third seed. Currently, East Laurens, Bacon County and Toombs County are fighting for second place in Region 2 behind fifth-ranked and undefeated Jeff Davis.

In Region 4, Laney is the favorite to take home third behind former Region 8-AA programs Oglethorpe County

Baseball: Game two heartbreak headlines Banks County's sweep of Union

Union County stumbled to 0-6 in Region 8-AA and 2-14 overall following last week's three-game sweep at the hands of Banks County (11-4, 8-0). The Panthers dropped

Tuesday's series opener 15-4 in Homer before suffering two Friday night losses in Blairsville by scores of 8-7 and 11-4. Union County will attempt to keep its postseason hopes alive during the upcoming three-game set vs. 1-11 Riverside Military Academy (RMA), beginning on Tuesday, March 29 at UCHS.

Panthers 7, Banks County 8 (Game two) - Adding insult to injury, the Panthers failed to preserve a five-run advantage, surrendering three runs in the fourth and five in the seventh despite building comfortable margins of 5-0 after three and 7-3 through six.

Senior Lake Hughes fired six masterful innings, carrying a two-hitter and a four-run edge into the seventh, but the Union ace ran out of gas, forcing head coach Zach Odom to pull his starter after 103 pitches.

The tough-luck seventh got underway with a single off the glove of diving thirdbaseman Tyler Loyd, followed by a base hit to right field. After Hughes loaded the bases with his second walk and 98th offering of the game, Odom elected to stay with his senior southpaw. But when a five-pitch, bases-loaded walk trimmed the margin to 7-4, the Union skipper called upon junior James McPherson with no outs and the tying run at first.

With McPherson on the hill, Union's bad luck continued when the Banks County leadoff hitter beat out a slow chopper to shortstop, cutting the lead to 7-5 with the heart of the order coming up. A groundout to second made it a 7-6 game, then McPherson fanned the No. 3 hitter, moving the Panthers within an out of escaping with the win.

the plate, Union elected to take its chances with the Leopards' slugger. Unfortunately, the 6-4, 220-pound Chipola College commit made the Panthers pay on the first pitch he saw from McPherson -- lacing a two-run double down the third-base

Union escaped the top half of the seventh without further damage when McPherson ended the inning by inducing a pop-fly to center.

The Panthers stranded a runner in scoring position during the Union seventh after senior Caleb Towe briefly kept hope alive via a two-out opposite-field single, followed by a stolen base three pitches later.

Towe finished 2 for 4 with a run and a steal while fellow senior Logan Anderson drove in two during a 3-for-4 game. Hughes ended his day at the plate 3 for 4 with a run, a steal and a ribby. He struck out three Leopards in six-plus innings on the bump, allowing four hits, four earned runs and three walks.


Hughes worked around a

cleanup hitter Tripp Williams at leadoff walk with two strikeouts in the first, then sparked a tworun bottom half with a base hit up the middle. A Loyd single put runners at the corners with one away, allowing Hughes to come around on a Williams wild pitch. Anderson knocked in Loyd via a two-out single, serving a 1-1 pitch into right-center for a 2-0 Union lead.

Towe opened the second with a base hit then came around to score on a Leopards' error off the bat of Bailey Brown, who scored on Hughes' second base knock of the game.

Working with a four-run lead, Hughes' second-straight 1-2-3 inning allowed Union County to mount a 5-0 advantage when Chris Fletcher singled and later scored via a two-out basesloaded walk to Brayden Sweat.

Hughes suffered a tough break in the fourth when a swing-and-miss was ruled a check-swing ball, resulting in a 1-2 single with one away. Williams put Banks on the board when he ripped the first pitch of the AB past senior shortstop Connor Shields. Later in the

Neither lineup reached base again until the bottom of the sixth when Hughes singled to lead off the inning then advanced to second on a throwing error. But the Panthers were unable to score Hughes, who was left stranded 90 feet away when Fletcher's frozen rope up the middle was snagged by the Leopards' pitcher in self-

Fletcher finished 1 for 4 with a run and an RBI; Dyer also scored once during a 1-for-4 evening that included a stolen base. Brown added a run and a steal; Sweat walked and recorded one RBI.

McPherson fanned one The Panthers responded Leopard while allowing two hits and one earned run during an inning of work.

The Panthers chipped away with a run in the bottom of the fourth and another in the sixth before Banks County put the contest out of reach with another seventh-inning explosion.

Dyer went 2 for 3 at the dish with two steals, one run and an RBI. Will Duncan earned the nod in game three and tossed six innings, giving up eight hits, five earned runs, one walk while fanning three.

A base on balls to Hughes and a Dyer hit-by-pitch put two aboard to begin the Union

County first, allowing Fletcher's infield single to plate Hughes for the game's first run. Anderson's grounder to third resulted in a run-scoring error, but a pop-up and a line-out kept the tally at 2-0 after an inning.

Banks County did all of its second-inning damage with two away, beginning with a two-run double that knotted the score at 2-2. Following a passed ball that put the visitors on top 3-2, the Leopards added on with a solo homer to left.

Both squads stranded a runner during the third and Banks started to pull away in the fourth, tacking on three runs courtesy of four singles, a sacrifice bunt and an error. Trailing 7-1, Union finally stopped the bleeding when catcher Jace Vinez cut down a would-be basestealer to end the inning.

The Panthers loaded the bags in the bottom of the frame but came away with only one run when a Hughes sacrifice fly brought home Shields. The lone run came by way of consecutive one-out singles from Shields and Duncan, plus a Brown hitby-pitch that set the table for Hughes' RBI.

Duncan tossed a 1-2-3 fifth, then escaped following a two-out error in the sixth, allowing Union to add another run in the bottom half of the frame.

A Sweat walk and a Brown single put two aboard for Dyer, who scored Sweat on an 0-2, two-out single. The Panthers failed to add on when Brown was thrown out trying to score from second on Dyer's hit.

Loyd was greeted by an outfield error after replacing Duncan on the mound to begin the seventh. Following a strikeout, Banks County extended its margin to 11-4 via three singles. a walk and another Union fielding error.

Loyd allowed three hits and one earned run in the seventh, striking out two and issuing one free pass. Duncan and Brown each finished 1 for 2 at the dish with Brown chipping in a stolen base.



Swimming: Hannah Sheffield inks scholarship with Piedmont University

Union County swimming standout Hannah Sheffield will spend another four years in the pool as a member of the Piedmont University Swim team.

Surrounded by family. friends and coaches, Sheffield put pen to paper during a signing ceremony at the Union General Hospital Wellness Center on Monday, March 14. The North Georgia News spoke with Sheffield later in the week about her decision to team up with the upstart Lions' program that enters its third season next winter.

According to Sheffield, she found herself on Piedmont's radar when a COVID-19 outbreak temporarily closed the Wellness Center pool in January 2021. And with the State competition right around the corner, Sheffield needed to remain in peak physical condition, so she elected to drive to Habersham County's Ruby Fulbright Aquatic Center for her daily workouts.

As fate would have it, Piedmont University held its swimming practices at the same location, and coach Teddy Guyer immediately took note of Sheffield's talent. However, it was her dedication and work ethic that

really caught Guyer's attention after learning Sheffield was driving from Blairsville each day to hone her craft.

"While I was there I met the team and the coach, and after I kept coming back, the coach came up to me and said, 'wow, you're really devoted to your sport; I want you on my team," Sheffield said. At the same time Sheffield

was commuting to Clarkesville, Piedmont's swim team was competing in its first season, which turned out to be a factor in Sheffield's decision. "I actually got to swim

with the [Piedmont] team once or twice and they were a brand new program then," she said. "So just knowing that I'll be able to grow with them is something that really stood out to me.' Over the next year, Shef-

field remained firm on her commitment to Piedmont, despite the people in her ear encouraging her to consider other schools. "I listened to their advice

and thought, 'I really should look at other schools,' but there was always something about Piedmont that kept drawing me back in. I just knew that Piedmont was

Sheffield will major in theater, but could also see herself entering the teaching field

"For now, I'm majoring in theater arts, but I do have a strong interest in teaching or becoming a swim coach," she said. "But honestly, I'm just going to see where the world takes me, because I really don't know for sure what I'm going to do [after graduation].

"When I toured the campus, they gave me a ticket to see one of their shows. I got to meet the theater teachers and the students, they were all so warm and welcoming. It was awesome."


