speed bumps?

A. By forcing drivers to slow down, speed bumps greatly reduce the frequency of minor fender benders and serious collisions. More importantly, they are quite effective at reducing automobile accidents involving pedestrians. However, on higher speed roadways, they are simply NOT safe. One of the few major drawbacks of speed bumps of any kind is that they are a pain for the traveling public. They are a terrible inconvenience for traveling, school buses, ambulances, and other emergency vehicles. In life-or-death situations, a 30-second delay in reaching a person in distress or delivering that person to a hospital can be fatal. Another big drawback of speed bumps is the damage they can cause to vehicles with fairly shallow ground clearances. If you mistakenly drive a low-profile automobile over an unexpected asphalt bump at a high rate of speed, you might crack your front bumper or seriously compromise your oil pan, bust your tires, or bend your tire rims. Also, once speed bumps are installed, salting, and scraping of ice and snow is not possible because of the danger to equipment, vehicles and employees. Finally, some have observed that speed bumps do not change driver behavior and instead encourage other dangerous driving behaviors, such as going "off road" to avoid the bumps or spinning their tires upon leaving a speed bump.

Q. Why can't the county just install "Slow Children at Play" signs.

A. Because the streets are not for kids to play on. Any indication such as one of these signs - that kids are being allowed to play on the streets and that the activity is known and allowed by the governing authority - is simply not going to

Q. I live in a subdivision where children regularly play outside. Does the Homeowners Association have any authority on this matter?

A. One fantastic way to reduce speeding in the neighborhood includes speaking with your Homeowners Association (HOA) or at neighborhood gatherings. Your HOA council members or homeowners may know how to slow down traffic in your neighborhood through the use of campaigns, traffic calming solutions, and by working closely with local law enforcement. The HOA will absolutely have the right to step in and install traffic calming solutions, such as speed bumps and speed humps, which help discourage speeding. They might even install a speed monitoring digital sign. But they can do nothing until alerted about the situation. If no one speaks up, then nothing gets done. If you go to an HOA board with multiple families ready to complain, the chances of something

being done are much higher. Q. If speed bumps aren't the answer, what do you suggest?

A. In review, the Union County Sheriff's Office is the official authority on traffic and road safety. However, there are a few things that you can try to suggest that neighborhood traffic should obey speed limit requirements. 1) Raise awareness in your neighborhood. Talk with your neighbors about the problem, and compare your ideas for solutions, 2) Consider yard signage. Inexpensive "Slow" signs or plastic sandwich board type signage often help - especially when small children are out at play, and 3) Seek assistance from your local law enforcement. Though such speeding is often sporadic, random police presence can often encourage a potential speeder

Now, I will tell you that I had always liked to cook as a child, and that did not change when I went into service. Reforger, a large field exercise, usually in the fall in Germany, was in the cold and rain leading up to winter. As the only female helicopter crew chief in our company that went to the field, partially as a chief and partially as the maintenance records clerk, I always had the back half of the administrative GP (General Purpose) small tent to myself, separated by the hanging of two ponchos or shelter halves, outfitted with a kerosene potbellied stove. In addition to always keeping a pot of coffee going with the manual percolator from my Grandmother's basement, I would transform muck to majesty, transform the schlock from the C-Rations with a little help from a few additions from central mess - into rather palatable meals. And if our field trials took us in summer to late fall, there would always be berries to be foraged, a skill learned early on in my upstate New York childhood, and whipped into some delectable dessert.

Ya know, life is what you make it. When life gives you lemons, err, rather C-rations, you make – well, you know.

And now, the buzzer on the oven reminds me that the cranberry apple coffee cake is ready, so until we muse again, I bid you "At Ease!"

Getting out your measuring tape and seeing how close wood piles are located to the home. If they are closer than 30 feet, relocate them to at least 30 feet away from structures. Sweeping porches and decks, clearing them of leaves and pine needles. Raking under decks, porches, sheds, and play structures. Mowing grasses
