ing or damaged? A. You contact the 911 Mapping Office at 706-439-6056. They will need your physical address including road name and number. The new green marker is then made, and they come and replace the missing or damaged one.

Q. My road sign is missing. Who do I contact to get this replaced?

A. For missing road signs, you should also contact the 911 Mapping Office at 706-439-6056. You give them the name of the road sign that is missing,

and they will get it replaced. They then let dispatch know the specific road sign is missing in the event emergency services are needed on that road.

Q. If I feel like I need to speak to someone at 911 Dispatch, but it is a non-lifethreatening emergency, what number should I call?

A. Union County 911 Dispatch has a non-emergency number that you can call. It is 706-439-6038. The Dispatchers on duty will prioritize calls and assist you as soon as pos-
