Local teenager storms into Thunder Valley

Bristol, TN - Blairsville's Tucker Anderson is well on his way to becoming the next local racing sensation following his strong showing at last month's Bristol Dirt Nationals at the Bristol Motor

Behind the wheel in the 602 crate late model class, the 14-year old Union County Middle School student was one of approximately 870 drivers (1,200-plus total) in his division at the start of the week. Beginning on Monday, March 15, Anderson continued advancing until the field was whittled down to 40 drivers. Needing a sixth-place finish to qualify for the main event, Anderson came in 10th in the final heat race.

During Monday's practice sessions, Anderson's best lap times ranged between 19.585 and 19.772 seconds. But when day one of qualifying got underway, Anderson advanced by shaving a few tenths off his fastest practice lap with a 19.318 - good enough for ninth in the day's third heat race.

In his second qualifier at "The World's Fastest Half Mile", Anderson finished 10th with a top lap time of 18.882. On day three, he came in sev-

Most recently, Anderson came in second at the I-75 of 18.863. His total time of Raceway in Sweetwater, TN 12:53.023 in the 10-lap sprint on April 2. Last weekend, he competed locally at Tri-County Racetrack in Brasstown, NC finishing second in both the

heat and feature races. After starting sixth in the heat race, Anderson took the green flag in fourth during the feature


However, Anderson already owns a bit of history at Tri-County when, at 10-years old, he became the youngest driver to compete at the track. He also won his first race at the same age - taking the checkered flag in the beginner class at Blue Ridge Motorsports Park.

Anderson credits his grandfather Vinson Sims for

stoking his passion for fast cars. At the age of 5, Anderson became a regular at Tri-County, tagging along with Sims whenever possible. Finally, at 9-years old, with his grandfather's blessing, Anderson moved into the driver's seat and started honing his craft on an empty Tri-County track.

Within a year, Anderson made his first visit to victory lane. Then, according to his mother Traci, his youthful hobby became a full-time passion. Moving up in the ranks ever since, Anderson started in the Pony division and progressively worked his way up to the current 602 crate division.

While his mother is unsure of where his gifts will steer him next, one thing is certain, racing in Anderson's blood. And whether he's putting those talents to use in Brasstown or Bristol, and racing on four wheels or two, he can be found pushing the limits at every opportunity and moving closer to an exceedingly fast and promising future, one lap at a time.

Odom expects at least three seniors to ink baseball cholarships along with Littles wrestling scholarship to Lakeland University. Hunter Loyd has already signed with Emmanuel, and Mullanack has committed to Piedmont College. Swartz has yet to commit, but according to Odom, it's just a matter of time before the southpaw takes his stuff to the next level.

Up next: The Panthers hosted Towns County on Monday after press time. In the previous meeting on March 29, the Indians' duo of junior Collin Crowder and senior Aidan Berrong outlasted Tyler Loyd and Dyer during a 7-5 Towns County victory in Hiawassee.

Tyler Loyd and Dyer limited the Indians to just 5 hits, but six walks, five hit batters, four wild pitches and two costly errors helped Towns County rally from a 4-1 deficit. At the plate, Union left 11 runners aboard and were unable to solve Berrong, who replaced Crowder in the fifth and tossed 2 1/3 innings of one-hit baseball after the Panthers churned out 8 hits over the first 4-plus frames.

Region play resumes on Tuesday at 5:55 p.m. when Union County visits Rabun County (10-8, 4-5) for the first of three games to settle the final two playoff spots in 8-AA. the fourth. Rabun is anchored by seniors Brody Jarrard and Brady Wilson, who lead the team in batting average and are among the top-four in innings pitched. Senior Linkin Wright and junior Grayson Carver round out Rabun's top-four arms.

"I've talked to some coaches and I was actually able to catch a few innings of Rabun-Lumpkin on Saturday,' Odom said when asked what he expects from the Wildcats. "I know they are young, but they also have a couple of seniors, like Brady Wilson in the middle of the lineup. It seems like he's

been there for eight years. "They're going to be good," he continued. "[Coach Wesley Satterfield] has done a good job with them in his second year. They're going to be scrappy. But with our arms, if we can hit the ball, we will be fine. We've always had Zeke (Swartz) and Isaak (Mullanack) on our pitching rotation, but I think that adding Lake (Hughes) as a third starter gives us an advantage with our arms. And we're starting to finally turn it on offensively, and now that we're starting to come up with those clutch hits, it's like the flood gates are opening. We hope that our pitching will set

the tone early then someone can deliver that big hit."

In 2019, Carver didn't record a strikeout while losing a 3-2 decision at Union County. The freshman scattered 7 hits and walked two in 6 innings. In the contest, then-sophomores Mullanack and Swartz combined to go hitless off Carver in 6 at-bats. Mullanack reached on Rabun's only error; Swartz got aboard via a fielder's choice.

Carver's counterpart, Mullanack, went the distance, allowing two hits and two runs. courtesy of a two-run homer by Jarrard. The Wildcats' other sophomore starter, Wilson, finished 0 for 3 with a fielder's

In the second game of the 2019 Rabun doubleheader, Swartz turned in a masterful performance during an 8-1 Union County victory. The sophomore allowed just one hit and no walks in 6 innings while fanning Jarrard twice. Wilson also finished hitless, going 0 for 2.

The Ione Rabun County hit in game two belonged to then-freshman shortstop Gunner Stockton, who is no longer with the baseball program after becoming the nation's No. 1 ranked dual-threat quarterback in the Class of 2022.
