announced that he had received confirmation that the Georgia Department of Education had accepted the school system's new charter contract.

Murphy said Union County Schools was also granted an Advanced Education Accreditation.

The contract was unanimously approved by the board. In other school news, the

board unanimously approved the purchase of used tools and equipment from Specialty Sheet Metal in the amount of \$37,500 for the Career, Technical and Agricultural Education program, both for the main campus and Woody Gap School.

School Facilities Director Chris Crow said the owner of the business, Donnie Ledford, was retiring and felt

the school could benefit from Championships and runnersthe equipment. Crow said that the equipment, purchased new, would have cost an estimated \$195,000.

Hill said the equipment purchase would be paid for with SPLOST funds.

Murphy recommended that out-of-county tuition rates remain unchanged from last year at \$500 per semester or \$1,000 per year, which the board subsequently approved. Union County Schools does not allow out-of-state student attendance.

The board also hired Dr. Banks Bitterman as the school district's new athletic director.
