

Soccer: Both Union County teams moving on to Sweet 16

Turner's hat trick and Gregory's 'big goal' prove the difference in first-round sweep

Chatsworth - Union County Soccer swept its opening-round matchups at North Murray and will advance to the Class AA Sweet 16 later this week.


The Lady Panthers opened state tournament play on Thursday, April 13 with a 3-0 victory in Chatsworth. Junior Lara Turner recorded a hat trick, scoring two first-half goals before putting the game away with her third and final score in the 57th minute.

Unfortunately, junior Zoe Crawford suffered an injury early in the second half. As of last Friday night, head coach Tim Hunter listed Crawford's status as unknown, but doubtful, for Wednesday's secondround contest at sixth-ranked Mt. Paran.

On Friday, the Union County men (10-3) left North Murray with a 1-0 victory courtesy of junior Benton Gregory's first-half goal via Zuriel Mancillas' corner kick.

Murray 0 - Turner broke a scoreless tie in the 11th minute via a feed from Crawford. The Lady Panthers denied a pair of Mountaineer corner kicks in the 14th minute and a free kick in the 25th, allowing Crawford to find Turner again for a 2-0 edge in the 36th.

"Lara played fantastic," Hunter said. "We knew the way [North Murray was] playing, they were shifting really hard to the sides, so when we hit the centers and outside mids, we knew they were going to have runs. Every time Zoe got the ball on the sideline, we had a cross, a shot, we got something positive. I thought Kaylee Helton played a fantastic game; Madison Torres and our whole back line played very well. The girls did so much of what we've worked on in practice and what

I asked of them." Union County (5-7) con-Lady Panthers 3, North tinued attacking early in the second half with shots from sophomore Ariel McCarter and seniors Italia Salazar and Madison Torres.

McCarter and senior Kaylee Helton each missed in the 51st and 56th minutes, respectively, but Turner found the net in the 57th for a 3-0 advantage.

The Lady Panthers couldn't add on despite earning corner kicks in the 68th, 74th and 77th minutes. Turner's final two shots were unsuccessful in the 72nd and 76th; Autumn Skinner missed in the 70th.

In the early going, Turner and Helton each missed from inside the penalty area during the 4th minute. Salazar was turned away in the 10th.

The Lady Panthers weathered a pair of corner kicks in the 14th and Crawford's shot

was stopped in the 28th before the junior missed wide of the post in the 35th.

'As a whole, I thought our girls played exceptionally well," Hunter said. "I think the [gap between the teams] was probably more distant than the 3-0 score. We kept possession the entire game, and in the second half, we switched to a 4-3-3 and pulled our wings back and that locked everything down."

Junior goalkeeper Kyra McKechnie, who logged her third clean sheet of the year, was back on the pitch after missing Union's regular-season finale. With McCarter and Addison Meeker also back in action, the Lady Panthers were at full strength for the first time since late February.

With her three goals on Thursday, Turner has two hat tricks in her last four State playoff games.

The Lady Panthers trav-

el to sixth-ranked Mt. Paran (Marietta) on Wednesday at 5 p.m. for their fourth consecutive trip to the Sweet 16. Mt. Paran blasted an overmatched Elite Scholars Academy 10-0 in the first round.

Union and Mt. Paran share one common opponent in top-ranked Fellowship Christian, who mercy-ruled both squads.

"I was absolutely thrilled with our performance [at North Murray], I would love to have this type of performance all the time," Hunter added.

Panthers 1, No. 9 North Murray 0 - Mancillas' corner kick in the 33rd minute was the difference when Gregory crashed into the box and used his right foot to poke Mancillas' kick past the keeper for the game's only goal.

"Benton might not be our leading goal scorer, but he's probably leading us in big goals scored for the season," Hunter said. "It seems like whenever he gets on the scoreboard it's at times that are very important to us - none moreso than today."

Union County, who controlled possession for most of the game, earned 11 corner kicks on the day, compared to only four for the home team. However, the win wasn't without its share of tense moments.

North Murray (11-3) blasted the potential equalizer off the post in the 58th minute. Earlier, the Mountaineers failed to equalize before halftime when a close-range shot rolled wide during the 36th.

Despite a steady rainshower for most of the first 40 minutes, junior Evan Bohms attacked early and often - firing off five shots during the Hunter said when asked about opening half, including a pair of headers in the 18th and 40th minutes, respectively.

One of Bohm's attempts

appeared to draw a deliberate handball inside the box, but the penalty went uncalled.

The Panthers continued firing away in the second half. beginning with a North Murray save on Mancillas' shot in the 42nd. Gregory's attempt was blocked in the 43rd and Kooper Ashcraft missed in the 48th. An offside penalty in the 55th prevented a Wilson Walker scoring opportunity. "We could have defi-

nitely scored more than one goal, but [North Murray] is a very good defensive team and a very frustrating team to play against," Hunter said. "They kept five guys back, but we pretty much dominated possession. It got a little scary a couple times but our defense held up and was very strong. Isaiah Ortiz, what can I say? I wish I could find a way to get him another two or three years in high school. And Zuriel, Evan and Joel [Mendoza] I thought all played very well."

The Mountaineers survived a Union County flurry in the 61st minute as Mancillas' corner kick led to a Bohms shot off the keeper and a Walker header that cleared the crossbar.

North Murray's final scoring opportunity came in the 79th but senior goalkeeper Trent Baker snagged a corner kick in traffic.

The Panthers will look for their fourth-consecutive elite-eight appearance when they visit the second-ranked Walker School (Kennesaw) on Thursday.

The Walker School (12-4) owns a pair of one-goal victories over Athens Academy and No.7 Fellowship Christian. Union County defeated Athens Academy 2-1 and fell 6-3 to Fellowship.

"You never know," Thursday's contest. "Fellowship was a tough matchup for us, but I think we could matchup better with Walker."

Akins goes five strong, leads Panthers back into win column at EJ

The Panthers took a 5-2 victory in the finale of last week's three-game set with East Jackson behind eight strikeouts from freshman southpaw Gunnar Akins.

Earlier in the week, Union County (2-24, 2-10) was on the wrong end of a complete-game two-hitter by junior lefty Garrett Waugh in a 6-1 home loss. Rain bumped the final two games back to Saturday in Nicholson, where the Eagles prevailed 5-1 during the second game of the series

The Panthers are mathematically eliminated from postseason play and will wrap up the 2023 season this week with a three-game tilt vs. Banks County. Union County will travel to Homer on Tuesday before the season ends with a Friday doubleheader in Blairsville.

Panthers 5, East Jackson 2 (GM 3)- Freshman Maddox Patton went 2 for 3, and senior Will Duncan drove in two as the Union lineup backed Akins' stellar outing on the bump


Sophomore Hayden Hughes nailed down a twoinning save, allowing a pair of hits and one walk while striking out two

The Panthers raced ahead 5-0 until East Jackson struck for two in the sixth following a leadoff homer. After a base hit by the ensuing batter, Hughes entered with nobody out and a runner at first and quickly induced a timely pop-up.

But the Eagles added consecutive singles to load the bags before an RBI groundout and a strikeout limited the damage to only two runs.

Earlier, Patton broke a scoreless tie in the third inning with a sacrifice fly that scored Connor Swanson, who reached via a leadoff walk.

Freshman Eli Gwynn started the fourth with a base hit to left and Hughes reached on an error, setting the table for Duncan's two-run double. balls and swiped a bag.

Union County wrestlers CHS track and field victorious at Gilmer prep for busy spring, summer


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Ellijay - Union County placed first in the team standings, defeating host Gilmer, Pickens, Fideles Christian and Johnson Ferry Christian.
