### **CodeRED Notification System Test**

A couple of weeks ago, there was a column about emergency notifications and the CodeRED Notification system. One of the major responsibilities of Union County Emergency Management Agency (UCEMA) is to provide information to the public about potential emergencies and disasters. UCEMA provides this information through various avenues; however, the best way is through the CodeRED Emergency Notifica-

Fire Dept. tion System – an ultra-high-speed from Union telephone communication service for County emergency notifications. Fire Chief

Any emergency system must be tested periodically to ensure that it works properly. UCEMA conducts a countywide test of the CodeRED sys-

tem two times a year, usually in April and August. The next test of the Union County's Emergency Notification System, CodeRED, will be on April 25, 2024, at 2 p.m. During this test, you may receive a text message, email, and/or a phone call with a recorded message stating that is the test of our notification system. If you do not receive the message on April 25th, you are not registered in the system to receive these emergency alerts.

The CodeRED system is a great communications platform and has several different types of notifications. CodeRED Weather Warning is a unique service that automatically notifies citizens in the path of severe weather just moments after a warning has been issued by the National Weather Service. UCEMA also uses CodeRED to send EMERGENCY notifications to keep citizens informed of other emergencies such as evacuation notices, fires, floods, chemical spills, or other emergency situations

UCEMA may also use CodeRED to send GENERAL notifications to those who register to communicate non-life safety matters, such as planned road closures, water main repairs, water and power service interruptions, etc. By selecting the box for GEN-ERAL alerts when you register, you will also receive these types of

CodeRED is a nationwide service. Residents and visitors alike can receive notifications no matter where you are located via the CodeRED Mobile Alert app. This is a free public safety app for both Android and iPhone users. The CodeRED Mobile Alert app delivers community and emergency alerts to individuals targeted

#### **Confidence and Humility**

In 1940, the newly opened Tacoma Narrows Bridge was the third-longest suspension bridge in the world. It was a beautiful engineering feat, until it wasn't. One windy day, it began to twist and heave until it collapsed into a scrap heap of metal beams and cables. The engineer had wanted to build a slender, aesthetic bridge. It took some hubris to ignore the suspension bridge principles that made the Brooklyn

Bridge a success sixty years earlier. The Tacoma collapse was

not because design principles were wrong, but because some were not considered. A smart engineer is a humble one who holds the wellbeing of others paramount, while

maintaining confidence in all proven design principles.

Confidence and humility can coexist. That is of a piece with what we observe in Jesus, and what he expects in His followers. But it is also contrary to human nature. It is too easy to grasp a truth, then adopt an air of superiority, which leads to trenchant marginalization of those who are "ignorant" or "obstinate." That might well describe religious arrogance, but that's not how we Christians are meant to be.

Jesus was confident. He knew who He was (and is). But that did not stop Him from embracing His purpose and mission. "He existed in the form of God," but "humbled Himself by becoming obedient to... death on a cross." It's that same confidence and humility that season the believer's relationships with others. "Do nothing from selfishness or empty conceit... look out for the interests of others. Have this attitude in yourselves which was also in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 2).

Every human being is made in the image of God. But we live flawed lives which can only be restored to righteousness by God. Whatever else those truths might mean, it is a call to treat your fellow humans with respect. Humility means love even your enemies, according to Jesus. It does not preclude your confident association with those who disagree or do not believe. That confidence is not in yourself, but in the Savior who has given you new life. Knowing what you were before you received Christ and that you are quite capable of failing is enough to keep you humble even as you confidently share His amazing grace.

## **Commissioner's Questions**

Many Union County residents do not know that we offer transportation services. The availability of adequate transportation enables older persons to live independently in their communities, helps to prevent isolation and the possible need for long-term care placement. Many older people, who do not drive, must rely on family and friends to provide much of the transportation. But for others, it is necessary to find com-

munity resources to provide transportation, as this vital support service may be their only connection to the outside world.

#### Q. What is the Union County Transportation Services?

A. The local system offers rides for a nominal fee for those who need transportation to and from doctor's appointments, the grocery store, drug stores, and other locations within the Union County limits.

#### Q. How is this service funded?

A. Partial funding for this service comes from the Federal Department of Transportation through GDOT. A 50/50 grant, Union County is responsible for matching 50% of the funding. Union County spends funds up front for such things as wages for drivers, dispatchers, fuel, maintenance, etc., and GDOT reimburses Union County for eligible expenses. Federal money is given to GDOT and that agency distributes these funds to Georgia counties. There are different types of funding for different types of transportation systems in the State of Georgia. The money that comes to Union County and surrounding counties is from the Section 5311 Program - which is for Rural Transit. Because of the county population, the size of the City of Blairsville, and the distance between transportation stops, funding for rural counties is limited to "on call" trips as opposed to regular bussing routes.

#### Q. How many vehicles does the Union County Transportation Services operate?


A. Two 8 passenger vans make up the fleet of the Union County Transportation system. The vans are air-conditioned equipped with hydraulic chair lifts, and they are handicap accessible. When vans are initially purchased, the federal government gives 80% of the cost; the State of Georgia gives 10% of the cost; and county gives 10% of the cost.

### The Cost of Weakness



When my grandfather was a boy he acquired a puppy he called Bowser. The pup wasn't much to look at. The dog had a long body built low to the ground and big feet like a Bassett hound. Bowser's color was yellow like that of a Mountain Cur and he had a pointed nose like



#### Planting Depth...

Planting Depth and Soil Temperature: As the soil temperatures are getting warmer, it's time to think about planting. Let's talk about planting in your garden and how deep you should plant seeds, transplants, or bulbs.

Getting planting depth correct is really im-

portant. If seeds are planted to deeply they will struggle to germinate and grow through the soil to reach the sunlight. When seeds start all the energy that



they have is contained in the seed. So, if they are too deep, they won't have the energy necessary stored to grow above the soil surface and put out leaves to start making more energy. It is possible to plant seeds to shallow too. This is not as big of an issue as planting too deep, but seeds might dry out and have a tough time germinating if they are too shallow. Seeds do tend to have some tolerance, so if you don't get it exactly right, the seeds will still be able to grow and germinate. A general rule of thumb is that seeds should be planted 2-3 times their diameter. For small seeds like carrots that means they will be planted very shallow. Larger seeds like corn or beans will be

tailed instructions is always a good idea. With transplants you want to set the plants at the same depth as they are in the container. Burying them deeper can lead to rots, and lack of oxygen at the roots. Burying them too shallow will lead to the roots of the plant drying out more quickly. Tomatoes are an exception to this rule. When planting tomatoes you can remove the lowest branch and then place the plant at that depth in the soil. Tomato plants will easily put out more roots, resulting in a plant that has more roots to draw up water and nutrients. Whenever you buy transplants make sure that the crown of the plant (where the above ground and below ground portions meet) is healthy and strong. If it is weak and flimsy, this plant will struggle when it's put out into the elements.

When planting bulbs a rule of thumb is to plant the bulb 2-3 times the height of the bulb. Generally speaking spring flowering bulbs (e.g. Daffodil and tulip) should be planted in the fall and fall flowering bulbs (e.g. Crocus and cyclamen) should be planted in the spring.

Soil temperature is also really important for seeds to be able to germinate. For warm season plants, generally we want soil temperatures to reach 65 to allow for the best germination rates. Our soil temperatures have hit that, and looking at the long-term forecast, it looks like

Q. How do I make use of the service?

A. If you want to take advantage of the transportation system, it is best to call at least a day before to make an appointment for the van to pick you up. Call (706) 439-6050; Operates five days per week; 8:00am - 3:30pm. Riders under 12 must be accompanied by an adult 18 or over. Rider must provide a child safety seat for all children under six years of

Q. How much does it cost to ride the buses?

A. Fees apply to all riders six years of age and older. Prices listed are for one-way

First Mile – \$3.00; Each Additional Mile – \$ .50

Q. Can I get a reduced rate if I am elderly or disabled?

A. Unfortunately, federal programs such as this do not allow discounted rates. Everyone who rides has to pay the same price if Union County is to continue receiving federal

Q. Will someone come into my home to help me get into the transportation bus?

A. Though we wish we could accommodate these types of requests, it is not possible. The Union County Transit and all 5311 programs are curb to curb service providers. This means that the individual rider must be able to get out of their home by themselves as well as handle their personal off-location errands. In other words, riders must be able to do their own shopping, etc. The drivers can help passengers from their door and into the bus if necessary, and they will help with the wheelchair lift when necessary. If a passenger requires assistance with shopping or getting into stores or doctors' offices, the rider must have an aid with them to help with these items. If the assistance of an aid is necessary, the aid can ride the bus free of charge.

Paul Tillich was a philosopher and theologian. When asked to define Christianity, he said, "That's easy. A Christian is simply one beggar telling another beggar where to find food." That thought expresses your confidence in the Bread of Life (Jesus Christ), and your humility in recognizing your own need. Peter said it this way: "God is opposed to the proud but gives grace to the humble" (1 Pet. 5:5).
