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## Panthers, Lady Panthers cruise into Sweet 16 showdown vs. Lovett

Kaylee Helton and Zach Jackson spark UCHS soccer past first-round opponents

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Union County soccer swept the first round of the Class AA State Tournament, outscoring its Region 5 opposition by a combined total of 13-2 at Mike Colwell Memorial Stadium.

However, the competition takes a significant leap forward in round two -- going from average to elite -- as both Union County clubs take on privateschool powerhouse Lovett on Wednesday and Thursday. The round of 16 gets

underway this week when the Lady Panthers travel to West Paces Ferry on Wednesday to face the second-ranked Lions at 5:30 p.m.. The seventh-ranked

Union County men will host No. 4 Lovett in a top-10 fixture at Mike Colwell Memorial Stadium on Thursday. Kickoff is scheduled for 6 p.m. Panthers 10, Haralson

County 1 - Union County needed only 27 minutes to seize a 6-0 advantage before turning it over to the junior varsity during last Friday's opening-round blowout.

Coming off a loss to Pickens on April 12, and a too-close-for-comfort region victory on April 1 at Riverside Military Academy, Union County senior Zach Jackson quickly silenced any questions surrounding the Panthers' recent struggles with a hat trick in the first 18 minutes.

"It felt amazing to come out and set the tone for the [state] tournament," Jackson said after the match. "We really want to win this tournament. We have a great group of players and we've worked very hard to be in this position."

A corner kick in the 5th minute put Union County on the board when freshman Zuriel Mancillas found Jackson for the match's first point. Junior Kyler Robbins connected with Jackson in the 8th minute for a 2-0 lead, then he fed Mancillas in the 12th for his second helper in under four minutes.

Jackson's third goal put the Panthers up 4-0 when seclassmate in the 18th minute.

"The key was to come out swinging right away," Union County soccer coach Chris Robbins said following the win. "Whenever you're playing an active sport, the key is to come out immediately and get the nerves out. And that's a

The final goal of the half came just over three minutes later when freshman Benton Gregory played Mancillas' pass off his chest and into an open goal from point-blank range.

"You can measure up your opponent pretty quick, and we knew right away we had more horsepower than [Haralson]," Coach Robbins said. 'And like I told the guys, this will be the last time we have that kind of advantage. The rest of the tournament will be all No. 1 and 2 seeds. Hopefully we enjoyed it and had fun because that's what it's all about."

Coach Robbins began working his junior varsity players into the match late in the first half after starting freshman nior Malachi Patrick found his Ethan McBride at goalkeeper during the first 40 minutes.

'I'm not going to lie, I was surprised, but I'm also ecstatic," Coach Robbins said regarding his JV squad outscoring a state playoff team 4-1 during the second half. "Right before the second half, I told them, 'don't revert back to your old habits. Use the things you've learned this year through our coaching and trust it. It's like novocaine, eventually, it will work.' And it did. They made a lot of the right runs and directional passing, and we had four people score who haven't scored a goal this year.

Freshman Lara Turner provided Union County a 1-0 lead in the 23rd minute off an assist from sophomore Haleigh Helcher. The Lady Panthers extended the margin to 2-0 during the 55th when junior Loralei Skinner found Helton, who pushed the right-footed shot past the Temple keeper.

Union seemed to put the game away 78 seconds later when sophomore Madison Torres fed Helton for a 3-0 lead with 24 minutes to play.

"I thought that would be enough for us, but it proves why you never want to let up," Coach Hunter said. "Our team is like a diesel engine. It takes some time to get warmed up, but once we start firing, we score multiple goals in a really short period of time. So I knew that wave was coming, but it's just wondering, when's it going to get here?

After two stops by McKechnie in the 59th, the Tigers found the net in the 63rd when a shot deflected off a defender and beyond the outstretched arms of the Union goalkeeper.
