

Track: Union wins six events, sets four school records at region

UCHS qualifies 25 athletes for State Sectionals in 20 events

Nicholson - Union County track and field set four school records en route to six region championships during last week's two-day 8-AA Championship meet at East Jackson High School.

Sophomore Ava Lloyd took home the 8-AA title in the 100M race, setting a schoolrecord time of 12.77 seconds. Senior Reagan Covington broke a Union County record during her gold-medal performance in the 400M, clocking in at 1:03.10.

Lloyd, alongside Giovanna Salazar, Ariel McCarter and Nomi Nelson, was a member of the girls' 4x200 relay team that finished first with a time of 1:51.95.

Nelson also won the region in the triple jump with a distance of 30 feet, 10 inches.

Senior Benton Gregory placed first in the 400M race at 51.17. The boys' 4x100 team of JT Neal, Jonah Kluth, Cade Dockrey and Tyler Parker won gold, crossing the line at 43.50. Senior Taylor Whitehead finished second in the 100M and

200M events, setting school records in both races with times of 10.78 and 21.63, respectively.

Senior Nolan Thompson placed fourth in the 300M hurdles with a UCHS record time of 43.33.

Soccer: No. 1 Model's overtime goal sinks No. 4 Union County in Sweet 16

Rome - No. 4 Union County's postseason journey wrapped up in Rome on Thursday, April 25, following a 1-0 overtime loss at No. 1 Model (19-0-1) in the Class AA Sweet

Model delivered the game's only goal less than 2 minutes into the second overtime session, finding the net from 10 yards out. Moments later, senior defender Seth Rutan picked up his second yellow





card (the team's fifth), prompting an ejection and forcing Union (9-3-3) to play a man down over the final 6+ minutes.

Despite playing shorthanded, the Panthers' went on the attack, nearly scoring the equalizer during the 94th minute, but Benton Gregory's shot was turned away by the Model keeper following an Evan Bohms feed into the box.

Union County got off one more look but Zuriel Mancillas' shot sailed over the crossbar in the 99th.

While the Panthers controlled possession after the break, Model was the aggressor in the first half. The Blue Devils attempted the first three shots of the night before Mancillas was turned away in the 9th minute. Following a Model corner kick in the 12th, Union keeper Ethan McBride stopped free

kicks in the 14th and 19th. Mancillas and Rutan were each unsuccessful in the 29th, while Model failed to convert five free kicks between the 34th and 40th -- one free kick resulting from a Joel Mendoza yellow.
