However, sophomore shanked goal kick left the Lovett Kaylee Helton and freshman Lara Turner led Union County down the stretch, while freshsenior Malachi Patrick missed man keeper Kyra McKechnie established herself as the best stopper in 8-AA.

With Rabun County graduating its do-everything superstar Lara Barnes, the Lady Panthers should enter 2022 as the favorites to return to the top of 8-AA - a location they rarely relinquished during the previous decade - despite the graduations of Scott, Demi Thorn, Katie Baumeister and Anika Shah.
