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Track: Union County qualifies seven for State Championships

Nicholson - Union County High School qualified for this week's Class AA State Championships in seven events during last weekend's State sectionals at East Jackson High

The girls' 4x800 relay team led the way for UCHS on Saturday, May 6 with a thirdplace finish against competition from regions 1, 3, 4 and 8-AA. As expected, Athens Academy set the pace at 10 minutes, 16.21 seconds. Second-place Washington County finished nearly 30 seconds back of the Spartans at 10:45.64. Union County, meanwhile, crossed the line at 10:57.35.

Other state qualifiers in the girls' 4x800 included fourth-place Jeff Davis, fifthplace Banks County and sixthplace Worth County. The final two spots went to Providence Christian and Fitzgerald.

Union County logged three fourth-place finishes, but as head coach Beau Kelley reminded his athletes throughout the day, the goal of sectionals is advancing to state, not placing.

Kluth ended up 11th in the 300 hurdles, as did the boys' 4x200 relay team. Linley Jones came in 12th in the triple jump; Katie Byers (100M hurdles) and Ava Loyd (100M) each finished 13th.

Nolan Thompson (300 hurdles) and Taylor Whitehead (400M) both came in 15th.

The heart and soul of Union County basketball's 2022-23 squad, Eli Underwood, accepted a scholarship to continue his playing career at Cleveland's Truett-McConnell University (TMU) during a signing ceremony at UCHS on Wednesday, May 3.

With all of Underwood's Panther teammates in attendance, their love and respect was on full display as they bid farewell to their big man in the middle. The 6-foot-4 post graduates high school later this month after collecting 23 double-doubles as a senior and leading the program to its first Sweet 16 appearance in seven

years.
"Anytime I get asked to talk about Eli, I'm going to take that opportunity, cause I know that opportunity is going to bring nothing but positive energy to the room, cause that's exactly what Eli does," Union County head basketball coach Corey Garrett said during the ceremony. "I love the dude to death, I'm so proud of him, and I know [his teammates] look up to him so much. All the success he's had on the court can't even touch what he does off the court."

Underwood's journey to the next level began when he reached out to Truett-McConnell head coach Jon Yeh during his senior season, prompting Yeh to attend Union's home win over third-ranked Providence, earning Underwood an invite to Truett's game the following day.

"I'm going to miss everyone [at UCHS], especially my teammates," he said. "I'll never have people like that again, they are awesome, but so is everyone else here.

"I will always remember the relationships and all the fun I had. Not necessarily the things that happened on the court, and we had success on the court, but it's moments from the locker room and going out to eat before the games those are the moments that will stick with me for a long time."

Underwood added that he considered the University of North Georgia but didn't receive a scholarship offer. In closing, Underwood credited those that helped him along

the way.

"Obviously, I want to thank God most of all," he said. "My family, friends and Jaycee (Seabolt) - my girlfriend, my teachers and of course, my teammates. Definitely Coach Garrett, Coach (Anthony) Payne and Coach (Kevin) Hughes. Those three have believed in me since I came into the program. Without them, none of this would be possible."


