National Day of Prayer showcases faith, awareness

The National Day of Prayer was instituted in 1952 by a joint resolution in the United States Congress and signed into law by President Harry S. Truman. In 1988, President Ronald Reagan designated the first Thursday in May of each year as the official observance.

On May 5, the first Thursday in May of 2022, First Baptist Church of Blairsville hosted a regional Day of Prayer program at 5 p.m. that was open to all people, not just in Union County, but all the surrounding counties as well.

As a concession to COVID concerns, the ceremony was both live-streamed and broadcast over the radio.

and invocation by First Baptist Associate Pastor Derrick Hartley, Dr. Al Haywood of Pathway Christian Counseling sang a moving rendition of The Lord's Prayer, accompanied by First Baptist Minister of Music Ed Lawrie.

For people who have never heard The Lord's Prayer put to music before, it was truly beautiful.

Pastor Dave Wesche of All Saints Lutheran Church offered up a prayer of thanksgiving to prayer for the nation.

In years past, the various prayers for the nation were all led by pastors. This year, Enotah Judicial Circuit District Attorney Jeff Langley led the prayer for the nation's governments.

Following a welcome Commissioner Lamar Paris, that we may have an orderly Blairsville Mayor Jim Conley, Union County Sheriff Mack Mason, Union County Fire Chief and EMA Director David Dyer, and Blairsville Police Officer C.J. Townsend stood by as Langley delivered the prayer.

Referring to the Book of Exodus, Langley said that God instructed Moses to choose "men who fear God, men of truth, those who hate dishonest gain" to be leaders.

Clayton Reeves said it was four years ago that the Lord asked him to hold a community barbecue.

He put the event off until this year, deciding that if the pavilion at Meeks Park was open on Mother's Day weekend, Full Throttle Ministries would be there to serve food and the Gospel.

Sure enough, despite the rain, there were about 500 or so people who showed up on May 7 for the get-together in the lower area of the park, which ended up meaning so much more than a free pork dinner.

Shortly after 4 p.m.,

Reeves took to the gazebo to introduce Brandon Matheson, lead pastor of Catalyst Church in Havesville, North Carolina. Matheson was to bless the food, but before doing so, he wanted to deliver God's Word to anyone needing to hear it.


Reeves had gently asked the audience to listen closely, but it didn't seem that the reminder was necessary. All eyes were on Matheson, and some especially moved souls shouted their praises, encouraging him as he ministered.

Early voting now in second week, continues thru May 20

This week is the second of three full weeks of advanced in-person voting for the General Primary Election and Nonpartisan General Election, taking place in the Jury Assembly Room of the Union County Courthouse weekdays through Friday, May 20.

About 1,070 voters cast ballots through the first week

of early voting, including a slow day of weekend voting Saturday, May 7. With just under 20,000 active registered voters, a little more than 5% of the Union County electorate voted during the first week of early voting

In addition to in-person ballot casting, by the end of last week, 72 people had returned absentee-by-mail ballots of 260 requested. The last day to request an absentee-by-mail ballot is Friday, May 13, with the Registrar's Office by close of business day.

People too busy to cast in-person ballots during the three weeks of weekday early voting still have one more chance to participate in weekend early voting this Saturday, May 14. All early voting hours are from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the courthouse, even during lunchtime.

Election Day voting

Election will take place Tuesday, May 24, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the 11 pre-assigned precincts of Union County.

Appearing alongside candidates on the May 24 ballot will be the Education Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax continuation referendum.

Union County voters will be asked to support or reject the continuation of ESPLOST, a countywide 1-cent sales and for both the General Primary use tax levied on purchases of

all applications needing to be in and the Nonpartisan General local goods in support of the Union County School System.

> For more than two decades, Union Countians have supported ESPLOST for use by local schools to build new facilities, renovate existing facilities, upgrade HVAC systems, add to aging bus fleets, update technology and more.



accepted Christ as your savior One tray held fresh-grilled, and believed in His name.

"I wonder if there's a daddy here, you got little kids running around that's going to eat barbecue in a second, but you have never had a time in your life where you bowed the knee of your heart and said, 'Jesus, I don't know you. I've never been born again and I want it, and I call out to You.'"

Matheson transitioned to telling the story of Adam and Eve, saving he felt led to tell the well-known story that evening. In his recounting, he focused on how the world's first people felt and behaved after committing the world's first sin.

"Sin robs of us our innocence," Matheson said. "It lets us know right from wrong . . . But you know what else it does? You know how you know when you're dead spiritually? You know you're naked and you try to cover it somehow.

This led into the most important part of the event. As Matheson held a prayer before blessing the food, he gave folks the opportunity to accept Jesus into their hearts.

"Can I tell you something? God doesn't hate you. Can I tell you something else? There ain't nothing you've ever done in your life that's too big or too bad to make God stop loving you," Matheson said. "How many have done bad in your life?

Just about all hands went up, and as Matheson continued to guide them in prayer, he asked for those who did not know Jesus to raise their hands again. This time, with heads bowed and eyes closed for anonymity, there was no way for the impromptu flock to bring judgment upon itself.

As it turned out, there were five such hands raised, though none but Pastor Matheson knew their faces, and with the power of prayer, he led their troubled souls to Jesus, whether they were being introduced to Him for the first time that day or returning after straying away.

Afterward, upon the blessing of the meal, the newly saved blended seamlessly into the crowd, allowing themselves to be surrounded by love.

At that point, everyone's focus shifted to the dinner table toward the front of the pavilion.

Of particular popularity was Reeves' baked beans featuring pineapple chunks. More than a few participants were seen gathering up spoonfuls to take back home with them, and Sarah Clay was shocked to find that the combination turned out well.

"I'd never think to add pineapple to baked beans, but you know what? It's good," noted Clay after her meal. She and her husband knew Reeves from his last-minute help at their wedding after their caterer's sudden passing, and the couple drove two hours to come see him again.

But to Clay, the best part about Full Throttle's event was its importance to the soul.

"I just got to be around a lot of people I care about some new people I also care about – and it's just a testament of what I feel like God is doing in my own life," Clay said. "And I'm seeing Him move in other peoples' lives at this event.'

Joey Green, who performed bluegrass and gospel music until grabbing his own plate, was there with friends, family, and even the spotted, humorously bovinesque service poodle, Glory Hallelujah.

Green stayed busy for most of the event and beyond, shaking hands and helping pack up instruments. His parents, Joyce and Dean Green, voiced that they were Reeves noted that there was incredibly proud of him for the long journey he had endured in life, to include years of past substance abuse.

"We would go for months at a time not knowing where he was, and you didn't know if he was dead or alive," recalled Joyce, with Dean adding that Cookout was about more than their son had struggled for just the food. three decades with a hard drug addiction.

"He's got a good personality (that) people like," Joyce said of her son, mentioning how that personality had shone through to touch other people while he was in rehab.

"Joey was homeless the Lord, gave his life to the Lord, and now he travels all over the country doing this," Reeves said about Joey and his music. "He's great, man.

Altogether, the barbecue was a smoky, smashing success on both a physical and a spiritual level, as those who attended walked away with full bellies and restored souls. And Reeves was pleased to see such a hunger for the Word of God.

"I thought, you know, there's a lot of people moving here and a lot of people that don't know anybody else,' Reeves said. "And what a way to bring people together and love on people and remind them of Christ's love and forgiveness, and that's the whole reason we're doing this, is just to love on people.'

Interestingly, such a large community gathering wasn't a first for Full Throttle Ministries, as Reeves was happy to explain.

"Being an outreach ministry for 12 years now, we do a thing on July 4," he said, referencing the Independence Day bash that has been going on for 10 of those 12 years.

On a larger scale than Saturday's cookout, Reeves estimated that close to 1,000 people show up for sandwiches before fireworks start to shower the night sky during each year's Meeks Park display.

When God told him to host another gathering, Reeves took inspiration from the summertime event, saying, "So today, I thought we were going to prepare for 500-600, and what shows up, shows up."

Later, on Facebook, no food left to clean up; the leftovers had all been taken home to the families of attendees or consumed by those wanting a third helping.

But for the five who found their way back to their Father, Clayton Reeves' Community




