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10U Baseball claims District 7 title, advances to State tourney

Dahlonega - The Union County Recreation Department's 10U baseball team traveled an unconventional path to this week's GRPA State Tournament in Jeff Davis County.

Sitting in the catbird seat heading into the District 7 championship on Monday, June 12, Union County suffered consecutive losses to host Lumpkin County to finish

However, due to a protest filed by Union County there would be no postgame trophy presentation.

During Union's first loss vs. Lumpkin County, the Indians used its ace pitcher more than the maximum 120 pitches allowed for the tournament. But with Lumpkin still needing another win, the protest would be rendered moot if Union secured the game-two victory.

Unfortunately, Union's comeback bid in the nightcap came up short. The Panthers couldn't overcome a 6-0 deficit, along with a 25-minute power outage at Dahlonega's Yahoola Creek Park, eventually falling 11-8 in what appeared to be a season-ending loss.

Union County's protest wasn't determined until Wednesday, when the GRPA announced that Union County would head to state as the District 7 champion. Lumpkin's appeal was quickly shot down, and adding insult to injury, the GRPA took over this week's 8U State Tournament from the



Following two solid weeks of basketball camps, Union County head coach Corey Garrett expects his team to go out on a high note at the University of North Georgia.

The Union County men are through two-thirds of their summer camp season and will wrap up this week with three days of games at the University of North Georgia.

Union County will play three games per day at UNG on Monday and Tuesday, then participate in a camp tournament on Wednesday. The Panthers opened Monday morning vs. Dominion Christian.







