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Perry's Panthers finding playmakers on both sides of the football

Hiawassee - Union County football saw its first 7-on-7 action of the summer at Towns County High School on Thursday, June 24, as one of five participating teams in the annual Fellowship of Christian Athletes' offensive lineman and 7-on-7 camp.

Under the direction of first-year head coach Michael Perry and new defensive coordinator Thomas Nelson, the Panthers clicked from the first possession, taking all three contests by a combined tally of 102-37. (All point-totals are unofficial since the camp did not "We did a great job catch-

ing the ball today, I think we only had two drops all day," Perry said at the conclusion of the camp. "I'm very proud of the offense, but I'm prouder of the defense because 7-on-7 is hard. It's not easy keeping teams out of the endzone and we forced a couple turnovers too, so I'm very proud of them." Defensively, the morning

got underway with an interception on the very first series when rising-senior cornerback Trace Wright ran under a Chestatee overthrow in the endzone to spark the Panthers to a commanding 19-0 advantage.

Earlier, with Union already out front 12-0, rising senior quarterback Logan Helcher fired a dime over the middle, connecting with the outstretched hands of wide receiver Caleb John on a deep post route in

The Panthers' final interception of the morning helped put Towns County away for good, setting up one last touchdown in the waning moments.

Rising sophomores Tyler Grasty and Caiden Tanner put an exclamation point on the day when Grasty hauled in a one-handed, over-the-shoulder touchdown catch from Tanner, opening up a 28-point margin over the rival Indians.

Defensively, Union County picked off three passes in the three games - two by Wright and another courtesy of rising senior cornerback Eli Peugh.

"They all played well [defensively]," Nelson said. "We have a lot of work to do before

the season starts, [but] they are improving as an overall group. Trace Wright, Griff Young, Wilson Walker and rising freshman Jensen Goble are doing well at safety (Walker and Goble each turned in a stellar offensive performance with a pair of touchdown catches).
