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Softball: New-look Lady Panthers primed and ready for opening day

The first day of school might be a week away, but the 2022-23 UCHS athletic calendar opens this weekend when the Lady Panthers softball team hosts Commerce and Lumpkin County for 'Diamond Day' on Saturday, The action gets under-

way at 11 a.m. when Union County and Lumpkin County clash in the 2022 season opener. Following a Lumpkin County vs. Commerce meeting at 1 p.m., the Lady Panthers and Commerce will finish the day's action with a

With a first-year head coach and nine departed seniors from 2021, Union County softball will look different this fall as they begin their quest for the program's third region title in a refurbished Region 8-AA.

Former UCMS head coach and UCHS assistant Carissa Owenby takes over for head coach Stephen Mitchell, who departed Blairsville following an Elite Eight appearance in his fourth and final season at the helm.

However, the cupboard isn't completely bare for Owenby with the return of junior ace Sierra Burnette following two stellar seasons in the circle and a breakout 2021 campaign with her bat. As a sophomore, Burnette compiled a 10-8 record and a 2.95 ERA over 102 innings after posting a 2.78 ERA in 37 2/3 frames in 2020.

At the plate, Burnette's two homers tied for the team lead and her 17 RBIs were second most. Her nine doubles and 12 extra base hits topped Union County during a 2021 season that saw Burnette hit .340 with a .575 slugging percentage.

Gladding joined Union County midway through the 2021 season and didn't miss a beat, hitting .367 and slugging .600 in 15 games. Her go-ahead 3-run homer in the seventh inning of Union County's Sweet 16 win over Toombs County helped propel the Lady Panthers to their first Elite Eight in five years.

Perhaps the most experienced Lady Panther is senior infielder Chloe Potts, who has tallied 33 hits, 25 runs and 13 stolen bases in more than 160 plate appearances over the previous three seasons while spending most of her time at second base.

Meanwhile, first base third base and shortstop are all positions that belonged to experienced seniors in 2021 and are Owenby's biggest concern entering 2022.

senior and she will find her way on the field somewhere,"

Junior catcher Gracie Owenby said. "We're looking at her at third and first, and maybe at catcher too. The other spots will probably go to Sloane Dyer and Ila Bragg. We also have [junior] Georgia Patton, who plays shortstop.'

The sophomore duo of Bragg and Dyer should also see action in the pitcher's circle as they battle for the No. 2 spot behind Burnette. Despite combining for 11 2/3 varsity innings, Bragg and Dyer spent most of 2021 on the JV squad. But with the graduation of Union County's previous No. 2 pitcher, Tori Tracy (35 1/3 innings in 2021), both should see a substantial innings increase this fall.

As for Patton, she appeared in 18 games in 2021, scoring eight runs while seeing most of her action on the base paths.

Returning junior Katie "Jaycee Seabolt is a Byers is expected to take on a more significant role in 2022. She hit .333 last year, scoring

nine runs with six steals in 19 games, primarily as a courtesy runner. Playing behind centerfielder Aubrey Banton for the past two years, Byers finally receives an opportunity to show off her elite glovework

As for the corner outfield spots, senior leftfielder Caroline Karnes returns to the program after sitting out the 2021 season. As a sophomore, Karnes appeared in 14 games during the 2020 campaign.

Junior Jewel Massey is the favorite to patrol right field after swiping eight bags in 17 games last year.

The Lady Panthers added two freshman pitchers, Ayla Jamison and Jaslyn Roberts, giving Owenby four capable arms if needed.

Another player to watch this fall is Brooklyn Brown, who drew high praise from

kind of stuck behind Chloe [Potts], but she's fantastic and a great teammate," Owenby said. "She always keeping us hyped up and she's always supportive of everybody all the time."

Others returning from last year include Lilly Collins, Lily Helton, Anniston Howse, Mikala Souther and Bella Stepp.

On Saturday, Owenby doesn't anticipate any restrictions on her pitchers, but she hopes to get a look at as many players as possible.

"I want to see everyone and what they can do,' she said. "But there is no limitations [on the pitchers]. They've been playing travel ball all summer so they should be ready to go.

"Overall, I hope we play to our ability and communicate well on the field. I want our girls to be supportive of each it's always fun to let the girls other and be good teammates, and just show everyone what

During the offseason, Region 8-AA underwent a massive shakeup with the departures of Rabun County and Elbert County. Replacing the two longtime region foes is East Jackson, and Providence Christian (Lilburn). Other region newcomers Athens Academy and Fellowship Christian are not playing softball.

Among the newcomers, East Jackson is the most likely contender for a region title after finishing third in 8-AAA a year ago.

Providence squeaked into the Class A-Private playoffs but lost to ELCA in consecutive games by a combined score of 28-0 during the first With four-straight re-

gion titles, Banks County once again enters with a bullseye on its back. But Owenby believes that despite the graduation losses, her squad could be in the hunt to dethrone the Leopards in October. "I'm just excited to get
