Union County millage rate lower than last year

The county portion of property taxes to be collected in 2016 will be \$77,215 lower than last year, thanks to a lowered millage rate.

Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris set the new millage rate – 5.788 mills – in a meeting called for the specific purpose of setting the rate on Thursday, Aug. 11.

The new rate is a tenth of a mill lower than the 2015 millage rate, which was 5.888 mills and levied \$7,128,400 in county property taxes that year, as compared to the new rate that will levy \$7,051,185 for 2016.

And though the new

millage rate will leave the upcoming 2017 budget about \$680,000 short compared to the current budget, Commissioner Paris decided to lower the rate anyway for several reasons.

After having studied the most recent county audit of the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 2015, which saw General Fund revenues up \$1.64 million compared to the previous year, the commissioner noted that the county was in strong financial shape with a solid 4.7 months of potential emergency reserve funds, a position that could help to close the budget gap if needed.

Commissioner Paris also said he believes that he and the various county department heads will be able to make budget cuts and adjustments

to reduce that deficit.

“Based on the fact that we have had a good revenue year this last year, and that our county reserves have been able to increase this year – even though our budget next year is going up and may even exceed, and probably will exceed, the amount of revenue that this millage rate will bring in, we’re still going to try to pass along a little bit of savings to the public,” said Commissioner Paris in the meeting.

Added Commissioner Paris: “We’re optimistic about revenue projections for this year, too, that they will exceed what we estimated. So unless we have a disaster in the economy, we really think that we’ll be able to be in as good a shape at the end of this year

as we are at this point in time now.”

Keeping the millage rate the same as last year would have also resulted in an upcoming budget shortfall, but the commissioner wanted to pass on a break in property taxes, however much revenues were up last year and so far this year.

“I’d already determined that we wanted to lower the millage because we had a good year,” said Commissioner Paris. “I don’t want to save up this big reserve and take the taxpayer’s money and draw interest on it – they had rather draw interest on their own money.”

Blairsville man killed in Murphy Highway crash


A 37-year-old Blairsville man died in a two-car crash that occurred Tuesday, Aug. 9, on Murphy Highway.

Michael “Mickey” Whatley perished in the accident, which happened about 150 feet south of Leslie Lane on US 129-N, according to the Georgia State Patrol.

Whatley was driving a Mike’s Heating & Air van south on Murphy Highway, when a Ford truck traveling in the northbound lane crossed the double-yellow centerline before striking the front of Whatley’s vehicle with its front, according to state patrol.

Both vehicles spun counterclockwise, with the truck coming to a stop facing south in the southbound lane of Murphy Highway, while

The event, a spin-off on the hit reality TV show, will feature 11 local celebrities from both Towns and Union counties performing a wide variety of dances with professional dance partners.


Following the show will be a Dancing with the North Georgia Stars Gala at the North Georgia Technical
