partment was one of many public safety organizations who were invited to participate in the North Georgia Technical College's Active Shooter Exercise on August 5, 2016. The exercise was conducted to train employees of the school on how to deal with an active shooter event on campus and to test the latest response procedures of public safety when responding to an active shooter situation.

The exercise involved a scenario where a person entered the school and began shooting faculty and students. Faculty called 911 and began their response procedures. Units were dispatched to the scene as if the real event was occurring. Upon arrival, officers from Union County Sheriff's Office and Blairsville Police quickly eliminated the active shooter. They then began a sweep of the entire building and provided security for fire and EMS personnel to remove the injured to a safe triage area. The exercise continued off campus by having the injured transported to Union General Hospital where they were triaged and treated. The scene was then turned over to the Sheriff's office investigation unit. The scenario involved many aspects and phases of a real active shooter event and a mass casualty scenario.

The exercise provided everyone an opportunity to practice skills and to test procedures. It was also an opportunity to learn new techniques. Everyone is looking for improvement in order to better respond to a chaotic and stressful situation. After an exercise such as this, all departments will evaluate their response and determine what procedural changes are needed. Having clear procedures and practicing them in these exercises helps to improve the outcome. It is very important that all organizations work together to save as

derivative and it is considered to be a strong stimulant. Its chemical structure is similar to two other synthetic drugs, methamphetamine and MDA. MDMA can produce stimulant effects such as an enhanced sense of pleasure and self-confidence and increased energy. Its psychedelic effects include feelings of peacefulness, acceptance, and empathy. Users claim they experience feelings of closeness with others and a desire to touch them.

According to the Government and Drug Agencies, MDMA has become a nationwide problem as well as a serious health threat. It is known to be lethal. Combining MDMA with alcohol or depressants can increase the possibility of negative effects including sedation, dehydration, exhaustion, overheating, and heart failure.

The Rohypnol pill ("roofies") looks like aspirin. Like alcohol, the drug is considered a date rape drug of choice; attackers slip the drug into victims' drinks to promote disinhibition. The drug is given to unwary victims (male or female) without their consent. The victim is physically incapacitated and has impaired judgment. This makes icums more vumerable to assault and rape. Be cause of the memory loss and confusion under the influence of this drug, rape cases are difficult to prosecute. Rohypnol is an odorless, colorless, tasteless drug. If you or someone you trust did not open the container, do not eat or drink its contents. Never leave an open drink unattended and avoid punch bowls which may be spiked. If you

Commissioner's Questions Transfer Station, Part I

Q. When will the mess at the Transfer Station be cleaned up? A. It should be fairly soon. We are in the middle of a to-

tal redo and as soon as it is completed there will be a major change in the appearance and operation. The first phase should be completed within a couple of weeks. The second phase we will be working on over the winter.



Q. What kind of changes are being made at the Transfer Station? A. You will be able to see soon.

Basically, the worst part of the operation is that we are having so many non-commercial people weighing their bagged garbage instead of paying for it by the bag. This is backing up the whole process and slowing it down for everyone. In addition, this puts our regular household customers mixed in among the commercial haulers in the one small building that was not designed for the general public. Not only is it messy, but it slows down the entire process, it is unsanitary and it is potentially dangerous.

Q. What is the county doing to clean up the operation?

A. Beginning in a couple of weeks, the new road entrance you may have seen if you have been to the Transfer Station recently, will be used for all non-commercial bagged garbage only, and the old transfer building will be for commercial haulers only or those with large trailer loads of mixed products such as construction debris.

Q. Why is this change being made to the garbage transfer station?

A. It is a mess and has been for a long time. But it is for two main reasons. The first is for safety and cleanliness. The second is to make the revenue process more fair.

Q. Why is the process not fair at the transfer station?

A. Well it has been a problem that just developed over time without anyone really realizing how bad it had gotten. Our garbage prices have become so cheap, cheaper than all around us, and so we are starting to have people from the edge of Fannin, Towns and even NC bring their garbage to Union County. A few weeks ago we had staff checking how the process was broken. A good

You can find Melissa many products that Mattee claim to repel mosquitoes, but the best way to get rid of mosquitoes is to make sure that your property is free of sites where they like to gather. Many female mosquitoes need to drink blood in order to make eggs, making them excellent transmitters of disease. Hours after a female fills her stomach with blood, she begins producing eggs. In about three days, she will lay those eggs in stagnant water. This water could be anything that does not have a current such as the edge of a lake, rainwater in old tires and cans, and sometimes even water that has collected in leaves of plants, among other places. Once the eggs are laid, they hatch within one day. The larvae that hatch out of the eggs attach their breathing tube, or "siphon," to the surface of the water. Because the siphon is on the tail end of the larvae, the young mosquitoes hang upside down. This allows them to stay completely submerged in the water while still being able to breathe. As larvae, mosquitoes feed on particles in the water that they sift through their simple mouths. After about seven to ten days, depending on the weather, the mosquitoes enter a "pupal" stage that looks like a tadpole. They do not eat during this stage, but two days later they move to the surface of the water and turn into adults which then fly off to mate and find food. Male mosquitoes never drink blood, but instead feed on nectar. In fact, in some species of mosquitoes, neither the male nor the female ingests blood and the females can still produce eggs. However, many of the female mosquitoes that we have around here still require blood. Because they have terrible eyesight, mosquitoes rely on their strong sense of smell that can allow them to detect the carbon dioxide that we breathe out as well as other odors that our skin releases. Once a mosquito finds a host, it takes about five minutes for her to completely fill her stomach and ingest enough blood to produce one clutch of eggs. The best way to cut down on any mosquito problems would be to get rid of as many sources of standing water as possible. Bird baths and kiddie pools are perfect breeding grounds for these insects, so emptying them and replacing the water every few days will prevent the larvae from developing in them. If you have a water source that cannot be emptied, a very thin layer of oil at the top can prevent the larvae's siphons from attaching to the surface of the water, causing them See *Mattee*, page 5B

There are many worthwhile RC&D projects that Chest/

Chatt has been involved with in the past 52 years that fulfill this mission, but there is one in particular that still stands out today. It was completed in 1983 and is enjoyed by many people every year here in the north Georgia Mountains. Hamilton Gardens at Lake Chatuge is located above the Georgia Mountain Fair in Hiawassee. Chest/Chatt RC&D was instrumental in funding and developing the project and the brass plaque on the pedestal at the gardens gives credit to Chestatee/Chattahoochee Resource & Development and Blue Ridge Soil & Water for its help, both of whom are still helping people today.

The following is a description of the gardens and how they came to be. "Quietly tucked away in the North Georgia Mountains, sits a rare and special treasure, a botanical paradise fairly bursting with dogwood, tulip magnolias, native azaleas, wild flowers, trillium, and rhododendron with over 400 varieties of Rhododendron - 3,000 plants in all. Hamilton Gardens is a truly enchanted spot, boasting one of the largest collection of rhododendrons in the state of Georgia. You can stroll tranquil pine bark trails as they wind through lush foliage and drink in the stunning views of Lake Chatuge and breathtaking countryside, including the majestic rise of Brasstown Bald, Georgia's highest peak.

In the early 1950s Fred Hamilton, an executive of the Sears Roebuck Company, bought a home in the Atlanta area and was delighted to discover native plants, including rhododendrons and azaleas, on the site. He and his wife Hazel later purchased a place in Towns County near the "Hog Creek" community. There, they found more rhododendrons and other wild native plants. This sparked their interest in creating a lush garden where they brought many other varieties of rhododendron from all over the world. The Hamilton's were happy to share the beauty of their gardens with others and invited visitors to tour the grounds. As time went by and the gardens grew, caretakers were needed to help maintain them, and Mr. Hamilton began to realize that he could no longer care for the gardens as he once did. He searched for a place to donate his extensive collection of rhododendrons, where the conditions were right and the soil conducive to their growth. Tests were done and a compatible soil was discovered at the grounds of the Georgia Mountain Fair.

In the meantime Patrick's mother had been walking the floors wondering about her boy. Patrick's dad had long since gone to bed telling Mrs. Fix, "Don't worry he is fine".
