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Panthers hand Fannin worst home-opening loss in 39 years

Rader's four TDs highlight Union's 300-yard rushing performance in 50-12 win

Blue Ridge - Union County blew things open with 35 unanswered points, then added a late score to deliver Fannin County its worst homeopening loss since 1984 in a 50-12 rout on Thursday night. The 38-point margin

marked the most lopsided road victory in the rivalry's 32-game history, topping Union County's 36-0 victory in 2000. On a 303-yard rushing

night from the Panthers' offense, Braylen Rader provided most of the heavy lifting, recording a career-best four touchdowns during a bruising 135-yard performance. "Our offensive line just

took control of the game, and that let Rader do his thing,' Union County head coach Michael Perry said. Three of Rader's scores

came during an opening half where Union County seized control in the second quarter for a commanding 28-6 advantage With Union's aerial at-

tack struggling to find a rhythm against a Rebels' defense keyed on the passing game, Rader established himself early and

"I couldn't have done any of it without my offensive line," Rader said after the game. "They played their butts off. It's not just me, it's the entire team. But it feels good to get this rivalry win. I think I speak for everyone when I say we all wanted to play our hearts out tonight."

Meanwhile, the Panthers' defense limited Fannin County to 268 yards of offense and forced three turnovers, beginning with senior Kooper Ashcraft's fumble recovery on the game's second play from scrimmage.

Starting at the Rebels' 27, Union County needed four plays to grab a 7-0 lead when Rader found a crease on second and goal from the seven.

Fannin responded with a six-play, 72-yard scoring drive capped off by a 31-yard read-option keeper by junior quarterback Lawson Sullivan. Union remained out front when a mishandled snap resulted in a botched point-after.

"Fannin came out in a five-man box because they were definitely concerned about (wide receiver) Jensen Goble," Perry said. "Their game plan was to stop Goble and he was pair of third downs; however, getting hit a bunch.' The Panthers' passing at-

tack finally got on track before halftime after the teams traded punts on the heels of Tanner's interception. Starting at the Fannin 38, Tanner hit Grasty underneath on second and 8, and the senior cut upfield for 20. Two plays later, Tanner and Goble hooked up on a quick 5-yard scoring strike over the middle to build a 21-6 margin.

Another Fannin punt awarded the offense one last crack with 1:28 before the half, and senior Zach Taylor delivered the catch of the night, pulling down a Tanner jump ball at the three. One play later, the Union defense set up Tanner Rader notched his third score with excellent field position, of the half when he slipped into but after converting a fourth the endzone with 36 seconds on down that moved the offense the clock.

Union began the third by

going 63 yards on five plays, highlighted by junior Connor Schuknecht's 26-yard carry and

a 25-yard scoring run by Tanner. "[Fannin] jumped Goble on that touchdown run so they had nobody on the quarterback and that's how [Tanner] had that long run," Perry said. "We knew if they were doing that we'd have success running the ball, and as they say, 'if it ain't broke, don't fix it.' We also had some really good downfield blocking by our receivers. Ethan McBride threw a big block that sprung Tanner's touchdown."

Schuknecht showed out on the defensive end moments later, stepping up from his outside linebacker spot to drop a scrambling Sullivan for an 8-yard loss. With the Panthers taking over near midfield, Schuknecht's backfield mate, Rader, landed the knockout

On the possession's first play, the senior back bowlingballed way into the endzone by Grasty on a 53-yard touch-

Fannin's last gasp was denied by senior Taylor Whitehead's interception when he ripped a completed pass away from the Rebels' receiver inside the 5-yard line.

"Our defense line stepped up (with Lane Lance injured), and David Heredia played outstanding as usual," Perry said. "[Rutan] played very well and played through cramps; Whitehead and Schuknecht came up with some big plays for us on

Fannin added an 11-play scoring drive to bring the margin to 42-12 during a runningclock fourth quarter.

Not to be outdone, the Union County reserves closed out the game in style via a 65yard drive punctuated by freshman Bentley Rich's 13-yard run during the waning moments.

Schuknecht opened the series with carries of 30, 5 and 2 yards, respectively. Freshman quarterback Chetley Cox added 2 yards on third and 3, then series 17-15 vs. Fannin County. -- breaking six tackles while Schuknecht got six on fourth picking up a downfield block and 1. Cox's keeper went for seven on first down, and Rich vs. Southeast Whitfield. closed out the drive on the next

The Panthers finished with a 50-piece when Tanner scooped up a bad snap on the PAT and found a wide-open Grasty for 2 points -- Union's first 50-point road performance since putting up 74 at Putnam County in 2019.

Extra points: The 38-point margin at Fannin not only marked Union's most onesided road win in the series but will go down as the rivalry's second most lopsided victory behind the Panthers' 49-7 rout in 2018. Union County now owns four of the five largest blowouts in the series.

* Rader becomes the first Panther to rush for four touchdowns since quarterback Logan Helcher's four TDs vs. Gilmer in 2021. No Union County running back has gone for four touchdowns in a game since Bo Lynch vs. East Hall on Sept. 30, 2016. Later in the 2016 season, quarterback Cole Wright rushed for four touchdowns in the regular season finale vs. Lumpkin County. Another QB, Joe Mancuso, scored four times on the ground vs. Greene County on Oct. 9, 2015.

* Union County's last 300-yard road rushing game came vs. Coach Perry's East Hall squad during the 2019 season opener. The Panthers went for 332 vs. Providence at home last October.
