

Football: Panthers use 28-point second quarter to sink Towns

Union aims to match 2021 win total Friday at unbeaten Armuchee

Hiawassee - Dealing with rain showers for a third straight week, Union County used 35 unanswered points to break the contest wide open in a 49-7 victory at Towns County, marking the program's highest road point total in three years.

Junior running back Braylen Rader topped the century mark for the first time, piling up 125 yards rushing and two scores on 18 carries. Overall, the Panthers' ground attack rolled to 178 yards and three touchdowns while averaging 5.7 yards per carry.

Despite the offense putting up a season-high 368 yards on Friday, the Union special teams were the unit responsible for dealing the knockout blow right before halftime.

Ahead 28-7 with 19 seconds before the break, the Union defense brought up a fourthand-1 at the Towns 30-yard line, where the Indians were content to run out the clock. But Panthers head coach Michael Perry burned a timeout to extend the half, hoping to benefit from a blocked punt or a Jensen Goble return in the final seconds.

But the Panthers wouldn't need either as the Indians awarded the visitors six points heading to the locker room. The snap sailed high over the punter's head and rolled to a stop near the 5-yard line, resulting in a freefor-all that amounts to catching a greased pig on a slip-and-slide.

Junior Kooper Ashcraft eventually pounced on the loose football in the end zone, and Ethan McBride's point-after opened up a 35-7 halftime advantage

"The special teams were a big reason why we won that game," Perry said. "Coach [Mark] Wade did a great job getting all our special teams guys ready to play. We had great field position after kick returns for most of the night and getting that touchdown right before halftime was huge. So special teams played a very significant role in our victory.'

The Panthers' defense forced a quick three-and-out to begin the third, and the offense fumbled the football at the Towns County 6-yard line, concluding a ding out of the gates, going wheel route for 33 yards and 10-play, 48-yard drive.

After the Union turnover, Elijah Helton forced a fumble at the Indians' 9-yard line, leading to a Rader score on the ensuing play. The junior back blasted his way through two defensive backs from 8 yards out, following a touchdown-springing block from junior guard Mayo Collins-Spiva.

"The offensive line got much better as the game went on," Perry said. "Our red zone issues against Lumpkin were mainly attributed to the offensive line and we were much better, that is something I put a huge emphasis on this week. We were able to get the ground game going [at Towns] and Braylen Rader ran extremely hard. Connor Schuknecht did a good job too, he just needs to work on holding onto the football."

hands of an Indians' defender. However, junior defensive tackle Lane Lance made a big play of his own, dropping Towns quarterback Connor Chastain for a 7-yard loss on second-and-15, leading to another Indians punt two plays later.

Ón the fourth play of the ensuing Panthers' possession, Tanner went deep over the middle to Goble on third-and-7, resulting in a 55-yard touchdown when the junior receiver ran under the throw at the 25 and outran the defensive back to the end zone.

"Honestly, we just saw something on that play," Goble said after the game. "I looked over at coach [before the touchdown catch] and said 'hey, we got the post in the middle of the field.' We ran it and it ended up working out for us."

According to Perry, the Indians' cornerbacks played tight coverage on the outside against Union, which was a departure from their previous outings

"Against everyone else, the corners played 10 yards off, but against us they were jumping everything really quick," he said. "That's why early on, we were caught five passes for 75 yards the finish line at 5-5. doing some quick passes and

Sam Page and junior Nolan Thompson were both responsible for six tackles. Junior end David Heredia delivered five stops with two TFL; senior tackle Elijah Haynes had three tackles and a fumble recovery.

Extra points: Historically, winning at least two of three to open the year has been Union County football's recipe for success. One must go back to 1982 to find the last time Union began 2-1 or better and ended with a losing record. Meanwhile, the 1988 season marks the last time Union started 1-2 or worse and rallied to five or more wins.

*In seasons where the Panthers begin at least 2-1 after three outings, they've averaged 7 wins a year dating back to 1975. On the flip side of that coin, they average 2.7 wins when starting 1-2 or worse.

Union County is now 32-1 vs. the Indians with a 17-0 record in Hiawassee.

*This year marks the 10th anniversary of the last onepossession game between the Panthers and Indians - a 17-14 Union victory at Towns County to open the 2012 season.

*As mentioned earlier, Union's 49 points marked the highest scoring output on the road since its record-setting 74-57 win at Putnam County on Sept. 27, 2019. The Panthers also posted their highest nonovertime point total under Perry, matching last November's 49-48 overtime win vs. Gilmer at Mike Colwell Memorial Stadium.

* During Perry's 54 games over five-plus seasons as a head coach, his teams have scored at least 49 points on eight different occasions, the most coming in a 70-42 win over North Atlanta while leading Centennial during the 2018 season.

Up next: Union County travels to Rome on Friday for its first-ever meeting with the undefeated Armuchee Indians out of Region 7-A. A Panthers' victory would equal last season's win total (3-7).

Armuchee is 2-0 with two narrow victories on its resume: A 17-14 win over Gordon Lee (1-3) and a 10-6 victory over winless Gordon Central. Last year, Armuchee opened with four straight wins, including a 31-14 home victory over Towns County, before limping across

Despite the late drop-off, Armuchee's five wins were the most in a decade, while coming within a game of the program's first playoff berth since 2009. Senior quarterback Chandler DeSanto returns under center for his fourth year as starter. But elsewhere, the Indians lack experience with only five seniors on the roster. Armuchee graduated four receivers from 2021 and will lean on a trio of juniors this fall. The Indians' defense returns a pair of all-region selections at linebacker and cornerback, but their most potent weapon may be a member of the special teams. Junior kicker Grayson Perry is an all-state candidate and booted a game-winning 40-yard field goal during the final seconds vs. Gordon Lee. "They are 2-0 and it's a long road trip, but we're looking forward to the challenge of facing an unbeaten team at their place," Perry said. "They haven't seen much of the spread offense this year so we hope that's something that works in our favor." Armuchee's H.A. Lindsey Stadium is located on campus at 4203 Martha Berry Hwy, Rome, GA 30165. Kickoff is at 7:30 p.m.

they were jumping it, right from the first play of the game. That was something we didn't expect, so we decided if they're going to play that way then we'll have to beat them over the top.'

The Indians responded by going 74 yards on nine plays to slice the lead in half. Towns County went 3-for-3 on third downs during the drive, including a 6-yard touchdown carry on third-and-1. The Panthers rattled off 35 straight points to put things out of reach, but not before the Indians pressed Tanner into another timely thirddown throw.

Young returned the Towns County kickoff to the 45-yard line, where Tanner immediately hit McBride for 13 yards. Later, on third-and-7 from the Indians' 38, Young put the finishing touches on a drive he initiated, blowing past the cornerback and running wide open down the seam. Tanner hit him stride at the 5-yard line to open up a 21-7 advantage with 5:10 remaining in the second quarter.

A shanked punt, coming on the heels of another Towns County three-and-out, gifted the Union offense possession at

yards and a score on two receptions. McBride finished with 13 yards on one catch.

Schuknecht rushed seven times for 28 yards and one touchdown. Tanner had 17 yards on four carries, while senior Liam Cone added 8 yards rushing.

Helton led the defense with 12 stops, three tackles for loss (TFL) and two forced fumbles.

"Elijah Helton's tackle on the quarterback was one of the best hits I've ever seen in high school football," Perry said. "I think it was during the second quarter, but he got him good. It was a great tackle."

Junior Taylor Whitehead tallied a career-high nine tackles; junior Seth Rutan had eight tackles, three resulting in a loss, and a fumble recovery.

Senior three-year starters Gage Barnes and Wilson Walker recorded seven stops apiece, with Barnes making three tackles behind the line and Walker securing two.

With six tackles, three TFL, one sack and seven QB hurries, Lance proved problematic for the Indians' offensive line. In the secondary, senior

In its final non-region tune-up match, Union County (7-5) rallied to win threestraight sets over Fannin after dropping the first, 23-25.

The Panthers begin Region 8-AA competition on Thursday when they travel to private-school powerhouse Athens Academy - the defending Class A-Private State runner-up.

During the 3-1 (23-25, 25-19, 25-13, 25-23) victory on Thursday, Sept. 1, Union County watched first-set advantages of 19-11 and 23-18 evaporate into a 25-23 Rebels win.

Set two (25-19): Tied at 12-12 in the second set, the Panthers opened up some breathing room at 15-12, beginning with a block from sophomore Lily Brookshire. Moments later, with Union clinging to a 15-14 advantage, two unforced Fannin errors helped the Panthers build a 19-15 margin.

Senior Kaylee Ashcraft recorded a kill at the net, followed by an ace, to mount a 21-17 edge before the two squads traded service errors. Senior Saylor Noe's late dagger secured the set and a 25-19 win.

"Our blocking was amazing tonight," head coach Megan Brown said after the




