## Goble's 4 TDs pace Panthers to third-straight win

**Oakwood** - Senior wide-out Jensen Goble found the endzone four times and the Union County defense limited West Hall to a season-low 129 yards in a 42-7 road blowout on Friday night.

Goble ended the night with 13 catches for 126 yards. It's believed his baker's dozen matches Blake Gowder's 15-year-old school record, stemming from a 13-reception, 220-yard outing at Fannin County in 2008.

Three of Goble's four touchdowns at West Hall (1-3) were courtesy of throws from Caiden Tanner, who also ran for a score during a 310-yard, four-touchdown performance through the air. Goble added another touchdown on the ground, taking a jet-sweep 8 yards for a 14-7 first-quarter lead.

Tanner, meanwhile, carved up the Spartans' defense, completing 26 of his 30 pass attempts -- both season highs -- while adding a 5-yard keeper to punctuate Union's 8-play, 80-yard opening drive.

"We have a bunch of guys that just want to work hard and all love each other," Goble said after the game. "We love coming to work every day and doing what we do."

West Hall needed only six plays to answer Union's first drive, using runs of 36 and 21 yards to begin the series. Four plays later, the Spartans punched it in from 6 yards to even the score at 7-7.

Tanner, who started the night by completing his first 15 passes, fired back by leading the offense on another 8-play scoring drive, this one covering 68 yards and sparking 35 unanswered points.

Union's second series commenced with consecutive gives to Braylen Rader for 9 and 2 yards. Two plays later, Tanner hit Cade Dockrey downfield on a diving completion at the West Hall 26. From there, a quick screen to Goble picked up 14, and on third-and-6 from the eight, Goble found room outside, slipping inside the right pylon via an 8-yard scoring run.

Up 14-7, the Panthers (4-1) set up shop at their own 41 following a quick three-and-out from the defense. Three straight handoffs, two to junior Connor Schuknecht, moved Union across midfield with a fresh

set of downs. Moments later, a pair of second-down receptions by senior Ethan McBride had Union County knocking on the door of the red zone at the 21.

McBride's evening concluded with a career-high six catches and high praise from his coach.

"Ethan McBride is the unsung hero of that game," Union County head coach Michael Perry said. "He just kept moving the chains for us. I really want to brag on him cause he's such a good route runner. He's consistent and you can count on him to be where he needs to be and catch the football."

Tanner's third-and-4 scramble picked up five, and on first-and-goal, the Spartans lost track of Goble on a drag route, and the senior waltzed untouched into the endzone.

Union County made it 28-7 at the half when West Hall punted following one first down, and the Panthers took over at the 35 with 7:50 left in the second.

Union went to the ground for the bulk of its 13-play, 65-yard scoring drive, highlighted by Rader runs of 10 and 18 yards before the senior workhorse finished off the series with a 3-yard touchdown catch at the 3:15 mark.

After giving up a touchdown on West Hall's opening drive, the Panthers' defense refused to suffer the same fate in the second half. On the third play of the third quarter, Schuknecht applied pressure from the backside, forcing an off-balance throw that allowed senior Taylor Whitehead to jump the comeback route at the 18-yard line and return the interception 13 yards.

"If he would have just cut to the sideline, like he's supposed to, he would have scored," Perry said with a laugh. "But as good as the defense has been playing lately, it's surprising we haven't forced more turnovers."

The pick at West Hall

marked Union's first defensive turnover since Aug. 25 and the first interception since Whitehead at Fannin County on Aug. 17.

Starting at the Spartans' 5-yard line, the ensuing offensive series nearly went south when a third-down sack dropped the Panthers back to the nine. But Union County kept the offense on the field on fourth down, and Tanner fired a dart to his favorite target, Goble, in the back of the endzone.

After the game, Goble discussed the offensive improvements during his second season working with Tanner.

"I'm not going to lie, I've known Caiden for a while and we've just always kind of had [chemistry]," he said. "But compared to last year, I think there's more chemistry there, but we have to keep building on that relationship and getting better each week."

The game's final touchdown came on the heels of a

defensive three-and-out, and the Union County offense set up shop at the 27 with 7:01 left in the third.

A second-and-8 swing pass to Rader went for 12, then a second-and-7 play-action strike to McBride netted 19 more.

After a third-down off-sides penalty awarded Union a new set of downs, the offense converted another third down when Tanner bought some time with his legs before finding Goble at the first-down marker for 6 yards.

Senior tight end Tyler Grasty picked up 26 with a catch-and-run before getting dragged down inside the five. On third-and-goal, Tanner rolled right and connected with Goble for the receiver's third scoring catch and fourth touchdown of the night.

"Jensen came up big for us as always, and we're just happy to be 4-1 going into our bye weeks," said Perry, whose squad is off for two weeks ahead of

the Oct. 6 Homecoming game. "We're looking forward to getting some time off and healing some guys up. We have a lot of guys playing injured and it will be good to get them some rest."

Along with his 13 grabs, Goble's three touchdown catches put him in some elite company at UCHS, joining Jacob Rogers (2014), Sawyer Drake (2019) and Keyton Chitwood (2021) as the only receivers over the last dozen years to catch three touchdowns in a single game.

"I'm not going to lie, when it comes to Union County football, all we want right now is a region title," Goble said. "We want to win [region], not just for us, but for the community. There's nothing we want more than to win region for the people of Blairsville."

The Panthers took a 42-7 lead into the running-clock fourth, and for the third straight week, Union's defense held its opponent to a season-low total yardage output.

"Those guys are working hard and doing a great job, and [West Hall] definitely had the most athletic running back we've faced all year," Perry said. "We knew he would get loose on us, but after that first drive, we did a good job containing him and I'm just really proud of how we played."

# Softball: Lady Panthers no-hit East Jackson, surrender lead at Providence

Union County softball's back is officially against the wall after dropping to third place in Region 8-AA following a costly 2-1 loss at Providence Christian on Thursday.

The Lady Panthers (6-6, 1-2) recorded their first region win earlier in the week, 9-0 at East Jackson on Tuesday, Sept. 12. Union County begins round two of 8-AA action with a pivotal trip to first-place Banks County on Tuesday, Sept. 19.

**Lady Panthers 1, Providence 2** - Freshman pitcher Izzy Anthros tossed a complete-game three-hitter but took another loss despite not allowing an earned run and registering nine punch outs.

The Union County offense mustered only five hits, two singles apiece from seniors Georgia Patton and Gracie Gladding and one by junior Lily Helton.

Anthros worked out of a first-inning jam, then pitched around a leadoff walk in the second, allowing Union to grab an early 1-0 edge in the third. The Lady Panthers' third started with a one-out single by Patton and an error off the bat of Anthros; Gladding loaded the bags with a base hit, and junior Sloane Dyer put Union out front via a four-pitch walk. A strikeout and a pop-up limited the damage to the lone run, but Anthros stranded two in the Providence half of the frame.

Union left two aboard in the fourth when Helton singled and Mikala Souther walked to start the inning.

The Storm pushed ahead with two in the bottom half courtesy of a bloop single and two Union errors.

Neither team threatened until the seventh when senior Jewel Massey wore a 1-0 pitch to put the leadoff hitter aboard for a top-of-the-order that only mustered two pop-outs and a flyout.

With two region losses, Union finds itself in a must-win-out situation to repeat as 8-AA champs, beginning with a critical Tuesday trip to Banks County. A win over the

**Lady Panthers 9, East Jackson 0** - Union bounced back from its 9-inning loss to Banks with a five-inning victory at the last-place Eagles.

Anthros fanned nine and didn't allow a hit over five scoreless, while the offense picked her up with two runs in the second, one in the third, two in the fourth and four in the fifth.

Senior Katie Byers went 3 for 3 with a double, 3 runs and an RBI. Massey plated three during a 1-for-2 day; Peyton Grisham knocked in a pair and finished 2 for 2.

Helton scored and drove in a run during a 2-for-3 performance. Brooklyn Brown and Dyer each scored and finished 1 for 2, with Dyer doubling and knocking in a run. Anthros added an RBI groundout and Gladding walked.

Byers' RBI single started the nine-run victory by scoring Dyer in the Union County

second. Grisham's two-out opposite field single made it 2-0 when Byers came around to score.

The Lady Panthers made it 3-0 in the third when Patton doubled and stole third, then came home on Anthros' ground out.

Three straight singles to start the fourth from Brown, Byers and Helton loaded the bases when Grisham was plunked on a 3-1 count. Massey bumped the lead to 5-0 on a sacrifice fly before an inning-ending double play.

Gladding walked to begin the fifth, and courtesy runner Delaney Mosey swiped second before coming around on Dyer's sacrifice fly. Later in the inning, Byers' two-out double led to another run thanks to Helton's RBI single. Grisham kept the inning alive with a base hit, and Massey made it 9-0 with a base knock up the middle.

Anthros tossed a 1-2-3 bottom half to finish one hit-by-pitch away from dealing five perfect frames.


Over the weekend, Hunter placed third at Lumpkin County's North Georgia Invitational with a personal-best time of 19:43, leading Union to a seventh-place finish.

The Union County men didn't participate in Saturday's meet.

At Gilmer, Ellie Adams placed fifth, crossing the line in 25:12. Kazmierzak finished one second back in sixth; Payne was ninth at 25:52; Noel Hyatt came in 12th at 26:34.

Lydia Wagner was 14th at 27:11, and Mackenzie Bourbeau placed 17th with a time of 27:24.

Union County (7-17) dropped to 1-2 in Region 8-AA with consecutive 2-0 road losses at Providence Christian and Fellowship Christian last week.


