

Morlock's No. 4 Seminoles survive OT scare at Clemson

Clemson, SC - As Cade Klubnik's fourth-and-2 overtime pass attempt floated harmlessly to the Death Valley turf on Saturday afternoon, Kyle Morlock and his Florida State teammates raced onto the field in celebration of the Seminole's first win over the ACC's top program since 2014

Now, No. 4 Florida State looks every bit the part of a program ready to wear the crown it once seemed Dabo Swinney's Tigers would hold in perpetuity.

With Clemson's College Football Playoff hopes on the line, along with an opportunity to lower the temperature on Swinney's coaching hot seat, the Tigers, for much of the day, looked every bit the part of the program that's won seven of the last eight ACC titles.

But things went awry for Clemson late in the third when Kalen DeLoach dropped Klubnik for a sack and then returned the resulting fumble 56 yards for a touchdown, knotting the score at 24-24. The Tigers answered with a late drive that moved all the way to the FSU 12-yard line. But with 1:47 to play, Clemson kicker Jonathan Weitz's go-ahead 29-yard field goal sailed wide left.

After giving up early completions of 25 and 15 yards on the ensuing series, the Tigers' defense stiffened, denying Florida State on four straight plays in Clemson territory to force overtime.

But senior quarterback Jordan Travis made his only completion of the extra session count - a 24-yard touchdown



toss to Keon Coleman, awarding the Seminoles its first and 2020 Union County High only lead of the afternoon.

With a raucous Memorial Stadium crowd at their back, the Tigers raced out to early leads of 10-0 and 17-7 before Travis' second effort on a 2-yard touchdown run brought the Seminoles within yards on the season. 17-14 at the break.

School graduate recorded each of his two receptions during the first half for 18 yards. His two catches matched his career-high during FSU's 45-24 win over LSU.

As for Morlock, the everyone from Union County, Blairsville and the surrounding counties that have poured out their love and support, it means so much," Morlock said after the Clemson win. "I want to give a huge shoutout to my family, (UCHS wide receivers coach) Paul McBride, and everybody that's been there for me along the way."

Morlock's college career began at Shorter (Rome), where he was a two-time allamerican, catching 57 passes for 890 yards and 11 TDs in 24 games over two seasons.

At UCHS, Morlock had 28 receptions, 591 yards and 6 TDs as a senior in 2019, despite missing over a month due to injury. During his junior

year, Morlock logged career bests of 47 catches, 757 yards and 8 scores.

Over his first two seasons at UCHS, he combined for 14 receptions, 161 yards and 2 TDs.

Morlock is the son of Steve and Suellen Morlock and the brother of Madison Morlock Rowe.

Softball: Lady Panthers can't protect early lead at Banks, split weekend games

Third-place Union County (7-8-1, 1-3) suffered a costly 6-2 region loss at Banks County (15-4, 5-0) on Tuesday, Sept. 19, dropping the Lady Panthers to 1-3 in 8-AA and all but out of contention for consecutive region titles.

Union split two games over the weekend, routing Savannah Christian 15-2 and getting blanked 8-0 by Prince Avenue Christian.

Lady Panthers 2, Banks County 6 - Union County scored two in the first but faced a 4-2 deficit after three. The Leopards added two in the sixth for a 6-2 final tally.

Gracie Gladding's firstinning homer accounted for Union's only runs during the senior catcher's 2-for-3 day. After Georgia Patton's leadoff single setup Gladding's tworun bomb, the Lady Panthers were limited to only two hits the rest of the way.

Meanwhile, freshman pitcher Izzy Anthros held Banks to only four hits, but three costly errors gifted the Leopards four unearned runs.

Union stranded Katie Byers' leadoff single in the second, then a hit-by-pitch, two singles and two errors helped Banks push ahead 3-2 in the bottom half.

Gladding's two-out single in the third marked Union's final hit of the day, and Banks took advantage of a wild pitch to take a 4-2 edge. The Lady Panthers stranded two in the fifth but left the tying run in scoring position.

The Leopards' two-run, two-out double broke things open in the sixth following a leadoff error.

Lady Panthers 15, Savannah Christian 2 (6 inn) - A seven-run third built a commanding lead before Gladding capped off the scoring with a three-run homer.

Gladding finished 4 for 5 with a run and 4 RBIs; Patton knocked in one and scored twice during a 4-for-4 performance. Mikala Souther went 1 for 2 with a pair of runs and 3 RBIs.

Hunter's time of 21 minutes, 2 seconds was 24 seconds better than Franklin County's Megan Hightower. Ellie Adams came in third at 22:57, Hannah Kazmierzak placed fourth at 23:21 and Natalie Payne was fifth at 23:26.

Noel Hyatt finished eighth with a time of 24:07, and Lydia Wagner crossed the line at 24:32 to give Union six of the top-10 spots. Avery Hussion came in 13th at 24:55; Clara Kazmierzak was 19th at 25:29.

Katie Payne placed 26th (26:45), Averie Tanner was 30th (27:35), Jolie Schmitt came in 32nd (27:46) and Abby Barrett was 42nd (29:49).

Union's 21 points was 39 better than second place Stephens County.
