Softball: Hot bats lift Lady Panthers to three straight wins

With three straight victories in Region 8-AA, Union County (10-8-1) is riding its longest win streak of the season and is back in the mix for a No. 2 seed in the upcoming Class AA State Tournament. The Lady Panthers

notched a pair of blowout victories over East Jackson, but the week's most significant win came via Thursday's 9-1 thumping of second-place Providence Christian. The Lady Panthers and

Providence enter the week in a second-place tie with one matchup remaining between the two. Union County hosts first-place Banks County on Tuesday at 5:30 p.m. Lady Panthers 9, Prov-

idence 1 (6 inn) - Senior Gracie Gladding's sixth-inning grand slam closed out last Thursday's key 8-AA showdown in a 9-1 Union victory. Clinging to a 2-1 lead,

the Lady Panthers busted out with three in the fifth and four in the sixth to send the Storm packing. With her slam, Gladding finished with 6 RBIs during a 3-for-4 evening.

Katie Byers, Jewel Massey and Georgia Patton added two hits each in the win. Union County stranded

two runners in the first but eventually broke the scoreless tie during the third when Gladding laced a two-run double down the third-base line, scoring Delaney Moses and Massey.






