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Football: Panthers win ugly vs. Banks County, improve to 5-1

Injuries piling up ahead of Friday's trip to 5-1 Providence Christian

Union County's 27-7 Homecoming victory over Banks County (4-3,0-2) turned out bittersweet following injuries to three key players, including star wide receiver Jensen Goble. Goble suffered a ham-

string injury during the second quarter on Friday and didn't return. According to Panthers head coach Michael Perry, the team's leading pass catcher could miss 2-to-3 weeks. Elsewhere, senior de-

fensive lineman Lane Lance and senior wide receiver Ethan McBride are both questionable for Friday's Region 8-AA road trip to Providence Christian. Senior tight end Tyler

Grasty lent credence to Union County's next-man-up mentality during his postgame com-

"The main takeaway [from the win over Banks] is, we have some tough guys, but injuries happen," he said. "But we had some guys step up tonight and it shows our team is willing to do what we need to

Perry echoed Grasty during his weekly interview.

"Despite how awful we played on offense, I'm really proud we still won and that's all that matters," he said.

"I'm super proud of our defense. I thought they played really well. And someone that I don't talk about enough is Zuri (senior kicker Zuriel Mancillas). He did a great job on kickoffs and flipping the field for us on punts. He continues to get better and better and was a big part of our win."

Against Banks, Union County (5-1, 1-0) overcame a two-week layoff, rainy conditions and three interceptions to maintain its 27-7 halftime lead.

Coach Perry didn't implicate the weather for Union's offensive woes but noted the two-week break and injuries played a role.

"I think the layoff definitely hurt us," he said. "Then when Jensen went down, I think [senior quarterback Caiden Tanner] started to force things

happen instead of just taking what's there.'

With the passing attack out of sync, senior running back Braylen Rader piled up 144 yards and a score on 24 carries. Sophomore Cade Dockrey hauled in 47 yards and a TD on a career-high 5 receptions. Senior linebacker Koop-

er Ashcraft recovered a fumble and tallied a team-leading 8 tackles as defensive standout Seth Rutan mends from surgery.

Grasty, who collected a career-best eight catches for 71 yards, discussed his team's adiustments down two receivers.

"Jensen is one of the main targets in our offense, so I told the guys we all need to step up to make up for his absence," he said. "We hope and pray those guys can heal up, but if not, we really need to work hard and grind this week in practice to get prepared to take on a bigger role."

Union County found the endzone early when Goble returned the opening kickoff to midfield then Banks County jumped offsides on fourth and

rumbled for 10 yards on third down and short, setting up a 17-yard scoring strike to Goble.

The Panthers' third drive ended with an interception inside the Banks County 10-yard line after Goble's punt return awarded the offense possession in plus territory. Starting at the 36, Rader plowed his way for 2 yards on fourth and 1, then Caiden Tanner hit Goble over the middle for 10 more on second and 6. On third-and-goal at the

two, a Leopards' sack dropped Tanner at the 10-yard line before Banks picked off a fourthdown pass near the goal line.

'It was fourth down so you have to throw it, but nobody was open," Perry said.
"But we were able to run the ball, Rader had 144 yards, we just have to finish drives."

With Banks backed up following the interception, Union's defense forced a punt from the endzone, and the Panthers set up shop at the 49 to begin the second quarter.

On third and 5, Union moved the chains when Tanner

improvised by rolling right and finding Rader in the flat for 7 yards with a jump pass near the Leopards' sideline. Three plays later, Tanner stood in the pocket on another third down and fired a strike to Grasty across the middle, picking up 13 yards. At the 11-yard line, the Panthers went to Rader on consecutive handoffs to build a 14-0 advantage.

Banks responded with a four-play, 78-yard drive, capped off by a 36-yard rushing score by Aucy Jacobs.

But the Panthers answered right back, going 65 yards in eight plays to build a 21-7 margin.

On a drive headlined by Dockrey, the sophomore receiver's sliding catch went for 23 yards before putting the finishing touches on the possession by snagging a 5-yard bullet from Tanner on second and goal.

A Leopards' fumble on the ensuing kickoff gifted the second half, Union County Panthers prime field position forced a Banks County threeat the 22. From there, Union and-out, but the Leopards

kept it on the ground, calling Tanner's number four times and eventually cashing in from

After the Panthers' pointafter missed wide and the kickoff went out of bounds, Banks moved inside the 10-vard line. but the Union County defense tightened up in the shadow of its endzone. Facing first and goal

from the 9-yard line, the Panthers defensive front dropped Banks for a loss on first down, then forced an errant throw by bringing the heat on quarterback Kolby Watson.

The secondary went to work on third down as cornerback Braden Plott elevated to swat away an endzone pass attempt in 1-on-1 coverage. On fourth down, Union kept the visitors off the board when the half ended on a Leopards' unsuccessful 27-yard field

Kicking off the scoreless

picked off Tanner on the Panthers' first play of the third.

But the Union County defense continued bailing out its offense. This time, senior cornerback Nolan Thompson broke up a fourth-and-13 desperation heave to the endzone.

The Panthers took over at their own 19 and moved inside the Banks County red zone courtesy of Rader's 47-yard scamper. However, a costly penalty and a sack led to an incomplete pass on fourth-and-18 During the fourth, Tan-

ner spurred the offense to the Leopards' 13-yard line, but two penalties forced the Panthers into a third-and-long intercep-'No. 0 (Banks County's Aaron Scott) is one of the best

year," Perry said. "We were trying to throw the wheel route to Cade Dockrey and [Scott] came off the curl route and just made an incredibly athletic play." Banks County threatened one final time, advancing to the Union County 38, but Dockrey

got his hands on a fourth-and-6 deep ball thrown into triple Tanner finished 19 for


33 with 159 yards, two TDs and three interceptions. He rushed 11 times for 25 yards and a score. Goble caught three

corded 7 tackles, two for a loss, a forced fumble and a sack. Ethan Lester had 7 tackles; Jonah Kluth made six stops with a sack and a QB hurry; Dockrey added 4 tackles and broke up a pass; senior Lane Lance had 4 tackles and a TFL; Carter Deal collected 4 tackles and a hurry. Schuknecht and Beau

Webster added 2 tackles each. Plott notched 2 tackles and a pass break-up; Dusty Aaron had 2 tackles and 2 hurries; Thompson and Taylor Whitehead added one tackle and one PBU apiece.



Union County travels to Lilburn on Friday to face another 5-1 squad at Providence Christian. The Storm are coming off a 51-19 loss at Athens Academy.

Despite the loss, Coach Perry strongly believes Providence features the most prolific passing attack the Panthers have faced in 2023.

"This will be the bestthrowing offense we have seen and that's all they want to do," Perry said. "It's going to be a big challenge and their quarterback is good. He's the best throwing QB we've seen all year and they're going to play up-tempo. The offensive line is very big; I think both tackles weigh 270 lbs. They have a bunch of new players they didn't have last year, a whole new coaching staff and we don't have a lot of film on them.'

In the only meeting between the schools, the Panthers survived a frantic comeback bid in 2022 following a 35-7 halftime lead. In the win, the Panthers needed a fourth-andlong completion to run out the clock in the final moments of a

Last October's near-disaster in Blairsville is a moment Perry hasn't allowed his team to forget.

"That game gets brought up every single time at halftime," he said. "Especially if we have a big lead; it's going to get brought up."

Union County amassed

644 yards of offense in last year's meeting, led by Rader's coming-of-age moment in a 203-yard outing on the ground. Tanner put up a career-high 403 yards through the air with 4 touchdowns. With three rushing scores, Tanner came within a TD of equaling Pierson Allison's school record of 8 total touchdowns (2019).

Union County (10-8-1) won its fourth straight in convincing fashion with 9-1 six-inning home victory over first-place Banks County on Tuesday, Oct. 3.

Senior Gracie Gladding walked it off in the bottom of the sixth with her sixth homer of the season, punctuating the Lady Panthers' recent offensive


Gladding finished 2 for 4 with a run and a pair of RBIs; Lily Helton went 2 for 3 with 3 RBIs and a double; Sloane Dyer doubled, drove in two and scored twice during a 2-for-3

Freshman Izzy Anthros worked 4-plus innings of shutout ball, allowing five hits, four walks and punching out four. Unfortunately, Anthros left the circle in the fifth with an injury, giving way to fellow-9th-grader Zadie Diaz in a 5-0

Diaz picked up her teammate, allowing an unearned run, one hit and a walk.

The Panthers provided its freshmen pitchers with an early cushion via a five-run third that started with a Leopards' error but ended with Union doing the bulk of its damage with two away. Senior Jewel Massey's one-out double moved two into scoring position and senior Georgia Patton singled home pinch-runner Delaney Moses.

Anthros earned an intentional walk, loading the bases

Anthros departed following a walk to start the fifth, and Banks greeted Diaz with a base hit. With Banks County in business, Gladding ended the rally by picking off a runner at second, and Diaz induced a fly out to center, followed by a ground out to the new third baseman, Anthros.

Gladding and Dyer opened the bottom half with a week's Class AA State Tournasingle and a double, and Helton ment.

for Gladding, who lined out broke things open at 7-0 with a two-run double.

Leading 7-1 in the Union half of the sixth, Patton's oneout single and Gladding's twoout, two-run homer ended the contest an inning early.

Union County dropped a pair of 2-1 home contests to Fellowship Christian and East Jackson during its Tuesday, Oct. 3 tri-match to finish 3-7 in Region 8-AA.

Union County enters this week's region tournament as the No. 6 seed and will travel to third-seeded East Jackson to begin postseason play Thursday

Panthers 1, Fellowship Christian 2 (25-21, 11-25, 9-15) - Union County failed to hang on after rallying from a 20-17 deficit in the opener with 8 of the last 9 points.

With junior Katelyn Brown on the serve, the Panthers rattled off seven-in-arow, highlighted by junior Lily Brookshire's go-ahead kill with the set tied at 20. Brown's ace made it 23-20 before Union stretched its margin to 24-20.

The Panthers erased early margins of 5-1 and 11-7 when Brookshire's kill and senior Claire Colwell's block put Union on top 14-12.

Fellowship stormed back in front at 19-15 until Brookshire sparked the turnaround.

Fellowship never trailed in the second set, racing ahead 4-0 en route to an 8-3 advantage. Brookshire and freshman Sofia Foster got Union back to even at 9-9 until the Paladins rattled off five straight.

The Panthers held leads of 1-0 and 2-1 in set three before before dropping the next two.
