

Football: Panthers' comeback bid falls short at Providence

Dockrey's record-setting 14-reception night cut short by injury

Lilburn - Union County (5-2, 1-1) convened an inspired third quarter with 21 unanswered points, but it wasn't enough to overcome a 41-14 deficit during Friday's 55-35 loss at Providence Christian (6-1, 1-1).

"We made a lot of mistakes offensively and we played about as bad as you can play defensively during the the first half," Union County head coach Michael Perry said. "At halftime, I told the guys, 'We're going to reveal what kind of team we really are in the second half; you can either quit or you can go out there and show what you're made of.'

After tying the game at 7-7 on another rainy night in Region 8-AA, the Panthers yielded 28 straight as Providence built a 35-7 second-quarter advantage. Union County momentarily moved within 35-14 until a Storm touchdown bumped the halftime margin to 41-14.

For the second time in six games, the Panthers gave up a career-high rushing performance courtesy of Providence senior running back Quinton Slaughter, who went for 348 yards and two scores on the ground.

"We knew [Slaughter] was good, but we also knew they were primarily a passing team,"Perry said. "But my hat's off to him. He's a good player."

The backbreaker came via Slaughter in the fourth after a shorthanded Union County closed the gap to 41-35 following Tyler Grasty's 99-yard touchdown reception from Caiden Tanner.

With the Storm pinned inside their own 20 and momentum on the visitor's sideline, Slaughter gashed the defense 82 yards up the middle on a score that essentially put Union County away.

The Panthers were on the verge of answering early in the fourth until two costly penalties on one play derailed the ensuing series. The drive stalled after Cade Dockrey snagged a thirdand-8 pass over the middle for 4 yards. For his effort, he took a vicious, unflagged helmetto-helmet hit that knocked the sophomore receiver from the

Despite entering with a banged-up elbow and departing early in the fourth quarter, Dockrey went to the sideline with a school-record 14 receptions and 100 yards.

"I am really proud of Cade Dockrey," Perry said. "He did some really good things for us and he plays both ways, which is really difficult against a tempo offense.'

However, Union's sideline reaction to the no-call didn't go unnoticed by the officials, drawing two flags that turned a fourth-and-4 from the Providence 33 into a punt from its own 39.

The Storm took over at the 20 and put the game on ice via a 14-play, 80-yard scoring drive that pushed the score to

"I was really proud of the fact that we came out and made it a game in the second half," Perry said. "I'm not going to blame injuries. Anyone who follows us knows we have a lot of injuries. But it wasn't all doom and gloom. We have some things to be proud of."

leaguered defense sparked the turnaround when senior David Heredia scooped up a backward lateral at the Panthers' 20 and returned the fumble 13 yards.

Four plays later, Tanner slipped out of trouble in the backfield and scrambled for 13 on fourth-and-4 at 39, then a catch-and-run by Dockrey moved the chains again.

Rader capped off the drive with a 20-yard touchdown run on third and 9, blasting his way up the gut to move Union within 41-21.

Another Providence fumble handed possession back to the Panthers in plus territory, where Rader went back to work after a first-down throw to Grasty picked up 13.

Rader's second down run drew a late hit out of bounds, awarding Union a first down at the 14. The Panthers kept feeding the hot hand, and Rader treated the Purple and Gold faithful to a moment that may go down as the senior's most memorable run.

On second down at the seven, Rader found the inside lane sealed shut, forcing him to Trailing 41-14 to start bounce outside, where three dethird frame, Union's be- fenders met him in the backfield.

But Rader broke free, keeping his legs churning on the wet turf, and taking on two more defenders before turning the corner. As he found the edge, Rader slipped two tackles near the sideline and ran through a helpless defensive back at the one before diving across the goal line.

'That's probably the best run I've ever seen by a high school running back," Perry said. "I can't say enough about him. He definitely needs to play college football. He's just a football player. And a very good one.

In a 41-28 contest, the defense delivered one more time, depriving Providence of 6 points on a fourth-and-goal QB sneak from inside the 1-yard line. Two plays later, the Storm bit on a play-fake to Rader and Tanner tossed a quick jump pass to Grasty over the middle with nothing but turf in the way of his place in the record books for equaling the sport's longest play from scrimmage.

Grasty sprinted all the way inside the Providence 20, where the senior zigged and zagged his way across the goal line to escape one final defender and move Union within a score

To make matters worse for Union County, two lengthy Rader kickoff returns were negated by penalties during the opening half - taking a touchdown off the board on the first return

Tanner ended the day 24 for 32 with 328 yards passing and 2 TDs, adding 40 yards on the ground. In the absence of the team's leading receiver, Jensen Goble, Dockrey and Grasty produced a pair of breakout performances.

Along with Dockrey's school-record outing, Grasty finished with a career-best 140 yards receiving on 7 receptions.

As for Dockrey, the sophomore entered the game with only 10 career catches before getting thrust into a more significant role without Goble. Dockrey's 14 catches break the UCHS record of 13, previously shared by the aforementioned Goble (2023 at West Hall) and Blake Gowder (2008 at Fannin).

Parker finished with 2 catches for 54 yards at Providence and McBride added one reception for 29. Rader compiled 62 yards and 2 touchdowns on the ground.
