

The family and friends of Jerry Payne, 75, of Blairsville, are mourning his death after his work truck crashed while he was driving through Clayton in Rabun County last week.

Advanced in-person voting continues thru Nov. 4

Three weeks of advanced in-person voting for the Nov. 8 General Election started on Monday in the Jury Assembly Room on the lower floor of the Union County Courthouse located at 65 Courthouse Street

Early voting will run weekdays between now and Friday, Nov. 4, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., even during lunchtime. There will also be two weekend early voting opportunities: Saturday, Oct. 22, and Saturday, Oct. 29, also from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the courthouse.

Election Day voting for the General Election will take place Tuesday, Nov. 8, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the 11 preassigned precincts of Union County.



Appearing on the ballot will be federal, state and local candidates. At the federal level, people will be deciding the following races:

U.S. Senate, Republican Herschel Walker, Democratic Incumbent Raphael Warnock and Libertarian Chase Oliver.

U.S. House of Representatives for District 9, Harper, Democrat Nakita Republican Incumbent Andrew Clyde and Democrat Michael "Mike" Ford.

At the state level,

voters will be deciding the following:

Governor, Republican Incumbent Brian Kemp Democrat Stacey Abrams and Libertarian Shane Hazel.

In a drug bust Oct. 3, investigators with the Union County Sheriff's Office Narcotics Division confiscated 9.5 pounds of marijuana, five jars of THC wax, 51 THC cartridges, an ounce of psychedelic mushrooms, four firearms and over \$5,000 in cash

That quantity of marijuana alone has a street value of approximately \$47,500 based on estimates available through the Georgia Bureau of Investigation, with the value of the other firearm during the commission

confiscated substances being worth thousands more.

The bust came on the tail-end of a two-monthlong investigation that included controlled buys from Christina Marie Waldrup, 44, out of her residence located off Georgia 325 in Blairsville, UCSO Lt. Tyler Miller said.

Following the execution of a search warrant, Waldrup was arrested and charged with six counts of sale of a controlled substance; three counts possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute; possession of marijuana with intent to distribute; and possession of a

severity of crashes along the project corridor."

According to GDOT statistics, between 2017 and 2021, that stretch of Murphy Highway experienced 767 motor vehicle accidents, with rates of crashes, injuries and deaths that were dramatically higher than the state averages for this type of road over a comparable period.

Major improvements are in the works – and have been since preliminary engineering got underway in 2006 – with three distinct projects totaling roughly \$140 million to be constructed sequentially starting in 2028. Costs are subject to revision, per GDOT.

The first project will widen Murphy Highway to four lanes plus a two-way left-turn lane from Georgia 515 to Pat Colwell Road.

From there, the road will be widened from two to three lanes up to Gumlog Road, switching between two lanes plus a two-way left-turn lane and passing lanes as the third lane that will alternate between north and southbound traffic depending on driveway density.

Roundabouts will be installed at the intersections of Pat Haralson Memorial Drive, Pat Colwell/Pleasant Hill Road, and Gumlog Road.

Notably, the intersection considerable changes, to include the addition of a second left-turn lane and a dedicated right-turn lane just north of the traffic light, and an additional left-turn lane at the south end of the intersection. Finally, estimated for 2033 construction, the third project will continue the widening of Murphy Highway north from Gumlog Road, going from two to three lanes up to the Ivylog Road and Nottely Dam Road intersection, with an anticipated construction time of 24-36 months.

the ends of the existing bridge over Ivy Log Creek and not replace or improve this bridge,' according to GDOT.

Department οf Transportation data indicate that the population of Union County increased by 21% from 2011 to 2021, for a current total of 26,329 residents. Interestingly, GDOT is projecting that the county population will be 46,719 by 2051.

GDOT officials believe at Georgia 515 and Murphy that, once completed, the Highway will be undergoing enhancements on offer will improve commuter experiences and reduce crashes for years to come, all while "minimizing impacts to properties and environmentally sensitive areas.' The roundabouts in particular are designed to "improve safety and operations, promote lower speeds and traffic calming, reduce conflict points, reduce crashes by 80% (and) reduce the severity of wait for motorists turning left crashes" when they do occur.

2017 was the last time The construction start GDOT held an information open house to solicit feedback on this project. Since then, the plans have been revised to divide the overall project into three parts, and "the formerly proposed four-lane section (north of Pat Colwell Road) has been reduced to a three-lane section.

"This project is currently in the preliminary design phase," per GDOT. "The preliminary design phase is the time in which the preferred design alternative is refined and designed sufficiently to establish project impacts."

An extensive, userfriendly review of the project can be found online at https:// sr-11-widening-union-gdot. hub.arcgis.com/, where people may comment on the proposed projects until Nov. 4, 2022.

In addition to online "The project will tie into feedback and comments submitted in person Oct. 20, people may print a comment card from the website and mail it to: Mr. Eric Duff, State Environmental Administrator, Georgia Department of Transportation, 600 West Peachtree Street, NW - 16th Floor, Atlanta, Georgia 30308.

'All comments will be considered as we develop the plans, and a response will be posted to this site approximately 30 days after the close of the comment period," per GDOT.

After feedback is assessed, "revisions may occur to the proposed plans initially brought to the public."

"An additional public hearing open house will occur in the future once design is advanced and before the project environmental documentation is finalized," per GDOT. "After all right-of-way acquisition occurs. project design is finalized, and environmental clearances obtained, the projects would advance to construction.'

Waldrup, originally from Michigan, allegedly acquired the marijuana and THC products in a "black market" arrangement with a legal supplier in the Wolverine State, where certain levels of possession and use are allowed for people 21 and older.

Authorities believe Waldrup also obtained the "magic mushrooms" from Michigan, where possession and use remain illegal, though a small number of cities, including Detroit, have decriminalized such activities.

Waldrup remained in custody at the Union County Jail at press time, and she is presumed innocent until found guilty in a court of law.

An investigation into the cross-state acquisition of the drugs remains ongoing, Lt. Miller said, noting that his

division is continuing to work with out-of-state authorities.

"I would say 90% of any marijuana case we deal with, the drug in hand – whether it's marijuana, wax, cartridges, edibles – either comes from up North or out West," Miller said, 'whether it be by mail, FedEx, UPS or travel by (personal) vehicle."

Currently, 38% of states have legalized recreational marijuana, making its purchase much easier for dealers who turn around and sell it in communities where the state has made it illegal to possess for personal use.

The legalization trend appears to be picking up steam, most recently with President Joe Biden's Oct. 6 announcement that he would be pardoning "all in Union County that law prior Federal offenses of simple possession of marijuana" and

encouraging all governors "to do the same with regard to state offenses."

The president also remarked that he would be asking the Secretary of Health and Human Services and the U.S. Attorney General "to initiate the administrative process to review expeditiously how marijuana is scheduled under federal law."

Per the statement at whitehouse.gov, Biden added that he believes "limitations on trafficking, marketing, and under-age sales (of marijuana) should stay in place."

Methamphetamine remains the No. 1 drug problem locally, said Lt. Miller, who went on to warn people who illegally sell and use drugs enforcement would catch up with them eventually.
