There will be a host of people from all over the area enjoying the scenery and the views from our multiple mountain trails. Unfortunately, these enjoyable moments can turn to difficult times, even tragedy, when hikers become lost or

injured. Union County Emergency Management Agency would like to provide some tips for hiking and how to prevent these issues.

Hiking can be great exercise, but hikers should know their limits. There are a multitude of different trails

throughout Union County, each with different physical requirements. For the person who wants to enjoy nature without a long, strenuous hike in the mountains, there are several great trails at the various county and state parks. For the more adventurous, there is the Appalachian Trail and its various access trails. These trails can be physically challenging to the less experienced and less condi-

No matter the trail you choose, you must always know what you're getting into. Hikers should research the trail and map it out before they start. They should know the distance, the start and finish, the terrain, the difficulty of the trail, and their hiking pace. A hike from Byron Herbert Reece access to Blood Mountain, for example, is a 2-mile mountain hike. The average mountain hiker walks one mile per hour, which would make this hike a four-hour hike. Hikers should allow enough time to complete their hike Hikers should know the weather and be prepared. Hikers

should wear the appropriate clothing and footwear. It is also a good idea to dress in layers as well as have extra clothes. Hikers should carry essential equipment such as water, snacks, map, flashlight with extra batteries, first-aid kit, whistle, and something to start a If you take a cellphone, ensure that it is charged. Cellphones can be unreliable, and there are many places with no cell service.

Hiking can be a great outdoor adventure during this fall sea-

From Goth to Grace

Gothic influencer Katherine von Drachenberg (a.k.a. Kat Von D) made headlines recently. The story was not about her career as a tattoo artist, television personality, entrepreneur, and recording artist. It was far more profound than her celebrity. She publicly announced that she has embraced Christianity To vouch for the authenticity of her conversion is above

my pay grade. But she made some meaningful statements on Instagram that reflect Christian truths. In fact, these are what you would expect from someone who searches for truth and ends up in the right place.

She said, "I got a lot of things wrong in my past." In Christian parlance, this is repentance. "Repent," Jesus said, "for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Mat. 4:17). By that He means you acknowledge you got it wrong when you were the ruler of your own life, but now you submit to living with Jesus as Lord. I spoke with a young man about this recently. He was hesitant to shift his allegiance to Christ, fearing he might fail. I explained that repentance includes the faith that God empowers you to live a repentant life. The Bible calls that being "born again," and "a new creation.

Kat Von D said she "threw out books that just don't align with who I am and who I want to be. I've always found beauty in the macabre, but at this point, I just had to ask myself what is my relationship with this content?" Deciding to become a Christian invites a change in priorities, values, and identity. The current cultural mood holds sexual orientation and gender identity as the highest expressions of identity. But the Christian identity is solely about a Person, Jesus. That new identity imports the values and priorities of grace and truth. Living out that identity means jettisoning things that do not "align with who I am and who I want to be." Align with this: "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control" (Gal. 5:22).

In the Instagram post, Kat Von D shows grace and tolerance. "We are all on our own journey," she writes, "and I love everyone regardless of where they might be at." The high ethics of

Commissioner's Questions

Union County has experienced several serious storms recently – resulting in flooding and downed trees. The CodeRED system is available to all Union County residents who would like to be forewarned when serious storms blow through. This week's questions are a result of conversations I have had when visiting with residents in our community.

Q. I keep hearing about CodeRED. What is that?

A. CodeRED is a web-based critical communication solution that enables public safety personnel to notify residents, businesses and visitors by phone, text, and email of time-sensitive information, emergen-

cies, or urgent notifications in a timely manner. One of the major responsibilities of emergency management is to ensure that the public is properly informed of emergencies and incidents that may affect the community.

Q. I didn't know we had an Emergency Alert System. How do I sign up to receive these alerts?

A. If you have not registered for notifications, we strongly encourage you to register with CodeRED to receive weather and emergency notifications. There is no charge to register or use CodeRED, and your personal information will be kept confidential. County residents are strongly encouraged to go to the CodeRED website, tinyurl.com/ucalerts, and register. Once you register, you will be able to customize your alerts and how you receive them. You can also find the link to CodeRED on the Union County Government website at www.unioncountyga.gov or you can text UCALERTS to 99411.

Q. I signed up for this service a few years back and have been receiving notifications. Do I need to do anything to continue receiving emergency notifications? A. Once you have registered/signed up, the only thing you

need to do is keep your address, phone numbers and email address Q. How will CodeRED benefit me?

A. The CodeRED system allows Union County Emergency Management Agency (EMA) to provide notifications that may require immediate action (such as a boil-water notice, a missing

Erosion Control

Georgia, along with much of the Southeastern U.S., doesn't have a positive past with erosion. Repetitive cropping of cotton in the Piedmont resulted in seven inches of topsoil being washed away into the ocean. Soil takes hundreds of years to create, meaning that loss

of soil is something that is felt for generations. By the 1950s, new policies and programs began to change Georgia from endless cotton fields to forestland

and other uses that are less susceptible to erosion. In the mountains, there is always a threat of erosion if we aren't proactive with protecting our landscape. Let's talk about why we should care about erosion and some things that you can do to make sure that your land isn't eroded away.


Erosion can also lead to water quality issues. Not only does the topsoil muddy up our lakes and rivers, but also the nutrients that the topsoil is carrying can create algal blooms leading to decreased aquatic life. That is bad news for our lakes and the fish that inhabit them. Erosion can also create a hard pan that will repel water and increases surface runoff. Once top soil has eroded away it is much more difficult to grow in

So, what you can do to reduce erosion? First, construction makes soil very susceptible to erosion. Removing all the vegetation from the top of the soil leaves it open to the rainfall. In construction, surround the project site with hay bales and silt fences, preserve the already existing vegetation, and keep any piles of loose vegetation or gravel covered. Whenever you're clearing land try to leave as much of the existing vegetation as possible. This means you won't need to plant as much back once your project is

Planting permanent vegetation is the longterm goal for erosion control. Mulch can also be used temporarily while you are establishing vegetation. Trees are going to be the best for long term protection from erosion. The deep roots that they have means that they do a better job of holding soil in place than grass does. Grasses can help intercept runoff and infiltrate it back into the soil. Shrubs are good at creating cover and habitat for wildlife, and trees are best at block-

A lot of our soil in the mountains is most likely going to need lime and fertilizer before you can replant it with vegetation. A soil test is a great place to start to learn how much lime and fertilizer you need to add. The lime will raise the pH into the range for plant growth. Ground that has been cleared for new construction is most



child, a weather emergency, or an evacuation notice). The system delivers texts, emails, and phone calls to cells or home phones. Union County EMA also uses CodeRED to send EMERGENCY notifications to keep citizens informed of emergencies such as evacuation notices, fires, floods, chemical spills, or other emergency situations. CodeRED Weather Warning is a unique service that automatically notifies citizens in the

path of severe weather just moments after a warning has been issued by the National Weather Service.

Q. Is there a cost to reg-

ister for CodeRED?

A. No, registering for CodeRED phone calls, texts, and emails is free to you. The cost is covered by the county. If you need assistance or have additional questions you can call Union County EMA at (706) 439-6091.

you can't email them because their official addresses have not been available on the Union County Government website.

Is the QR code legally required on the ballots? Does anybody have a QR code reader that can verify that the QR code data matches the vote that has been cast? If there is anything on the ballot that is not legally required, does that mean that they are considered as "spoiled ballots?" Is a spoiled ballot counted as a legal vote? Do the local election boards have the legal authority to disqualify any system that consistently produces spoiled ballots?

Does an "air gap" mean that the machines are not connected to the internet with a cable? Can your phone connect to the internet without using a connecting cable? Do any of the Dominion machines have modem cards installed in them? Who checks to see if there are any? Dominion employees? Does the E-Pulse system that monitors the precincts, connect to the internet? If no, how does it transmit information to the officials at the main office? How does it transmit the results on election night? How does it update the voter rolls just before the voting starts?

Why does anybody in the U.S. object to paper ballots? Australia, Canada, England, France, Germany, Ireland, Netherlands, and New Zealand all use paper ballots and have them counted before midnight on election night.

likely going to be very poor quality, even if top soil has been put back. In these cases, the addition of lime, fertilizer, and compost is best practice.

Minimizing impermeable surfaces such as the driveway or walkway on your property will also reduce erosion. Obviously, you will need some impermeable surfaces at your property, such as a roof for your house. For cases like that, it's important to design pathways for the water from those impermeable surfaces to travel so that they can be deposited in a place where they can soak back into the ground. Rain gardens collect water to infiltrate back into the soil instead of having it run downhill. Usually they have plants that are adapted to living in damp soils. Impermeable surfaces don't slow water down, and that velocity allows water to do more erosion damage.
