

# Lady Panthers sweep Super Regionals, advance to Columbus

Union County meets Pierce County at 1 p.m. Wednesday in Elite Eight

After ending its 11-year region title drought earlier this month, Union County (20-5) followed up that feat by qualifying for the Class AA Elite Eight in back-to-back seasons for the first time in a dozen

The Lady Panthers took care of business with three straight home wins during last week's GHSA Class AA Super Regional - a brand new format introduced this year that models the NCAA College World Series. Top-seeded Union County took care of a scrappy Murray County squad that entered as the fourth seed before eliminating the No. 2 and No. 3 seeds, setting up a Wednesday rematch with the Lady Panthers.

'[Murray County] came to battle, I was impressed and their record doesn't show what they can do," Union County head coach Carissa Owenby said. "That's a good ball team and they came to play, so we did a good job today getting the win.


Riding a 14-game win streak into Columbus, Union County opens the double-elimination Elite Eight tournament with Pierce County (18-11) at 1 p.m. Wednesday. The tournament concludes Saturday with the crowning of a State

Champion. "I think we got the jitters out last year so we're going back this year knowing what we're going to see down there [in Columbus]," Owenby said.

Lady Panthers 10, Murray County 8 - Union County advanced to Columbus by overcoming a 5-0 deficit to take a 10-6 advantage into the seventh inning, where the Lady Panthers halted a late rally when right fielder Jewel Massey cut down an Indians' baserunner at home plate.

"Jewel Massey did a great job for us in right field all week and was a big reason we're moving on," Owenby said.

The Lady Panthers responded with four runs in the bottom half of the frame, then added two in the third to even the score at 6-6. Union pushed across a run in the fourth inning for a 7-6 lead, then appeared to blow things open with three in the sixth.

A leadoff double and an error cut the Lady Panthers advantage to 10-7 in the Murray County seventh until a running catch by Massey and a strikeout had Union one out away from advancing to Columbus. Another double made it 10-8, but a dropped third strike to the next Indians' hitter resulted in an errant throw into right field, where Massey came up firing and ended the game via a 9-2 putout

Junior Katie Byers finished 2 for 4 with an RBI and a run, while Burnette turned in a 2-for-4 performance. Junior Gracie Gladding walked during a 1-for-3 day; freshmen Kaylee Rader and Peyton Grisham added one run each.

Trailing 5-0 in the first, Burnette singled and reached third on an outfield error, allowing Byers to plate the courtesy runner Rader with a groundout. Following a Gladding single, an error off the bat of Seabolt scored the other courtesy runner, Grisham. Later in the inning, a Patton double and a Dyer single sliced the margin to 5-4 after one frame.

A laway 2 (5 innings) - A threetwo-out bomb from Seabolt put run homer by Burnette ended the Lady Panthers ahead  $7-\overline{6}$  as the game in the fifth inning to Burnette settled down after the cap off Union County's second win of the day on Tuesday, rocky first.

Patton's two-out RBI single made it 8-6 in the sixth, then Dyer's two-run base knock extended the margin to 10-6.

Burnette went the distance in her third win of the tournament, allowing nine hits, four earned runs and a walk while striking out six.

After her third win in two days, Burnette admitted to battling fatigue during the final game, but she added that it would take a lot more than sore muscles to keep her from leading her team into the Elite Eight.

"I've pitched three games in two days during travel ball, but never in high school, so I was a little tired, but it's something you just have to work through this time of year," she said. "Other than the line drive that caught a piece of my pinky, I felt good and could have kept going if we needed to play another game.'

Patton doubled and scored in the second, and a Byers triple pushed the lead to 4-0 before she came around to make it 5-0 after two innings.

Two Union errors led to a pair of Callaway runs in the third, but they returned the favor when three errors helped pave the way for the Lady Panthers' three-run fourth.

Leading 6-2 after the Cavaliers kicked the ball around early in the inning, Gladding raked a two-run, two-out double to open up an 8-2 margin. The fifth and final frame saw Patton double and Karnes bring her home with a two-out single. Brown reached on an error, keeping the inning alive for Burnette, who belted a three-run shot to left field.

Lady Panthers 6, Murrav County 5 - Union County survived an upset bid from fourth-seeded Murray County in Tuesday's opener of last week's GHSA Class AA Super Regional.

Leading 4-0 in the second, the Lady Panthers took their foot off the gas, allowing Murray to race ahead 5-4 in the fifth. Patton opened the Union fifth with a base hit and moved to second on Dyer's bunt. With one away, Karnes lined an opposite-field single that evened the score at 5-5.

The Union County Panthers mounted a heroic comeback to upset second-seeded Murray County on Wednesday, Oct. 26 in Chatsworth.

Trailing 2-0 with their season on the line, Union County volleyball and the Class of 2023 dug deep to pull out one more classic postseason performance.

The third-seeded Panthers opened the Class AA State Tournament last Wednesday at Region 6-AA runner-up Murray County, and immediately dropped the first two sets, 25-22 and 25-17.

Union County took set three 25-19 before evening the match with a 25-22 win in the fourth set. During the fifth and final set, the Panthers edged the Indians 15-12 to advance to the program's fourth-straight Sweet 16.

# Football: Panthers edge East Jackson, remain in 8-AA title hunt

Following its recordbreaking performance in a shootout win over Providence, the Union County offense overcame an off-night vs. East Jackson with the help of a fourth-quarter touchdown pass and two late defensive stops.

With two weeks remaining in the regular season and a home playoff game on the line Friday at Athens Academy, the Panthers sit at 7-1 overall and 3-0 in Region 8-AA on the heels of its dramatic 21-17 win over East Jackson.

For the second time this year, the Panthers erased a halftime deficit to secure the victory when Ethan McBride pulled down a Cayden Tanner touchdown pass with 5:21 remaining.

However, that wasn't how Union County head coach Michael Perry drew up the gamewinning score.

"Ethan actually missed a signal and ran the wrong route." Perry said. "But fortunately for us, sometimes it's better to be lucky than good."

With McBride lined up as the outside receiver on secondand-goal at the six, the East Jackson press coverage bumped the Panthers' junior toward the sideline, where he stopped to look for the football five yards beyond the goal line. Meanwhile, East Jackson allowed Union's inside receiver, Jensen Goble, a free release to the outside, and he attempted to outrun his defender toward the back corner of the endzone. As everything played out to his left, Tanner took the shotgun snap and lofted a pass in the direction of his inside slot receiver. But standing between the two was McBride, who lept into the air and high-pointed the throw as Goble slipped behind his teammate, narrowly avoiding a collision.

Leading 21-17 with 5:21 remaining, the Panthers put their fate in the hands of a defense that allowed a season-high 49 points in the previous outing and surrendered a go-ahead touchdown two minutes earlier. This time, the Purple Swarm delivered a critical three-and-out, handing the ball back to Tanner with 4:00

Union County picked up a timely first down when Tanner hit junior Tyler Grasty for 10 yards on second-and-9, melting over  $2 \frac{1}{2}$  minutes off the clock before handing possession back to the Eagles. Senior Wilson Walker booted a 41-yard punt that rolled dead at the 24-yard line with 1:20 remaining.

Following his squad's adventures in the punting game vs. Providence, Coach Perry and his staff spent the week cleaning up that phase of special teams.

"Punt protection was much better this week and it's something we worked on extensively during practice," he said. "We worked on it everyday so I'm really proud of those guys.

East Jackson started the series by connecting on a 6-yard pass over the middle to keep the clock running. But after the play, the Eagles committed a monumental unsportsmanlike conduct penalty when the frustrated receiver slung the ball out of bounds instead of handing it responded." to the nearby official.

The penalty turned second-and-4 into second-and-19, first half to top 300 yards for allowing the Union defensive the second-straight week. The line to pin its ears back with a minute to play. On the ensuing snap, junior lineman Lane Lance picks. He added 17 yards rushing applied pressure up the middle,

stripping the Eagles quarterback at the 5-yard line, where junior David Heredia sealed the victory by jumping on the fumble with 53 seconds left.

"We were dealing with a huge offensive line, but Lane Lance played excellent," Perry said. "That strip sack he had at the end of the game was amazing and I just can't say enough about that kid."

After the game, Walker discussed what the Panthers' defense learned about itself over the last two weeks.

"We learned that we have stay confident and just do our job," he said. "We know how to play football and once we remembered that when everyone does their job, we're capable of stopping just about anything that anyone throws at us.

"We were uspet with our performance last week, so we knew we had to do a better job tonight. We were extra-focused in practice all week, and I'm extremely happy with how we

The Eagles limited junior Braylen Rader (43 yards on 12 carries) to his lowest yardage output in six games, but sophomore Connor Schuknecht picked up the slack with 66 yards on six carries.

Goble topped last week's career-best performance with 10 catches for 146 yards and two touchdowns. Senior Griff Young caught six passes for 83 yards, Grasty had two grabs for 19 yards and McBride had two receptions for 11 yards, including his first touchdown.

Rader caught three balls for 15 yards, and junior Zack Taylor's lone grab went for 15 yards. Schuknecht added an 11yard reception.

Union County struck first in the win over East Jackson after consecutive punts to begin the game. Starting from their own 29 at the midway point of the first frame. Tanner hit Goble down the seam for 20 yards on third and 15. Then a 26-yard strike to Young moved the Panthers inside the red zone, and on the next snap, a quick slant to Goble resulted in an 18-yard catch-and-run touchdown.

The Eagles yanked a 42yard field goal wide left but a Union fumble awarded the visitors prime field position at the 39-yard line. On the first play of

With 3:35 before halftime, East Jackson took over and moved inside the Union County red zone, connecting on a 36yard field goal as time expired to deal the Panthers a 10-7 deficit at the break.

Both defenses imposed their will early in the third quarter until a short East Jackson punt allowed Union to set up shop at their 40-yard line at the 1:46 mark of the period.

On second-and-five Goble turned a quick 10-yard throw into a 36-yard gain, finally getting dragged to the turf inside the 20. One play later, a screen to Schucknecht brought up firstand-goal from the 8-yard line, but a false start pushed Union back five yards. A holding flag erased a 13-yard touchdown pass to Goble, dropping the Panthers back to the 29-yard line.

After losing the lead via an 11-yard Eagles' touchdown pass, Union County took over at the 20 and Tanner led the team on a seven-play, 80-yard drive to go on top for good.

Schucknecht opened the series by gashing the defense for 38 yards up the gut. Two plays later, he picked up 14 yards on second-and-five, then a screen to Goble went for 16, setting up McBride's game-winner.

No defensive stats are available for the East Jackson or Providence games.

At Banks County on Oct. 7, Walker led the way with 14 tackles, senior Gage Barnes had 11 and senior Elijah Helton recorded 10 stops. 


