Softball: Union County nears first region title since 2011

Lady Panthers' magic number down to 1 with three games left

Union County softball is on the verge of ending an 11-year region championship drought.

With either one more victory or one Banks County loss, the Lady Panthers (14-6, 6-0) will claim their first 8-AA title since 2011. This year, with no region tournament, the regular season winner will be crowned the outright region champion and will secure home-field advantage until the Elite Eight. Another recent postsea-

son change is the Georgia High School Association switching to the regional format used in college softball and baseball. Should Union hang on to the top spot, they will host a four-team double-elimination tournament involving all the teams in its bracket. The winner of that tournament will automatically advance to the Elite Eight.

Closing in on history, Union County can take care of business by itself during Tuesday's visit to Banks County for the third and final matchup with The Lady Panthers de-

Currently, Union and Banks are tied in the win-column at three wins region apiece with the Leopards' region schedule complete.


