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Union thumps No. 10 Athens Academy, plays for 8-AA title

Panthers can claim first region title in 50 years with another win

Union County (7-2, 3-1) picked up its first win in 23 years, and fourth all-time, over an AJC-ranked opponent during Friday's 35-21 victory over No. 10 Athens Academy on Senior Night in Blairsville.

"This is a great feeling," senior running back Braylen Rader said after the game. "Everyone doubted us and we were definitely the underdogs, but we stuck together and practiced hard all week. And guess what? We did it." With the win, the Pan-

thers remain in the hunt for the program's first region title since 1973 ahead of Thursday's winner-take-all battle at No. 7 Fellowship Christian in Roswell.

"We want [the region title]; we want it badly," Rader said. "Now we just have to go out and get it."

Before the victory over Athens Academy (5-4, 2-2), Union County honored its senior players, trainers, cheerleaders and band members. Later, the Panthers re-

turned the favor to the Mike Colwell Memorial Stadium crowd with a performance for the ages against a Spartans program Union County had never defeated in five tries.

According to head coach Michael Perry, Friday's win marked the signature win of his three-season tenure in Blairsville, topping last year's playoff win at Model.

"This [win] was against a private school with all the advantages that come with that," Perry said. "Athens Academy has some very talented kids with lots of [college] offers. But it was such a fun night and our kids played so hard. It was a night they are not going to Rader paced the offense

with 173 yards and two scores on 27 carries - putting the workhorse back at 1,020 yards and 18 touchdowns on the season. 'It feels great to [go over

1,000 yards] on Senior Night," Rader said. "This is just my second year playing [high school football], but I'm glad that I'm a part of this team."

But once again, it was performance by the Purple Swarm that set the tone from kickoff, helping Union build a 35-7 fourth-quarter advantage by limiting Athens Academy to

Union County was junior linebacker Ethan Lester, who recorded a career-high 24 tackles (19 solo), 2 sacks and 3 TFLs. Lester's 24 tackles is the most by a Panther since Jackson Colwell's 26 vs. Andrews, NC in 2017.

"Ethan just comes to work every day," Perry said. 'He's a great kid and a real student of the game and works all the time with [defensive coordinator Mark] Wade, so it really doesn't surprise me.'

In all, Union County had four players with at least a dozen tackles, including 16 stops, 3 TFLs and a sack from Seth Rutan; 13 (TFL, sack) by David Heredia and 12 from Kooper Ashcraft. "Our defense was just

attacking the ball all night and there was some serious hitting going on out there," Perry said. "I just can't say enough about slaught continued into the [our defense].' With the score tied at

7-7 in the second quarter following an early feeling-out games on Athens Academy's process by both sides, Union opening drive of the half. County opened up a 21-7 halfstrikes from senior quarterback Caiden Tanner, who completed 19-of-21 passes for 243 yards and 3 TDs.

Tanner's first touchdown throw came on the heels of a fourth-down stop from the defense, setting up the offense at the Union 32-yard line. From there, Tanner moved the chains with consecutive third-down draw plays, and then a firstdown screen to Jensen Goble netted 19 yards. Later in the drive, from the 3-yard line, Tanner rolled right on fourth-andgoal and hit senior Tyler Grasty in the back of the endzone.

A Spartans' punt handed possession back to Union with time winding down in the half, and on the fourth play of the series, Tanner went up top to Cade Dockrey on a 36-yard score down the visitor's sideline to mount a 21-7 halftime

Both offenses swapped punts before Athens Academy finally halted Union's 28-0 run early in the fourth with a 1-yard touchdown rush. The score came courtesy of a short field when recently returned punter/kicker Zuriel Mancillas Friday night, Union's only wins dropped to one knee to field a low snap, marking him down inside the 30.

But the defense didn't make life easy for the Spartans, forcing them into eight offensive plays to churn out 27 yards and a score. Athens Academy's final

scoring drive required a timeconsuming 14 plays to move within 35-21 before a steady dose of Rader ran out the last 3 minutes of the contest. Entering Friday night, it

Region title game: Union Co. at No. 7 Fellowship

At no point in 2023 has the playoff picture been any clearer for Union County: Defeat Roswell's Fellowship Christian (7-2, 4-0) on Thursday, Nov. 2 and end a 50-year region title

A win hands the Panthers their first region crown since 1973, while a loss likely drops Union into a 3-way tie for second with Providence Christian and Athens Academy.

In round one of the Class AA State Tournament, Region 8-AA is paired with Region 5, where Callaway (Hogansville) has locked up the top spot. Columbia (Atlanta) is secure as the No. 2 seed, but the last two spots could go to Eagle's Landing Christian (McDonough), Redan (Stone Mountain) or McNair

Meanwhile, Fellowship Christian is coming off a 21-10 win over last-place Banks County. The week before, the Paladins allowed 353 yards rushing in a 73-39 win over Providence. Fellowship surrendered 341 on the ground during a 52-28 win over Athens Academy on Oct.

13. East Jackson put up 339 yards rushing during its loss to Fellowship on Oct. 6.

In non-region play, Fellowship allowed 411 on the ground in a 42-21 loss at Rabun County on Sept. 29.

Fellowship's recent defensive trend removes any doubt surrounding Coach Perry's game plan for Thursday night.

"We're going to run the ball," Perry said. "We're going

to have to change tempo and put Caiden [Tanner] in good positions so he's not in third-and-long all the time. [Fellowship] has a very good defensive lineman that has a lot of college offers." However, Perry's biggest

concern is Fellowship's potent offense, led by quarterback Jonathan Grandby and wide receiver Evan Haynes.

"Everything goes through those two and they are very good," Perry said. "Haynes is also a very good defensive back and his dad is former Falcons' receiver Michael Haynes, who is also a coach there. But they want to throw it deep and we have to limit that.'

Kickoff is at 7 p.m. Thursday night. Fellowship Christian is located at 10965 Woodstock Rd, Roswell, GA.

"I can't think of a better way to send out our seniors than we did on Friday," Perry said. "The last two classes are the reason our program is going in the right direction. I couldn't ask for anything more. But now it's time to go out and make history again on Thursday night."
