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State to certify 'hand recount' Friday; would-be fraudsters warned

Results of the Risk-Limiting Audit Manual Tally aka the statewide hand recount of the presidential race ordered last week by Secretary of State Brad Raffensperger – will be made available this week in advance of the Nov. 20 deadline for Georgia to certify the election.

The main purpose of a risk-limiting audit is to "identify potential hacks, malfunctions, or other interference in the voting process," according to the Secretary of State's Office, and Georgia is using an opensource software program called Arlo to assist the process.

Arlo is an election auditing tool built by the 501(c)(3) nonprofit VotingWorks and funded by the Department of Homeland Security.

With the margin being so close, it will require a full byhand recount in each county," Raffensperger said in a Nov. 11 news conference. "This will help build confidence. It will be an audit, a recount and a recanvass all at once."

Individual audit results from local elections boards were not available at press time, but Union County Elections Board Chair Libby Stevens said over the weekend she was pleased with the way her poll workers handled the audit.

Union County had more than 15,000 early in-person, mail-in, and Election Day ballots to work through in the audit, which was open to members of the public, designated political party monitors and the media for the sake of transparency.

Locally, the audit was completed at the Board Office on Hunt-Martin Street between

9 a.m. and 4:15 p.m. Friday, though larger counties will likely take all the time allotted through Wednesday, Nov. 18, to complete their recounts.

Raffensperger announced the "hand recount" after citing the close statewide margin of about 14,000 votes in the race between Donald Trump and Joe Biden for president.

The final statewide tally of the hand recount will serve as the official result of the presidential race in Georgia, which, once certified, will be open to yet another statewide recount should it fall within a close enough margin to allow a candidate to request retabulating.

Much is at stake in Georgia's ongoing election process, as Biden appears to have overcome the necessary hurdles to be named the next president of the United States, See Recount. Page 2A

Downtown Blairsville will get its 'shine on this weekend, as Grandaddy Mimm's Distilling Co. opens its brand-new facility for business at 112 Wellborn Street.

Starting at 11 a.m. on Saturday, Nov. 21, Grandaddy

Mimm's will welcome the public for tastings and retail purchases of its world-famous authentic corn whiskeys, new Owltown Vodkas, and of course, its various flavors of moonshine, all distilled right in the heart of Union County.

Grandaddy Mimm's has come a long way since Blairsville's own Country Music star Tommy Townsend

announced in 2012 he'd be turning the Depression-era moonshine recipe of his grandfather Jack "Mimm" McClure of Young Harris into a modern-day family business.

Four years later, in Summer 2016, Townsend opened his iconic Distillery & Museum at Pappy's Plaza on Gainesville Highway, offering tastings, tours, merchandise, live music and retail sales of his distilled products.

And now, in 2020, Townsend and his company have taken the next step by creating a true destination experience in Downtown Blairsville, moving to and completely renovating the old "CO-OP" building directly across from the Mountain Shelter Humane Society Thrift Store

"What started out as kind of a hobby has grown into a full production line, and I couldn't be happier seeing my grandaddy's legacy living on and getting bigger and bigger," said Townsend, whose company has gone from producing a few cases a month to hundreds, with plans for continued growth.
