tivities." Many deniers claim that CO2 is trivial to climate change and that water is the most important greenhouse gas. Data clearly show that the CO2 in the atmosphere has steadily increased and correlates with the use of fossil fuel. In some circles CO2 is considered to be more of a threat than water vapor because it is in the atmosphere for a longer time period before moving to the next stage of its cycle. The American Chemical Society was misunderstood when it reported that water vapor accounts for an average around 60% of the warming effect. It was already accepted that water vapor is responsible for keeping the Earth's temperature warm enough for human development. ACS later clarified their statement by stating that water vapor does not control Earth's temperature, but it is instead

pen this year with a couple of freezes in April and then one on May 10.

Evergreens will continue to need water throughout the winter. If the soil freezes for long periods, the roots can't take up the water. Deciduous trees, trees that lose their leaves, will not need as much water. Roots in trees will continue to grow as long as soil temperatures are over 40 degrees. Soil temperatures are warmer than air temperatures in the winter because they are insulated.
