## **Commissioner's Questions**

Residents of Union County have varying opinions about the adoption of local ordinances. Though we don't encourage a culture for dictating how people use their property, we occasionally find it necessary to consider how one person's decisions impact others

#### Q. Why do we have a Billboard ordinance?

A. This ordinance came about as a result of a proliferation of billboards being erected along Hwy 515 - especially those blocking mountain views. While it is very understandable that property owners simply want to have the opportunity of collecting rent and the billboard people



just want to make a living, there has to be a limit. Because, over time, the general public does not accept the fact that a few can negatively impact the view for everyone and state law agrees. Almost every county has some type of billboard ordinance. In Union County, an ordinance was passed limiting the number and locations of billboards so they would have a minimal impact in the future.

#### Q. Why did we adopt an RV Parks ordinance?

A. Similar to the billboard situation, several years ago we faced an issue of a proliferation of RV parks. RV Parks were being built with little consideration for how they would impact a neighborhood and possibly negatively affect property values. So, we created an ordinance that regulates where they can be located and how many can be built in a specific area. Again, we are not eliminating RV Parks, but attempting to limit their negative impact on the general public.

#### Q. Why did we adopt a Junkyards ordinance?

A. Many of the people of Union County, over time, have sold their property to people moving to this area from out of town. When land prices were under \$5,000 per acre, it was not such a big deal if your neighbor put in a junk yard or had a few junk cars. It would impact you, but not a lot of other people. However, now that property values have escalated to well over \$20,000 per acre, and the population density is increasing, the impact on a neighborhood is much greater. The public will not continue to accept the degradation of their community by this type of business. None of

Clearly Biden has several of the common symptoms of dementia: memory loss, changes in See Groza, page 5A


#### **Experiencing Poll Watching** Dear Editor,

My first experience with poll watching has been interesting. Collecting information before, during and after polls open each day provides necessary checks and balances. We note the Ballot Marking Device (BMD), Scanner and Poll Pad numbers among other things. We have been told that poll pad numbers are only for Election Day and not available for Advanced Voting. A manual count has sometimes been done as an alternative to keep track of how many people come through.

There are 10 BMDs, two scanners and three poll pads. Poll pads are connected to the Secretary of State website we were told when we questioned a WIFI connection called Election-WIFI.

One of the scanners incurred a paper jam error in the first week and was put out of commission. Dominion had to be contacted to get it running again but that was short lived and then jammed once again. A replacement scanner was called for and it jammed the first day it was brought in. A question comes to mind, what happens to the ballot that it malfunctioned on?

Communities Pro-

gram provides homeowners with simple and easy steps to help reduce a home's wildfire risk by preparing ahead of a wildfire. These steps are rooted in principles based on solid fire science research into how homes ignite.

The following are Firewise principles and tips that serve as a guide for residents: When it comes to wildfire risk, it is not a geographical location, but a set of conditions that determine the home's ignition potential in any community. Wildfire behavior is influenced by three main factors: topography, weather, and fuel. In the event of extreme wildfire behavior, extreme weather conditions are normally present, like extended drought, high winds, low humidity, and high temperatures, coupled with excess fuel build up including the accumulation of live and dead vegetation material. Additionally, the area's topography influences the fire's intensity and rate of spread.

Of these three factors, fuel is the only one we can influence. Debris like dead leaves and pine needles left on decks, in gutters and strewn across lawns can ignite from embers. Fire moving along the ground's surface can "ladder" into shrubs and low hanging tree limbs to create longer flames and more heat. If your home has flammable features or vulnerable openings, it can also serve as fuel for the fire, and become part of a disastrous chain of ignitions to other surrounding homes and structures. A home's ignition risk is determined by its immediate surroundings or its "home ignition zone" and the home's construction materials. According to fire science research, it is not where a home is located that determines ignition risk, but the landscape around it, often referred to as the "home ignition zone." This zone is defined as the home and its immediate surroundings up to 100 feet.

The Firewise Communities Program provides tips for reducing wildfire risk base on the home ignition zone concept: Home Zone - the home itself and within 5 feet of the foundation: Harden your home against wildfire. This includes fences, decks, porches, and other attachments. From a fire behavior point of view,

way. I believe to carry the Franks name meant that you were Republican. Luther Franks was a distant relative of Effie and

We'd always laugh when Luther would put the hat back on because it would fall down over his ears or it would sit right on top of his head."

Luther was only 5 feet tall, so sometimes Uncle Bud would use a long stick and place the hat on the top shelf in the store. Luther would spend the next 20 minutes walking around looking for his hat. When he would ask Dad or Bud about the hat, they would tell him they had not seen the hat, after which Luther would exclaim, "Evie, them's the two meanest boys whatever was." Aunt Evie Franks would wrap her arms around Dad and Uncle Bud and say, "Luther, these boys are little angels."

Toward the end of the war and after Dad and Uncle Bud became wise to the ways of politics, they found another way to aggravate Uncle Luther. The two boys knew Luther was a staunch Republican. They also knew he was not a fan of Roosevelt or Mr. Truman. One day the boys rode with Papa to Phil Campbell, and as usual they stopped in at the store. Uncle Luther came out to fill up the old truck. When the truck was filled, Papa paid Luther a whopping \$2 for the gas and began to drive away from the store. When the truck had traveled about 20 yards from the store, Dad stood up in the back of the truck and yelled, "Luther Franks looks just like Harry Truman." Luther reached down and grabbed a rock and let it sail toward the old truck. The rock never made it far enough to make contact, but it scared my Dad nonetheless. Thereafter, Uncle Luther kept a pile of rocks at the gas pump.

position of plants or

plant products. Using a compost pile will speed up the natural decomposition of plant material. Compost can improve soil drainage, structure, and help hold water and nutrients. The nutrients in compost will not be enough to replace fertilizing, but they can reduce fertilizing.

You can use just about any organic material for composting. Leaves, grass clippings, twigs, old annual or perennial flowers, old vegetable plants, straw, and sawdust can all be thrown into the compost pile. Try to avoid using insect or disease infested plants to reduce the spread of those plants the following season. You can put things like kitchen peelings and coffee grounds into the compost pile too. Kitchen scraps should be buried into existing compost so that they don't attract too many wild animals. Covering your compost pile will help keep animals out too. Avoid using highly processed foods because these will take longer to break down.

When making a compost pile, it's helpful to have something to contain it. A lot of different materials can be used from wire, fencing, wood pallets or concrete blocks. Leave some open spaces on the sides for ventilation. Good air circulation is important for successful compost. The bottom of the pile needs to be open to the soil to allow good drainage. Construct your pile in an out of the way place in your yard, in full sun.

Once you've constructed your container for the compost pile, start adding organic matter. Smaller pieces will decompose more quickly than large pieces of organic matter. Once you have a layer of organic matter in there add in some garden soil or animal manure. These will add fungi, bacteria, insects, and worms to the pile. They're the critters responsible for breaking down the plant material into the humus that you add to your garden. You'll want to keep the pile moist, but not soggy.

Sometimes a concern with compost piles is that there might be an odor. If you turn the pile with a shovel at least once a month this will reduce the smell. A good functioning compost pile will heat up from the activity of the microbes de-

these ordinances prevent billboards, RV parks or junkyards, but they limit where they can be placed and how they should be screened because of the potential negative impact they can have on not just the neighboring property, but on anyone driving by or seeing them from a distance.

A simple test for any of these ordinances is as follows. Imagine a billboard stuck up just across from your home with a light shining in your eyes every night. Imagine an RV Park next door to your home. Finally, imagine a junkyard right next to your yard. While there are a few who may not mind, you will find the vast majority of the public concurs with these types of ordinances. That is why state law has determined they are appropriate and legal.

Is limiting the location of where these can be built taking away some of your property rights? Yes, to some extent it is, but whose property rights are more valuable, yours, your neighbors' or the general public? State law says the public's rights are paramount in many instances.

Q. Do you enjoy adopting these ordinances?

A. Absolutely NOT !! Adopting ordinances are hard decisions to make and they require hours and hours of research, reading, and legal advice. However, in a growing community, they are necessary. By instituting some of these ordinances, we are making every effort to stay away from zoning. If you want to talk about losing property rights, then try to comply with the zoning regulations that many other counties have. I am against outright zoning in Union County, but to prevent it in the future, we must all be considerate of how what we do with our property impacts the public.

Often, the high price of property makes many of these considerations difficult to make and private property ownership MUST maintain its privileges and rights. The public should not take these measures to the extreme and begin to think that they should control other people's property just because they do not like what they are doing with it.

Bottom line; do to your neighbor as you would have them do to you. If this thought process was always followed, we would never need any more ordinances.

if it is attached to the house it is a part of the house. Non or low flammability construction materials, especially for roofs, siding, and windows are recommended for new homes or retrofits.

Keep any flammables, including plantings, debris, and mulch, out of the area within 5 feet of your home's foundation as well as off your roof, eave lines, gutters and deck or porch surfaces. Ensure vents and other openings are screened or otherwise protected from ember penetration during a wildfire. 5-30 feet: This well-irrigated area around the home includes decks and fences and provides space for fire suppression equipment in the event of an emergency. Lawns should be well maintained and mowed. Plantings should be limited to carefully spaced low flammability species, and consider hardscaping using gravel, or stone instead of mulch.

Keep any large fuel such as firewood piles, out of this area. 30–100 feet: Low flammability plant materials should be used here. Plants should be low growing and the irrigation system should extend into this section.

Create separation between grasses, shrubs, and trees to avoid a "fuel ladder" effect where fire can climb into taller vegetation. Trees should be spaced to prevent crowns from touching. 100+ feet: Place low-growing plants and well-spaced trees in this area, remembering to keep the volume of vegetation (fuel) low. Your home ignition zone extends up to 100 feet and it is quite common to have neighbors whose home ignition zone overlaps yours. Once a structure is en-

gulfed in flames, it could ignite other structures located less than 100 feet away. In addition, many communities have commonly owned property, including natural or wooded areas that can pose fire risks to all. This means that to be most effective, neighbors need to work together and with their local fire service to achieve greater wildfire safety.

Together, community residents can work with agencies and elected officials to accomplish the following: Ensure that homes and neighborhoods have legible/clearly marked street names and numbers; Know "two ways out" of the neighborhood for safe evacuation during a wildfire; Create phone and text trees to alert residents about local fires; Sign up for emergency notifications; Talk to your HOA to make sure you are in compliance with existing community rules or regulations on vegetation management and construction materials and if they are "Firewise-friendly"; Engage with your local fire department on how they can work with you and your neighbors, and participate in the "Ready, Set, Go!" program; Participation in the Firewise Communities USA Recognition Program provides the community with a risk assessment and action plan that will help residents work together annually to make where they live a safer place.

**continued from Page 4A** composing organic matter. The heat produced will kill off the odor causing bacteria. If you add manure to your pile there will be some initial odor, but as the pile matures the smell will go away. A well maintained compost pile should not have a strong odor.

Once the compost has a crumbly earth look and you can no longer recognize the plant material it's ready to be added to the garden. If you add the organic material over time the compost will become ready a little at a time. pable of comprehending such subjects, we would not have to teach them right from wrong, safe from unsafe, modest from immodest, or moral from immoral.
