Basketball opens with scrimmage, regular season begins Tuesday

Union County basketball returned to the hardwood last Tuesday, Nov. 12 with a scrimmage contest vs Rabun Gap-Nachoochee.

The girls would overpower the Lady Eagles, taking a double-digit lead in the second quarter before pulling away by 20.

The shorthanded guys team fought hard but eventually ran out of gas in the fourth quarter, falling 86-67.

Lady Panthers 61, Rabun Gap 41 - The Crystal Beach era at Union County High School got underway last week with a 61-41 scrimmage victory over a solid Rabun Gap squad that was fresh off its own one-sided preseason victory — a 70-36 rout of Towns County.

"As a coach you think you've done everything you can to prepare them and get them ready, but to be honest, I wasn't sure (what to expect in the scrimmage)," Coach Beach said. "I was a little worried about nerves but they came out and fought hard and that's what we practice everyday and what I expect."

Sophomore Ava Hunter scored 24 of her game-high 28 points in the first three quarters as the Lady Eagles had no answer for the reigning Class AA Freshman of the Year.

The high-point of the evening for Rabun Gap came in the opening two minutes as they built an early 4-0 advantage before Hunter and senior Andelin Hill combined to score 10 of the Lady Panthers' 13 first quarter points.

Leading 13-9 after one, senior Kait McCarter opened the second with a pair of free throws before freshman Ellie Cook made it a 17-9 game moments later with a stealand-score.

Consecutive buckets by Hunter quickly stretched the margin to double-digits at 21-10 while McCarter and sophomore Riley Allison kept the margin at 10-plus beyond the midway point of the second

"Our younger girls really stepped up," Coach Beach said. "Of course you have (Hunter), who doesn't play like a sophomore. Then you had Riley Allison and Ellie Cook who came in cool, calm and collected. We've got some other fireballs too that will go out there and hustle. There's a lot of promise, it's just about them gaining experience.'

A Rabun Gap trey trimmed the Union lead to seven at 25-18 but Hunter scored her team's next six points to stretch the lead to 31-19. McCarter split a pair at the line to close out the half with the Lady Panthers in control at 32-21. The first six Union County points of the third belonged to Hunter to help her team build its largest lead of the game, up to that point, at 38-23. Hill made it 41-25 with a triple from the wing but the Lady Eagles answered with a 6-0 spurt to pull within 10.

sponded with six-unanswered of their own as Hill knocked down another three and split a pair from the line to go with a Hunter bucket in the post.

Leading 47-33 after three, Hunter and McCarter pushed the Union County lead out to 16 and sophomore Rebekah Chambers made 54-37 with a 1-for-2 trip to the charity stripe. Later, senior Brooke Dockrey and Chambers helped open up a 57-39 advantage with 90 seconds remaining, then junior Kyla Locklear dropped in a pair of baskets in the final 36 seconds to give the Lady Panthers a 61-41 victory.

Hill finished with 11 points and McCarter added nine. Locklear scored four, Chambers and Cook had three apiece, Allison had two points and Dockrey added one.

When asked about establishing a rotation, Coach Beach referred to her substitution method as the "floating five."

"I think anyone that watched us (in the scrimmage) saw that we constantly sub in and out. If they are running and playing the way we preach everyday in practice then they should be tired, so we're going to try and keep fresh legs in at all times.'

According to Coach Beach, the transition has been



a smooth one after arriving in Blairsville last summer. Previously, Beach served as an assistant coach for the three-time defending State Champion Buford Lady Wolves.

"Everything and everyone has been great," she said. 'I couldn't be more happy. Everyone has bought in, the seniors are leading by example and setting the tone and Coach (Mandy) Hunter has been a tremendous help."

Coach Beach also brings with her a full court pressure defense, something the Lady Panthers haven't employed very often in recent years.

"(In the scrimmage) I wanted our girls to see what it takes to play that (style of defense)," she said. "We weren't perfect, and I didn't expect us to be, but it gives us a good starting point to build on.'

Union County will visit Towns County on Tuesday, however, Friday's contest with Fannin County has been postponed until January to allow fans and players to attend the football playoff game.

'Right now, I just want our girls to use every single day and every single opportunity to get better," Coach Beach said. Whether it's working on an offensive play, our defensive stance or ball handling, we just need to continue getting better. Point blank.

'I've talked about our seniors and I'll probably talk about them a lot this year. I believe that to be successful, it vill take those ladies to make it happen. We're trying to push some ownership upon them and they are doing a great job.

With only one player with starting experience (Sawyer Brey) and one that saw varsity action last season (Bryson Lariscy) the youthful Panthers held their own well into the fourth quarter despite never leading again following a brief 2-0 advantage.

"Of the 8 or 10 guys we played, only one has meaningful varsity experience," Coach Garrett said. "So I think we saw some good things for sure. The effort was there. The energy was there. The attitude was there and the toughness was there at times.

"Overall, I think (the scrimmage) was definitely a positive. If we can just keep getting better every single day, then when we get the football players back and in shape, I until January. believe we can do some really

Rabun Gap, 8-2 to begin the third, pulling within four at 45-41, but the Eagles rebounded with five-unanswered to extend their margin to 50-41.

Trailing 57-47 at the 2:30 mark of the third, Union County refused to go away, using a 6-0 spurt to make it a 57-53 game but Rabun Gap closed the quarter by stretching the difference back to eight at 63-55.

Thomaston - Union County High School's future athletic schedules will feature a few more familiar faces and a little less traveling following last week's Georgia High School Association Reclassification Committee meeting.

Gone are three-hour trips to Monticello, Putnam County and Social Cirlce and in their place will be nextdoor neighbor Fannin County and a former region-foe in Gainesville's Riverside Military Academy.

Meanwhile, Banks County, Elbert County, Oglethorpe County and Rabun County are also staying put in Region 8-AA to round out the seven-team region.

In girls' sports, however, Region 8-AA will only consist of six teams since Riverside is a boys-only academy.

Despite eliminating three of the longest trips (Monticello, Putnam and Social Circle) off the schedule, and replacing them with Fannin County and Riverside, Region 8-AA will still traverse a large swath of North Georgia.



GHSA Realignment brings changes to Region 8-AA

Stretching from the Tennessee line to Lake Hartwell and the outskirts of Athens, three and four-hour bus rides are on the decline but haven't been completely eradicated for Union County's student-athletes.

As for the departed members of Region 8-AA, Monticello and Putnam County will remain in Class AA as members of Region 3-AA (Monticello) and Region 4-AA (Putnam County). Social Circle will drop down to Region 8-A Public.

However, not everyone has been accepting of the rule changes as a large group of Class A private schools requested to move up to Class AA instead of playing in a private-only classification. As a result, the **Reclassification Committee** denied the request, electing to vote on all of the schools as a group.

The motion to vote on all of the schools as a group, as well as deny their request to play up were both passed by a 15-1 vote. The lone "no"
