Enotah CASA is a 501c3 nonprofit organization that spans across the Enotah Judicial Circuit - Union, Towns, White and Lumpkin counties – and helps more than 200 abused and neglected children in the foster system each year. Oftentimes these children are separated from their siblings and experience a great deal of confusion as they are processed through the system of social workers, foster homes and courts.

According to the Enotah CASA website, "Every day in this country, 1,900 children become victims of abuse or neglect, and four of them will die. Every day. Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) for Children is a network of community-based programs that recruit, train and support citizen-volunteers to advocate for the best interests of abused and neglected children in courtrooms and communities.

"Volunteer advocates - empowered directly by the Enotah Juvenile Court – offer judges the critical information they need to ensure that each child's rights and needs are being attended to while in foster care."

The purpose of a CASA volunteer is not only to give these abused and neglected children a voice within the legal system, but also a point of stability and certainty on a regular basis during a time

Day ministry at Antioch. "I think it's a great food ministry, because growing up myself, we were hungry kids, so I know what it's like to be hungry. I don't want anybody to not have a Thanksgiving meal, and we have a lot of needy people in Union County.'

And yes, the volunteers prepared more than 200 meals, but that number reflects the individuals who made it known that they wanted to take part in the Thanksgiving Day celebration with Antioch. Had more people and families come forward, the church would have prepared as many meals as necessary for the occasion.

The Thanksgiving Day ministry goes hand in hand with the other ministries of the church, namely the food and wood ministries that Antioch provides every third Thursday of each month from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

"There's Hope for the Hungry" is the name of the food ministry, and participants receive dry goods and select perishables when they pick up their boxes of food each month.

To qualify for the monthly food ministry, residents sign in at the main sanctuary and sit down with a church counselor.

"We just sit down and find out where they are spiritually," said Antioch Baptist Church Pastor George Cline. "We present a plan of salvation, and if they accept, great. If they don't, that's alright, too. If they come in and sit down, they're getting a food ticket.'

According to Pastor Cline, the ministry is based on the teachings of Jesus Christ in the Gospel of Matthew.

"This is strictly us trying to do just like Jesus did,' said Pastor Cline, referring to Matthew 25:31-46. "Everything is free, we don't ask for anything. Occasionally, we'll have somebody who, maybe they found another job, or maybe somehow their situation got better, and they'll come back and say, 'Here's \$50 – put it in the food giveaway ministry."
