Dockrey, supporting cast pick up slack at Fannin

Panthers to visit White County, Murphy ahead of Battle of the States

Blue Ridge - On a combined 8-for-30 shooting night from juniors Jude Ellis, Houston Henry and Hayden Hughes, sophomore Cade Dockrey poured in a season-high 16 points as Union County (7-2) pulled away from Fannin County (4-4) during the fourth

Deadlocked at 37-37 through three, the Panthers outscored Fannin 22-11 over the final 8 minutes to notch their fourth straight victory over the Rebels, 59-48.

"We kept plugging away and didn't break our mold," Union County head coach Corey Garrett said. "I'm proud of the guys. Fannin County is always a tough place to play and when we went to the fourth quarter tied, I told them 'it's time to go win it' and that's what

Dockrey opened the fourth by knocking down a 12-footer and getting to the basket for a 41-37 edge. Junior Kaden Combs split two free throws with 5:13 to play, but Fannin responded with a 3-pointer on the other end, cutting the Panthers' lead to 42-40.

Combs delivered again moments later, taking a baseline feed from Ellis and scoring inside at the 3:27 mark. After a Fannin miss, Dockrey's floater made it 46-40, then Ellis buried a dagger in the Rebels via a triple with 2:14 remaining.

Freshman Jaxon Totherow scored down low, keeping the margin at nine before the Rebels fired back with a

3-pointer. Consecutive baskets by Hughes provided Union a 55-47 advantage near the minute mark, then Henry's full-court baseball pass to Dockrey, who hit a trailing Totherow in stride for a layup, put the Rebels away.

Henry finished with 13 points, 5 rebounds, 5 assists and 2 steals. Ellis had 8 points, 7 boards and 6 assists; Hughes ended his night with 4 points and 8 rebounds.

Dockrey's 16 points, 4 rebounds and 3 assists led a sup-

thers to victory. Totherow added 10 points, grabbed 4 boards and blocked 3 shots; Combs had 7 points and 6 rebounds; junior Brayden Hogsed had 3 points, 2 assists and a block. Meanwhile, Combs, Dockrey, Hogsed and Totherow combined to go 16 of 24 from the floor in their

Dockrey's turnaround jumper moved Union back in front, but another Fannin spurt spotted the Rebels a 37-34 lead until Henry's 3-pointer evened the score heading to the fourth.

Team stats: Union hit 24 of 54 (44%) from the floor, 4 of 17 (24%) from deep and 7 of 12 (58%) at the charity stripe. Fannin made 18 of its 51 (33%) attempts, went 7 of 20 (35%) from long distance and hit 5 of 8 (63%) from the line.

The Panthers out-rebounded Fannin 35-29 overall and 9-6 on the offensive boards. Union held a 34-18 scoring advantage in the paint and committed 10 turnovers to the Rebels' 12.

Up next: Union County travels to Class AAA White County on Tuesday, Dec. 19, seeking a season sweep of the Warriors. On Thursday, Dec. 21, the Panthers head to Murphy, NC in a rematch of Union County's Dec. 5 loss.

'We hope to put together four good quarters of basketball at White County," Garrett said. "As for Murphy, it's always a fun place to play. Hopefully we shoot the ball better and do a better job attacking their bigs."


Blue Ridge - Twelve Panthers represented Georgia on Thursday night at Fannin County in the annual FCA Se-
