Hughes' career-night lifts Panthers over Towns County

John and Ellis combine for 20 second-half points to fend off Indians' late push

Hiawassee - Losing was completely out of the question for Lake Hughes at Towns

Under no circumstance would the Panthers' sharpshooter allow his fellow seniors to close their respective chapter of the Towns-Union rivalry with another defeat. And last Friday night in Hiawassee, he delivered, pouring in career-highs of 29 points and eight 3-pointers while leading Union County (5-7) to a 67-60 victory over the defending State Champions.

"It means a lot to me and the team to go out with a win [over Towns County]," Hughes said after the game. "I just wanted to come out, do my thing and shoot the ball. I felt good tonight, so I kept shooting and [the shots] kept falling.'

Hughes connected six times from behind the arc during the first half, and by the midway point of the third frame, he was sitting on eight treys -- one shy of tying the UCHS single-game

County head coach Corey Garrett, there was no change of strategy to get Hughes going after struggling a bit (8 points on 3 of 8 shooting before fouling out) in the Dec. 10 loss to Towns. Garrett's squad simply relaxed and played Union County basketball during the second meeting.

'We didn't do anything different with [Hughes], but obviously, he's a scorer and when he's playing well, we're usually playing well," Garrett said. "We watched a lot of film on [our first Towns game] and realized we had a good gameplan, we just didn't execute.

"That [first meeting] was probably the biggest game that a lot of our guys have ever played in, and I think you could tell in the first half [of the first game] that we were a little too gassed up. In the second half, you started to see us get into a rhythm and that's how we came back [from pleted the 3-point play, resulting down 14 points]. So during practice all week, we just hammered on [the positives from the second half of the first game]."

Despite being a one-possession game, the Indians elected to put John back on the line with 55 seconds on the clock, and this time, the senior made them pay by going a perfect 2-for-2.

Ellis finished with 13 points and four rebounds despite going scoreless in the first half.

Henry scored 4 points with five boards while notching a career-high five assists and a game-high two steals.

"[Henry] isn't a huge scorer right now, but he's like the keys to our engine," Garrett said. With Caleb moving to [a different] role, Houston has taken over at [point guard] and I think that's going to pay off for us."

Murrayville - If anyone wondered how Union County would respond less than 24 hours removed from a physically and mentally taxing victory over the defending State Champions, the Panthers answered those questions with a 57-52 victory on Saturday afternoon at Class AAAA Chestatee.

But the win wasn't without a few bumps in the road as Union County faced a 43-35 fourthquarter deficit before outscoring the War Eagles 24-9.

"It was a sloppy game and our energy was a little down during the first half," Union head coach Corey Garrett said.

Freshman Jude Ellis scored 11 during the final frame, matching his career-high with 21 points on 4-of-7 shooting from downtown. Senior Lake Hughes finished with 14 points and a game-high four steals on 2 of 4 from long distance.

Union County (8-5) scored a 63-62 upset victory at Class AAAA's 10th ranked Chestatee (6-2) on Saturday afternoon following a 77-31 blowout win the night before at Towns County.

Lady Panthers 63, Chestatee 62 - Union County survived a red-hot shooting performance from a former teammate on Saturday in Murrayville by outlasting a 21-point outing from Riley Allison (daughter of former Panthers' football coach Brian Allison), courtesy of sophomore Sofia McNabb's game-winning jumper with 12 seconds remain-
