Winter Weather Preparedness Week, from December 4-8 this year, was created to raise awareness of winter weather hazards and reinforce understanding of winter weather terminology. Throughout the week, Union County EMA and GEMA/HS will provide information to assist Georgia residents in preparing for

Each day concentrates on a different aspect of winter weather. The focus for each day is as follows: Monday, Dec. 4: Winter Weather in Georgia – learn about winter weather hazards that can impact the North Georgia mountains and the state of Georgia. Tuesday, Dec. 5: Winter Weather Terminology – learn about winter weather "alerts" (watches, warnings, and advisories) and what they mean. Wednesday, Dec. 6: Winter Weather Preparation Tips – learn how to best prepare for winter weather events and put together a "Ready Kit" while making a plan before winter weather strikes. Thursday, Dec. 7: Winter Weather Driving Tips/Safety learn "best practices" for driving (if necessary) in winter weather conditions and how to pack a mobile "Ready Kit." Friday, Dec. 8: Winter Weather Outlook for the 2023-24 season - resources for learning where and how to stay informed of weather forecasts.



Things are given as presents which no mortal ever

I suspect I have given gadgets that went straight to the re-gifting shelf. Now, Mrs. Fowler should earn an award for her giving prowess. She's good at it even when she's not



The right gift given at the right time is the essential gift. The ancient Israelites received the gift of hope with the promise. "But as for you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, too little to be among the clans of Judah, from you One will go forth for Me to be ruler in Israel. His goings forth are from long ago, from the days of eternity" (Mic. 5:2). The Magi followed the star to Bethlehem to see this ruler. When Jesus became a man, He affirmed this hope saying, "The kingdom of God is in your midst" (Luke 17:21).

Christ Jesus is the essential gift, not just promised to the ancients but given to you. How could you describe the gift? I offer three answers. It is belonging. "To them He gave the right to become children of God, even to those who believe in His name' (John 1:12). It is being held blameless and equipped to survive life's chaos. Commissioner's Questions

It has been brought to my attention that some of our residents are unable to get to local holiday celebrations due to transportation. Many Union County residents do not know that we offer transportation services. The availability of adequate transportation enables older persons to live independently in their communities, helps to prevent isolation and the possible need for long-term care placement. Many older people,

who do not drive, must rely on fam-Q & A ily and friends to provide much of from Union County the transportation. But for others, it Commissione is necessary to find community resources to provide transportation, as this vital support service may be their Paris

only connection to the outside world. If you need a ride to some of the local holiday celebration events, this information may help.

Q. What is the Union County Transportation Services?

A. The local system offers rides for a nominal fee for those who need transportation to and from doctor's appointments, the grocery store, drug stores, and other locations within the Union County limits.

Q. How is this service funded?

A. Partial funding for this service comes from the Federal Department of Transportation through the Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT). A 50/50 grant, Union County is responsible for matching 50% of the funding. Union County spends funds up front for such things as wages for drivers, dispatchers, fuel, maintenance, etc., and GDOT reimburses Union County for eligible expenses. Federal money is given to GDOT and that agency distributes these funds to Georgia counties. There are different types of funding for different types of transportation systems in the State of Georgia. The money that comes to Union County and surrounding counties is from the Section 5311 Program – which is for Rural Transit. Because of the county population, the size of the City of Blairsville, and the distance between transportation stops. funding for rural counties is limited to "on call" trips as opposed to regular bussing routes.

Q. How many vehicles does the Union County Transportation Services operate?

A. Two 8-passenger vans make up the fleet of the Union

Space Heaters

KNOWN AS BLACK TEARS

It's that time of the year when we fire up the old wood heater or fireplace so we can enjoy the dancing flames, crackling of the wood burning so we can warm our backsides and toes. We don't think about the cobwebs, bird nests, and creosote in our chimney left over from the long

When it is hot, we don't think about cleaning out our chimney for the first fire. It gets cold and we light



the match and plan to clean the chimney on Saturday. Saturday might be too late after our first chimney fire! Wood heaters and fireplaces make the room warm and toasty but are

only one escaping spark away from disaster. Wood heaters seem most dangerous but in fact seemingly safe space heaters are the deadliest of all. While only 32 percent of home heating fires involve space heaters, they are involved in 79 percent of home heating fire deaths, according to a report released by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). Heating equipment continues to be the second leading cause of home fires behind cooking and the second leading cause of home fire deaths behind smoking. NFPA is urging caution and asking the public to practice safe heating behaviors as the peak time for home heating fires continues, and half of all home heating fires usually happen in December, January, and February.

The leading factor contributing to space heater fires in general was heating equipment too close to things that can burn, such as upholstered furniture, clothing, mattress, or bedding. Other leading factors contributing to home heater fires were failure to clean, which is principally related to creosote build-up in chimneys, and leaving an operating space heater unattended.

Whether your chimney supports a wood or coal stove or just a fireplace, be sure to have it cleaned and inspected at least once a year to reduce your risk of having a fire. Always turn off a portable space heater when you go to sleep or leave the room. In 2017, U.S. fire departments responded to 66,500 home structure fires that involved heating equipment. These fires killed 580 people, injured another 1,850, and were responsible for \$608 million in direct property damage.

NFPA offers the following safety tips: Use a sturdy, metal screen to prevent contact burns, which are even more common than flame burns. Keep things that can burn, such as paper, bedding, or furniture, at least 3 feet

Historical Preservation

During the Spring Quarter of my Junior year at the University of Georgia, I found myself in a Genetics class taught by a Doctor A. A. Fleming. As roll was called on the first day of class, he paused for a moment when my name was called and looked around the room to de-

termine which of his students was associated with this name Cummings. I was then asked where I was from, and I explained that I was raised in Chickam-



auga, Georgia. He responded, "Well, Mr. Chickamauga Cummings, the reason I asked is that I remember a Lon Cummings from Alabama that made a spinning wheel for my mother many years ago." I asked my professor about which part of Alabama, and he responded that it was a little place called Bear Creek. I told him that I had a Great-Grandfather Lon in Phil Campbell, which is close to Bear Creek. He grinned and we became friends for life. He explained to me that his mother had traveled the 15 miles in a buggy to Phil Campbell to personally ask my Great-Grandfather to make a spinning wheel for her.

This quirky professor which wore a safari hat inside because the UV Tube lights would sun burn his bald head was a brilliant geneticist and a very good teacher. Under his tutelage I was able to learn about plant genetics and the hybridization of crops. I not only learned, but I really enjoyed this class and made an A. He made learning fun, which not all professors could do.

I would call on him from time to time and when in Athens I would go by to see him just to say hello. Late in his career I heard that his mother had passed away. A few months afterward I was at a meeting where he was speaking about Leaf Blight resistance in Field Corn. We talked about his upcoming retirement, and he asked about my career as a County Agent. Suddenly, I remembered the spinning wheel and asked if he would sell it to me. He smiled and told me he would if he still had it. After his mother had passed and before he could get to her side, his relatives had gone through her things and took everything of any value out of her house. The spinning wheel was gone, and he had no idea who took it.

Dr. Flemming was more than a little aggravated, as he should have been. But he still had the memories of his mother, and I still have memories of a wonderful relationship between a student and his professor. And I learned a good life lesson. If I can preserve a piece of history, I will, because once that history is gone, it is gone forever.

Mistletoe

Around this time of year mistletoe is sometimes a popular decoration in people's homes. You'll see it hanging above doorways for use by romantically inclined couples. Nowadays you can buy plastic mistletoe at stores to put up in your house. Let's talk about the effect that mistletoe can **UGA**

cording to Norse mythology the mistletoe berries brought the Norse god Baldur back to life.

You can find mistletoe outside on trees year-round as it is an evergreen plant. Usually in December it will become more noticeable because trees are bare after dropping their leaves. If you see a green bundle of leaves in the branches of tree around this time of year, chances are that it's mistletoe. In the plant world mistletoe is considered a parasitic plant. Mistletoe will send its root, called the haustorium, into the bark of a host tree. The mistletoe will take nutrients and water from the host tree.

Mistletoe is usually found in the Southern United States because it is susceptible to freezing temperatures, ranging from Virginia over to Texas and down to Florida. It can infect more than 105 different species of trees. Some trees often infected by mistletoe are maples, buckeyes, birch, hickory, oaks, and a whole bunch more.

Mistletoe can be shaded out by surrounding branches. Therefore, fast growing trees that can cover mistletoe from above will have success in preventing infection.

Mistletoe creates a large draw for water and nutrients on the tree. Mistletoe will pull these things to itself away from the roots of the tree. This process can lead to a lot of stress on the tree, especially in a drought. Mistletoe tissue will have 1.6 times more nitrogen, 2.3 times more potassium, and 2.5 times more phosphorus than the host tree tissue. During times of drought mistletoe water and nutrient uptake from the tree will increase while the rest of the tree is in decline. Research has shown that moderately infected trees can have a 66% mortality rate after a severe drought period. Mistletoe is able to pull water from the tree more effectively than the tree can pull the water up.

Mistletoe infections can be very common. Trees that are taller than surrounding trees and trees that are not densely packed in with other trees are most likely to be infected. Infections will be begin at the top of the tree and move downward and inward over time. Advanced symptoms on the tree of infection can be branch

County Transportation system. The vans are air-conditioned, equipped with hydraulic chair lifts, and they are handicap accessible.

Q. How do I make use of the service?

A. If you want to take advantage of the transportation system, it is best to call at least a day before to make an appointment for the van to pick you up. Call (706) 439-6050; Operates five days per week; 8:00am -3:30pm. Riders under 12 must be accompanied by an adult 18 or over. Rider must provide a child safety seat for all children

under six years of age. **Q. How much does it** cost to ride the buses?

A. Fees apply to all riders six and older. Prices listed are for one-way fares. First Mile – \$3.00; Each

Additional Mile – \$.50 Q. Can I get a reduced

rate if I am elderly or disabled? A. Unfortunately, federal

programs such as this do not allow discounted rates. Everyone

who rides has to pay the same price if Union County is to continue receiving federal funding.

Q. Will someone come into my home to help me get

into the transportation bus? A. Though we wish we could accommodate these types of requests, it is not possible. The Union County Transit and all 5311 programs are curb to curb service providers. This means that the individual rider must be able to get out of their home by themselves as well as handle their personal off-location errands. In other words, riders must be able to do their own shopping, etc. The drivers can help passengers from their door and into the bus if necessary, and they will help with the wheelchair lift when necessary. If a passenger requires assistance with shopping or getting into stores or doctors' offices, the rider must have an aid with them to help with these items. If the assistance of an aid is necessary, the aid can ride the bus free of

die-back, reduced tree growth, increased stress, and in massive infestations, tree death.

Early intervention is critical when dealing with mistletoe infection. If you simply remove the mistletoe shoot it will mostly likely grow back, so repeated removal would be necessary. Pruning tree branches that are infected is an effective method of removing mistletoe. Remove the branch at least 14 inches below the point of infection. Ethephon is as chemical application that is a plant growth regulator that can be used to control mistletoe. Whenever you apply any chemical, read the label before application.

Control of mistletoe on old and socially significant trees can be important. Having a mistletoe infection does not necessarily mean that death is imminent for a tree, but mistletoe can have a drastic impact on the tree's ability to thrive.

leads to an overdose and death.

The realization that you must prioritize your needs over your wants is the most difficult aspect of entering rehab. I never wanted to become an addict or need to go to rehab when I was younger. Having a family and becoming a veterinarian were my goals. I got lost somewhere on that road. One drink turned into many, which turned into an endless amount, and I had no idea how to deal with my problems. One of the hardest decisions I've ever had to make in my life was to go to rehab, but it was ultimately the best one. Who knows where I could've ended up if I had put

Our parents will always regard us as their little children. When we are deeply engrossed in our addiction, neither our parents nor relatives can identify us. Our parents genuinely care about what's best for us in the end. They would rather not watch us battle anything, much less an addiction that could drive us away. It will hurt to miss one holiday, but everything will work out in the end. It would be far worse if they missed every holiday for the rest of their lives. No parent desires to bury or lose their child.

away from heating equipment. Use heating equipment that has the label of a recognized testing laboratory. Never use your oven for

Have a qualified professional install the equipment. Make sure all fuelburning vented equipment is vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning. Make sure the venting for exhaust is kept clear and unobstructed. This includes removal of snow and ice around the outlet to the outside. Install and maintain carbon monoxide alarms to avoid risk of carbon monox-

ide poisoning. Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected annually by a qualified professional. Turn portable electric heaters off when you go to bed or leave the room. Use portable space heaters with an automatic shut off so if they're tipped over they will shut off. Plug power cords directly into outlets and never into an extension cord. Inspect for cracked or damaged, broken plugs or loose connections. Always use the proper fuel in a fuel burning heater as specified by the manufacturer. When refueling, allow the appliance to cool and refuel outside or in a well-ventilated area. When using the heater, open a window to ensure proper ventilation. In portable kerosene or other liquid-fueled space heaters, always use the proper grade of the proper fuel. All new unvented gas-fired space heaters have an oxygen depletion sensor that detects a reduced level of oxygen in the area where the heater is operating and shuts off the heater before a hazardous level of carbon monoxide accumulates. If you have an older heater without this feature, replace it. If the pilot light of your gas heater goes out, allow 5 minutes or more for the gas to go away before trying again, do not allow gas to accumulate, and light the match before you turn on the gas to the pilot

to avoid risk of flashback.

If you smell gas in your gas

heater, do not attempt to light

the appliance. Turn off all the

controls and open doors and

windows. Call a gas service person. Start the fire with newspaper or kindling, never with a flammable liquid, such as lighter fluid, kerosene, or gasoline. Keep the doors of your wood stove closed unless loading or stoking the live fire. Allow ashes to cool before disposing. Dispose of ashes in a tightly covered metal (Never Plastic!) container and keep the ash container at least 10 feet away from the home and any other nearby buildings. Douse and saturate with water. Chimneys and vents need to be cleaned and inspected at least once a year by a professional.

Heaters are just "Contained Fire" trying to get out into our flammable things, and it only takes one mistake to let the fire escape into our homes. Think Safety because the home you save might be yours!
